This act may be cited as the "Soldiers' and 17 Heroes' Monuments and Memorials Protection Act." 18 Section 2. Section 3. Section 265.155, Florida Statutes, is created to read:

265.155 Remembrance on public property.-

(1) As used in this section, the term "remembrance" means an exhibit; artwork, including a painting, stained glass, or a statue; a monument; a memorial; a nameplate; a historical marker; a symbol, including a religious symbol; a tombstone; a plaque; a seal; a logo; a road name; a building, a structure, or an educational facility name; a historical flag or other

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display; a geographic area, natural or manmade landscape, or
feature fountain; or a similar object that was made to honor or
commemorate:

- (a) A soldier, a military figure, or a government official or civilian who provided material aid to the war effort during a time of war, including, but not limited to, a conflict enumerated in s. 1.01(14), who served one or more of the original 13 colonies, the State of Florida, the United States, or a geographical area or territory that became a part of the United States;
- (b) A military organization or military unit of one or more of the original 13 colonies, the State of Florida, the United States, or a geographical area or territory that became part of the United States;
- (c) An armed conflict, including, but not limited to, an armed conflict described in s. 1.01(14), in which residents of this state were involved; or
- (d) A law enforcement officer, a prison guard, a firefighter, or an astronaut.
- (2) A remembrance erected, named, or dedicated on or after March 22, 1822, on public property may only be relocated, removed, altered, renamed, rededicated, or otherwise disturbed if necessary to accommodate construction, repair, or improvements to the remembrance or to the surrounding property on which the remembrance is located. Such remembrance must be

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relocated or returned within 90 days after completion of construction.

- (3) A remembrance on public property that is sold or repurposed must be relocated to a location of equal prominence as the original location.
- (4) The concealment of a remembrance on public property exceeding 45 days in any 12 month period by the state, county, municipality, or other subdivision is prohibited.
- (5) A resident of this state or an entity whose purpose is historic preservation, a veteran, or a law enforcement benevolent organization has standing to seek enforcement of this section through a civil action in the circuit court in the county in which the remembrance is located.
- Section 4. Subsections (5) through (9) of section 806.13, Florida Statutes, are renumbered as subsections (6) through (10), respectively, present subsection (8) is amended, and a new subsection (5) is added to that section, to read:
  - 806.13 Criminal mischief; penalties; penalty for minor.-
- (5) (a) A person may not willfully and maliciously damage or deface, or remove by any means a remembrance, as defined in s. 265.155, that is owned or erected by a governmental entity, a museum, a historical society, or a similar organization, or a remembrance that is located in a cemetery or on a grave or tomb.
- (b) A person who violates this subsection commits a felony of the third degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082, s.

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## 126 775.083, or s. 775.084.

(9)(8) A minor whose driver license or driving privilege is revoked, suspended, or withheld under subsection (8) (7) may elect to reduce the period of revocation, suspension, or withholding by performing community service at the rate of 1 day for each hour of community service performed. In addition, if the court determines that due to a family hardship, the minor's driver license or driving privilege is necessary for employment or medical purposes of the minor or a member of the minor's family, the court shall order the minor to perform community service and reduce the period of revocation, suspension, or withholding at the rate of 1 day for each hour of community service performed. As used in this subsection, the term "community service" means cleaning graffiti from public property.

Section 5. This act shall take effect July 1, 2020.

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
