An act relating to required instruction in the history
of Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders; amending s.
1003.42, F.S.; requiring the history of Asian
Americans and Pacific Islanders to be included in
specified instruction; providing requirements for such
instruction; amending ss. 1006.148 and 1014.05, F.S.;
conforming cross-references; providing an effective
date.
Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:
Section 1. Subsection (2) of section 1003.42, Florida
Statutes, is amended to read:
1003.42 Required instruction
(2) Members of the instructional staff of the public
schools, subject to the rules of the State Board of Education
and the district school board, shall teach efficiently and
faithfully, using the books and materials required that meet the
highest standards for professionalism and historical accuracy,
following the prescribed courses of study, and employing
approved methods of instruction, the following:
(a) The history and content of the Declaration of
Independence, including national sovereignty, natural law, self-
evident truth, equality of all persons, limited government,
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26 popular sovereignty, and inalienable rights of life, liberty, 27 and property, and how they form the philosophical foundation of 28 our government.

(b) The history, meaning, significance, and effect of the provisions of the Constitution of the United States and amendments thereto, with emphasis on each of the 10 amendments that make up the Bill of Rights and how the constitution provides the structure of our government.

34 (c) The arguments in support of adopting our republican
35 form of government, as they are embodied in the most important
36 of the Federalist Papers.

37 (d) Flag education, including proper flag display and flag38 salute.

(e) The elements of civil government, including the primary functions of and interrelationships between the Federal Government, the state, and its counties, municipalities, school districts, and special districts.

43 (f) The history of the United States, including the period 44 of discovery, early colonies, the War for Independence, the 45 Civil War, the expansion of the United States to its present boundaries, the world wars, and the civil rights movement to the 46 47 present. American history shall be viewed as factual, not as 48 constructed, shall be viewed as knowable, teachable, and 49 testable, and shall be defined as the creation of a new nation based largely on the universal principles stated in the 50

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51 Declaration of Independence.

52 The history of the Holocaust (1933-1945), the (q)1. 53 systematic, planned annihilation of European Jews and other 54 groups by Nazi Germany, a watershed event in the history of 55 humanity, to be taught in a manner that leads to an 56 investigation of human behavior, an understanding of the 57 ramifications of prejudice, racism, and stereotyping, and an 58 examination of what it means to be a responsible and respectful 59 person, for the purposes of encouraging tolerance of diversity in a pluralistic society and for nurturing and protecting 60 61 democratic values and institutions, including the policy, definition, and historical and current examples of anti-62 Semitism, as described in s. 1000.05(8), and the prevention of 63 64 anti-Semitism. Each school district must annually certify and 65 provide evidence to the department, in a manner prescribed by 66 the department, that the requirements of this paragraph are met. The department shall prepare and offer standards and curriculum 67 68 for the instruction required by this paragraph and may seek 69 input from the Commissioner of Education's Task Force on 70 Holocaust Education or from any state or nationally recognized 71 Holocaust educational organizations. The department may contract 72 with any state or nationally recognized Holocaust educational 73 organizations to develop training for instructional personnel 74 and grade-appropriate classroom resources to support the developed curriculum. 75

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76 2. The second week in November shall be designated as 77 "Holocaust Education Week" in this state in recognition that 78 November is the anniversary of Kristallnacht, widely recognized 79 as a precipitating event that led to the Holocaust.

80 The history of African Americans, including the (h) history of African peoples before the political conflicts that 81 82 led to the development of slavery, the passage to America, the 83 enslavement experience, abolition, and the history and 84 contributions of Americans of the African diaspora to society. Students shall develop an understanding of the ramifications of 85 86 prejudice, racism, and stereotyping on individual freedoms, and 87 examine what it means to be a responsible and respectful person, 88 for the purpose of encouraging tolerance of diversity in a 89 pluralistic society and for nurturing and protecting democratic 90 values and institutions. Instruction shall include the roles and 91 contributions of individuals from all walks of life and their 92 endeavors to learn and thrive throughout history as artists, 93 scientists, educators, businesspeople, influential thinkers, members of the faith community, and political and governmental 94 95 leaders and the courageous steps they took to fulfill the 96 promise of democracy and unite the nation. Instructional materials shall include the vital contributions of African 97 98 Americans to build and strengthen American society and celebrate 99 the inspirational stories of African Americans who prospered, even in the most difficult circumstances. Instructional 100

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101 personnel may facilitate discussions and use curricula to 102 address, in an age-appropriate manner, how the individual 103 freedoms of persons have been infringed by slavery, racial 104 oppression, racial segregation, and racial discrimination, as 105 well as topics relating to the enactment and enforcement of laws resulting in racial oppression, racial segregation, and racial 106 107 discrimination and how recognition of these freedoms has 108 overturned these unjust laws. However, classroom instruction and 109 curriculum may not be used to indoctrinate or persuade students to a particular point of view inconsistent with the principles 110 111 enumerated in subsection (3) or the state academic standards. The department shall prepare and offer standards and curriculum 112 113 for the instruction required by this paragraph and may seek 114 input from the Commissioner of Education's African American 115 History Task Force.

