17	Section 1. Subsections (4) and (5) of section 1006.07,
18	Florida Statutes, are reordered and amended, and subsection (6)

22	provide for the proper accounting for all students, for the

26	(5)(4) EMERGENCY DRILLS; EMERGENCY PROCEDURES
27	(a) Formulate and prescribe policies and procedures for
28	emergency lockdown drills and emergency evacuation drills for
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29 actual emergencies, including, but not limited to, fires, 30 natural disasters, and bomb threats, for all the public schools 31 of the district which comprise grades K-12. District school 32 board policies must shall include commonly used alarm system 33 responses for specific types of emergencies and verification by 34 each school that drills have been provided as required by law and fire protection codes. As used in this paragraph, the term 35 36 "evacuation drill" means an activity in which students and 37 faculty practice the safest and quickest way to evacuate a 38 school facility in case of an emergency in which evacuation is 39 generally the safest option, such as in the case of a fire. As 40 used in this paragraph, the term "lockdown drill" means an 41 activity in which students and faculty practice securing a 42 school facility or rooms within the facility in case of an 43 emergency in which hiding from a hostile danger is generally 44 deemed safer than evacuating the building, such as in the case 45 of a tornado or the presence of an armed person who is 46 threatening the safety of the students or employees of a school. 47 1. The policies and procedures must require that emergency 48 lockdown drills be conducted at least as often as emergency 49 evacuation drills. This subparagraph does not require an 50 increase in the total number of emergency drills conducted at a 51 school each year. 52 2. Local law enforcement officers or fire officials are 53 encouraged to participate in, and to review, at least one 54 emergency lockdown drill at each school each year. After a 55 drill, participating law enforcement officers or fire officials 56 are encouraged to submit recommendations to the school on how it

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57 can improve its safety procedures in case of an emergency 58 lockdown. 59 3. Each school shall designate the principal or a member 60 of its staff as the person responsible for overseeing a school's 61 emergency drills. Before an emergency drill is conducted, the 62 designated staff member shall review the appropriate, most 63 recent after-drill report required under subparagraph 4. After a drill is completed, the designated staff member 64 4. shall electronically submit to the school district an after-65 drill report that details the specific drill that was conducted. 66 67 Such report must include positive observations and 68 recommendations for improvement offered by the school or 69 participating law enforcement officers or fire officials, if 70 any. 71 (b) The district school board shall Establish model 72 emergency management and emergency preparedness procedures for 73 the following life-threatening emergencies: 74 Weapon-use and hostage situations. 1. Hazardous materials or toxic chemical spills. 75 2. 76 3. Weather emergencies, including hurricanes, tornadoes, 77 and severe storms. 78 4. Exposure as a result of a manmade emergency. 79 (4) (5) EDUCATIONAL SERVICES IN DETENTION FACILITIES.-Offer 80 educational services to minors who have not graduated from high 81 school and eligible students with disabilities under the age of 82 22 who have not graduated with a standard diploma or its 83 equivalent who are detained in a county or municipal detention facility, as defined in s. 951.23. 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85 must shall be based upon the estimated length of time the 86 student will be in the facility and the student's current level 87 of functioning. District school superintendents or their 88 designees shall be notified by the county sheriff or chief 89 correctional officer, or his or her designee, upon the 90 assignment of a student under the age of 21 to the facility. A cooperative agreement with the district school board and 91 92 applicable law enforcement units shall be developed to address 93 the notification requirement and the provision of educational services to these students. 94

95 SAFETY AND SECURITY BEST PRACTICES.-Use the Safety and (6) 96 Security Best Practices developed by the Office of Program 97 Policy Analysis and Government Accountability to conduct a self-98 assessment of the school districts' current safety and security 99 practices. Based on these self-assessment findings, the district 100 school superintendent shall provide recommendations to the district school board which identify strategies and activities 101 that the district school board should implement in order to 102 improve school safety and security. Annually Each district 103 104 school board must annually receive the self-assessment results 105 at a publicly noticed district school board meeting to provide 106 the public an opportunity to hear the district school board 107 members discuss and take action on the report findings. Each 108 district school superintendent shall report the self-assessment results and school board action to the commissioner within 30 109 110 days after the district school board meeting. 111 Section 2. This act shall take effect July 1, 2013.

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
