excluding costs associated with the provision of textbooks <u>and</u>

The State Board of Education and the Board of Governors shall include in the 201 202 policies, procedures, and guidelines adopted under subsection 203 (7) (4) certain limited exceptions to this notification 204 requirement for classes added after the notification deadline. 205 (7) (4) After receiving input from students, faculty,

206 <u>bookstores, and publishers,</u> the State Board of Education and the 207 Board of Governors each shall adopt <u>textbook and instructional</u> 208 <u>materials affordability</u> policies, procedures, and guidelines for

The policies, procedures, and guidelines shall <u>address</u> provide for the following:

215 (a) The establishment of deadlines for an instructor or 216 department to notify the bookstore of required and recommended 217 textbooks and instructional materials so that the bookstore may 218 verify availability, source lower cost options when practicable, explore alternatives with faculty when academically appropriate, 219 220 and maximize the availability of used textbooks and 221 instructional materials That textbook adoptions are made with 222 sufficient lead time to bookstores so as to confirm availability 223 of the requested materials and, where possible, ensure maximum 224 availability of used books.

225 (b) Confirmation by the course instructor or academic 226 department offering the course, before the textbook or 227 instructional materials adoption is finalized That, in the 228 textbook adoption process, of the intent to use all items 229 ordered, particularly each individual item sold as part of a 230 bundled package, is confirmed by the course instructor or the 231 academic department offering the course before the adoption is 232 finalized.

(e) <u>Participation by</u> That course instructors and academic
departments are encouraged to participate in the development,
adaptation, and review of open-access textbooks <u>and</u>
<u>instructional materials</u> and, in particular, open-access
textbooks <u>and instructional materials</u> for high-demand general
education courses.
