Paragraph (b) of subsection (3) of section 40 1003.4282, Florida Statutes, is amended to read: 41 1003.4282 Requirements for a standard high school diploma.-42 43 STANDARD HIGH SCHOOL DIPLOMA; COURSE AND ASSESSMENT (3) 44 REQUIREMENTS .-45 Four credits in mathematics.-A student must earn one (b) 46 credit in Algebra I and one credit in Geometry. A student's 47 performance on the statewide, standardized Algebra I end-of-48 course (EOC) assessment constitutes 30 percent of the student's 49 final course grade. A student must pass the statewide, 50 standardized Algebra I EOC assessment, or earn a comparative Page 2 of 16

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51 score, in order to earn a standard high school diploma. A 52 student's performance on the statewide, standardized Geometry 53 EOC assessment constitutes 30 percent of the student's final 54 course grade. If the state administers a statewide, standardized 55 Algebra II assessment, a student selecting Algebra II must take 56 the assessment, and the student's performance on the assessment 57 constitutes 30 percent of the student's final course grade. A 58 student who earns an industry certification for which there is a 59 statewide college credit articulation agreement approved by the 60 State Board of Education may substitute the certification for one mathematics credit. Substitution may occur for up to two 61 62 mathematics credits, except for Algebra I and Geometry.

66 (1) Each standard high school diploma shall include, as

71 student must satisfy the following requirements:

1. Mathematics.—Earn one credit in Algebra II and one credit in statistics or an equally rigorous course. Beginning with students entering grade 9 in the 2014-2015 school year,

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75 pass the Algebra II and Geometry statewide, standardized 76 assessment assessments.

77 2. Science.-Pass the statewide, standardized Biology I EOC 78 assessment and earn one credit in chemistry or physics and one 79 credit in a course equally rigorous to chemistry or physics. 80 However, a student enrolled in an Advanced Placement (AP), 81 International Baccalaureate (IB), or Advanced International 82 Certificate of Education (AICE) Biology course who takes the respective AP, IB, or AICE Biology assessment and earns the 83 84 minimum score necessary to earn college credit as identified pursuant to s. 1007.27(2) meets the requirement of this 85 86 subparagraph without having to take the statewide, standardized 87 Biology I EOC assessment.

88 3. Social studies.-Pass the statewide, standardized United 89 States History EOC assessment. However, a student enrolled in an AP, IB, or AICE course that includes United States History 90 91 topics who takes the respective AP, IB, or AICE assessment and 92 earns the minimum score necessary to earn college credit as 93 identified pursuant to s. 1007.27(2) meets the requirement of 94 this subparagraph without having to take the statewide, 95 standardized United States History EOC assessment.

96 4. Foreign language.-Earn two credits in the same foreign97 language.

98 5. Electives.-Earn at least one credit in an Advanced
99 Placement, an International Baccalaureate, an Advanced

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100 International Certificate of Education, or a dual enrollment 101 course.

1008.22 Student assessment program for public schools.-

112 STATEWIDE, STANDARDIZED ASSESSMENT PROGRAM.-The (3) 113 Commissioner of Education shall design and implement a 114 statewide, standardized assessment program aligned to the core curricular content established in the Next Generation Sunshine 115 116 State Standards. The commissioner also must develop or select 117 and implement a common battery of assessment tools that will be 118 used in all juvenile justice education programs in the state. 119 These tools must accurately measure the core curricular content 120 established in the Next Generation Sunshine State Standards. 121 Participation in the assessment program is mandatory for all school districts and all students attending public schools, 122 including adult students seeking a standard high school diploma 123 124 under s. 1003.4282 and students in Department of Juvenile

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Justice education programs, except as otherwise provided by law. If a student does not participate in the assessment program, the school district must notify the student's parent and provide the parent with information regarding the implications of such nonparticipation. The statewide, standardized assessment program shall be designed and implemented as follows:

131 (a) Statewide, standardized comprehensive assessments.-The 132 statewide, standardized Reading assessment shall be administered 133 annually in grades 3 through 10. The statewide, standardized 134 Writing assessment shall be administered annually at least once at the elementary, middle, and high school levels. When the 135 136 Reading and Writing assessments are replaced by English Language 137 Arts (ELA) assessments, ELA assessments shall be administered to 138 students in grades 3 through 10. Retake opportunities for the 139 grade 10 Reading assessment or, upon implementation, the grade 10 ELA assessment must be provided. Students taking the ELA 140 141 assessments shall not take the statewide, standardized 142 assessments in Reading or Writing. ELA assessments shall be 143 administered online. The statewide, standardized Mathematics assessments shall be administered annually in grades 3 through 144 145 8. Students taking a revised Mathematics assessment shall not take the discontinued assessment. The statewide, standardized 146 147 Science assessment shall be administered annually at least once at the elementary and middle grades levels. In order to earn a 148 149 standard high school diploma, a student who has not earned a

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passing score on the grade 10 Reading assessment or, upon implementation, the grade 10 ELA assessment must earn a passing score on the assessment retake or earn a concordant score as authorized under subsection (9) (8).

(b) End-of-course (EOC) assessments.-EOC assessments must
be statewide, standardized, and developed or approved by the
Department of Education as follows:

157 1. EOC assessments for Algebra I, Geometry, Algebra II, 158 Biology I, United States History, and Civics shall be 159 administered to students enrolled in such courses as specified 160 in the course code directory.

161 2. Students enrolled in a course, as specified in the 162 course code directory, with an associated statewide, 163 standardized EOC assessment must take the EOC assessment for 164 such course and may not take the corresponding subject or grade-165 level statewide, standardized assessment pursuant to paragraph 166 (a). Sections 1003.4156 and 1003.4282 govern the use of 167 statewide, standardized EOC assessment results for students.

