A bill to be entitled

An act relating to implicit bias training; amending s.
943.1716, F.S.; requiring the Criminal Justice

Standards and Training Commission to include specified implicit bias training in instruction related to dealing with diverse populations; amending s. 1000.05,

F.S.; requiring the State Board of Education to develop requirements for training for all K-12 instructional personnel and administrators in recognizing and overcoming implicit bias; requesting that the Supreme Court develop training requirements for judges in recognizing and overcoming implicit bias; providing an effective date.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. Section 943.1716, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

943.1716 Continued employment training relating to diverse populations.—

(1) The commission shall by rule require that each officer receive, as part of the 40 hours of required instruction for continued employment or appointment as an officer, instruction in the subject of interpersonal skills relating to diverse populations, with an emphasis on the awareness of cultural

(2) The training required by this section must include instruction in recognizing and overcoming implicit bias, which is the unconscious and often subtle associations made between groups of people and stereotypes about those groups. This training shall be based on the Fair and Impartial Policing model.

Section 2. Subsection (8) of section 1000.05, Florida Statutes, is renumbered as subsection (9), and a new subsection (8) is added to that section, to read:

1000.05 Discrimination against students and employees in the Florida K-20 public education system prohibited; equality of access required.—

(8) By July 1, 2021, the State Board of Education shall develop requirements for training for all public K-12 instructional personnel and administrators in recognizing and overcoming implicit bias, which is the unconscious and often subtle associations made between groups of people and stereotypes about those groups.

Section 3. The Legislature requests that the Supreme Court adopt rules that require judges to receive training in recognizing and overcoming implicit bias, which is the unconscious and often subtle associations made between groups of people and stereotypes about those groups.

Section 4. This act shall take effect July 1, 2020.

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