116 (i) The history of Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders, 117 including the history of Japanese internment camps and the 118 incarceration of Japanese-Americans during World War II; the 119 immigration, citizenship, civil rights, identity, and culture of 120 Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders; and the contributions of 121 Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders to American society. Instructional materials shall include the contributions of Asian 122 123 Americans and Pacific Islanders to American society. 124 (j) (i) The elementary principles of agriculture. 125 (k) (j) The true effects of all alcoholic and intoxicating

183 <u>(t)(s)</u> Civic and character education on the qualities and 184 responsibilities of patriotism and citizenship, including 185 kindness; respect for authority, life, liberty, and personal 186 property; honesty; charity; racial, ethnic, and religious 187 tolerance; and cooperation and, for grades 11 and 12, voting 188 using the uniform primary and general election ballot described 189 in s. 101.151(9).

190 <u>(u)(t)</u> In order to encourage patriotism, the sacrifices 191 that veterans and Medal of Honor recipients have made in serving 192 our country and protecting democratic values worldwide. Such 193 instruction must occur on or before Medal of Honor Day, 194 Veterans' Day, and Memorial Day. Members of the instructional 195 staff are encouraged to use the assistance of local veterans and 196 Medal of Honor recipients when practicable.

198 The State Board of Education is encouraged to adopt standards 199 and pursue assessment of the requirements of this subsection. 200 Instructional programming that incorporates the values of the

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201 recipients of the Congressional Medal of Honor and that is 202 offered as part of a social studies, English Language Arts, or 203 other schoolwide character building and veteran awareness 204 initiative meets the requirements of paragraph (u) (t). 205 Section 2. Such policy must include: 221 (d) Procedures, pursuant to s. 1002.20(3)(d), for a parent 222 to withdraw his or her minor child from any portion of the 223 school district's comprehensive health education required under s. 1003.42(2)(o) s. 1003.42(2)(n) that relates to sex education 224 225 or instruction in acquired immune deficiency syndrome education

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or any instruction regarding sexuality if the parent provides a written objection to his or her minor child's participation. Such procedures must provide for a parent to be notified in advance of such course content so that he or she may withdraw his or her minor child from those portions of the course.

(f) Procedures for a parent to learn about parental rights and responsibilities under general law, including all of the following:

1. Pursuant to s. 1002.20(3)(d), the right to opt his or her minor child out of any portion of the school district's comprehensive health education required under <u>s. 1003.42(2)(o)</u> s. 1003.42(2)(n) that relates to sex education instruction in acquired immune deficiency syndrome education or any instruction regarding sexuality.

240 2. A plan to disseminate information, pursuant to s.
241 1002.20(6), about school choice options, including open
242 enrollment.

3. In accordance with s. 1002.20(3)(b), the right of aparent to exempt his or her minor child from immunizations.

4. In accordance with s. 1008.22, the right of a parent toreview statewide, standardized assessment results.

5. In accordance with s. 1003.57, the right of a parent to enroll his or her minor child in gifted or special education programs.

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6. In accordance with s. 1006.28(2)(a)1., the right of a

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251 parent to inspect school district instructional materials.

252 7. In accordance with s. 1008.25, the right of a parent to 253 access information relating to the school district's policies 254 for promotion or retention, including high school graduation 255 requirements.

8. In accordance with s. 1002.20(14), the right of a parent to receive a school report card and be informed of his or her minor child's attendance requirements.

9. In accordance with s. 1002.23, the right of a parent to access information relating to the state public education system, state standards, report card requirements, attendance requirements, and instructional materials requirements.

10. In accordance with s. 1002.23(4), the right of a parent to participate in parent-teacher associations and organizations that are sanctioned by a district school board or the Department of Education.

267 11. In accordance with s. 1002.222(1)(a), the right of a 268 parent to opt out of any district-level data collection relating 269 to his or her minor child not required by law.

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Section 4. This act shall take effect July 1, 2023.

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