3. The commissioner may select one or more nationally developed comprehensive examinations, which may include examinations for a College Board Advanced Placement course, International Baccalaureate course, or Advanced International Certificate of Education course, or industry-approved examinations to earn national industry certifications identified in the CAPE Industry Certification Funding List, for use as EOC

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175 assessments under this paragraph if the commissioner determines 176 that the content knowledge and skills assessed by the 177 examinations meet or exceed the grade-level expectations for the 178 core curricular content established for the course in the Next 179 Generation Sunshine State Standards. Use of any such examination 180 as an EOC assessment must be approved by the state board in 181 rule.

182 4. Contingent upon funding provided in the General 183 Appropriations Act, including the appropriation of funds 184 received through federal grants, the commissioner may establish an implementation schedule for the development and 185 186 administration of additional statewide, standardized EOC 187 assessments that must be approved by the state board in rule. If 188 approved by the state board, student performance on such 189 assessments constitutes 30 percent of a student's final course 190 grade.

191 5. All statewide, standardized EOC assessments must be
192 administered online except as otherwise provided in paragraph
193 (c).

(d) <u>Computer-based assessments.-Implementation schedule.</u>
 1. The Commissioner of Education shall establish and
 publish on the department's website an implementation schedule
 to transition from the statewide, standardized Reading and
 Writing assessments to the ELA assessments and to the revised
 Mathematics assessments, including the Algebra I and Geometry

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EOC assessments. The schedule must take into consideration
funding, sufficient field and baseline data, access to
assessments, instructional alignment, and school district
readiness to administer the assessments online. All such
statewide, standardized assessments, including statewide end-of-
<u>course</u> assessments <u>,</u> must be <del>delivered through computer-based</del>
testing, however, the following assessments must be delivered in
a computer-based format; however, beginning with the 2018-2019
school year, statewide, standardized ELA and mathematics
assessments for grades 3 through 6 must be delivered in a paper-
based format only, as follows: the grade 3 ELA assessment,
beginning in the 2017-2018 school year; the grade 3 Mathematics
assessment beginning in the 2016-2017 school year; the grade 4
ELA assessment, beginning in the 2015-2016 school year; and the
grade 4 Mathematics assessment, beginning in the 2016-2017
school year.
2. The Department of Education shall publish minimum and
recommended technology requirements that include specifications
for hardware, software, networking, security, and broadband
capacity to facilitate school district compliance with the

(7) ASSESSMENT SCHEDULES AND REPORTING OF RESULTS
(a) The Commissioner of Education shall establish

224 schedules for the administration of statewide, standardized

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225 assessments and the reporting of student assessment results. The 226 commissioner shall consider the observance of religious and 227 school holidays when developing the schedules. The assessment 228 and reporting schedules must provide the earliest possible 229 reporting of student assessment results to the school districts, 230 consistent with the requirements of paragraph (3)(g). Assessment 231 results for the statewide, standardized ELA and mathematics 232 assessments and all statewide, standardized EOC assessments must 233 be made available no later than the week of June 30 8, except 234 for results for the grade 3 statewide, standardized ELA 235 assessment, which must be made available no later than May 31 of 236 assessments administered in the 2014-2015 school year. School 237 districts shall administer statewide, standardized assessments 238 in accordance with the schedule established by the commissioner.

(C) 264 Beginning with the 2018-2019 school year, the spring 265 administration of the statewide, standardized assessments in 266 paragraphs (3)(a) and (b), excluding assessment retakes, must be 267 in accordance with the following schedule: 268 1. The grade 3 statewide, standardized ELA assessment, the 269 writing portion of the statewide, standardized ELA assessments, 270 and any statewide, standardized assessment delivered in a paper-271 based format must be administered no earlier than April 1 each year within an assessment window not to exceed 2 weeks. 272 273 2. With the exception of assessments identified in 274 subparagraph 1., any statewide, standardized assessment

349	developed by a third party independent of the assessment
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350 administrator, which must verify the suitability of assessment 351 results for annual student learning growth measures, and must 352 take into consideration each student's prior academic 353 performance. The commissioner shall provide schools access to 354 individual student learning growth data in a user-friendly 355 format that enables teachers to understand and evaluate the data 356 and school administrators to improve instruction, evaluate programs, allocate resources, plan professional development, and 357 358 communicate with stakeholders. The formula must not set 359 different expectations for student learning growth based upon a student's gender, race, ethnicity, or socioeconomic status. In 360 361 the development of the formula, the commissioner shall consider 362 other factors such as a student's attendance record, disability 363 status, or status as an English language learner. The 364 commissioner may select additional formulas to measure student 365 performance as appropriate for the remainder of the statewide, 366 standardized assessments included under s. 1008.22 and continue 367 to select formulas as new assessments are implemented in the 368 state system. After the commissioner approves the formula to 369 measure individual student learning growth, the State Board of 370 Education shall adopt these formulas in rule. 371 Section 5. The Commissioner of Education shall contract 372 for an independent study to determine whether the SAT and ACT 373 may be administered in lieu of the grade 10 statewide,

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standardized ELA assessment and the Algebra I end-of-course

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375 assessment for high school students consistent with federal 376 requirements under 20 U.S.C. s. 6311(b)(2)(H). The commissioner 377 shall submit a report containing the results of such review and 378 any recommendations to the Governor, the President of the 379 Senate, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and the 380 State Board of Education by January 1, 2018. 381 Section 6.
