2 An act relating to quality cancer care and research; 3 creating s. 381.925, F.S.; providing legislative 4 intent and goals; establishing a Cancer Center of 5 Excellence Award for providers that excel in providing 6 cancer care and treatment in this state; requiring the 7 Florida Cancer Control and Research Advisory Council 8 and the Biomedical Research Advisory Council to each 9 select a certain number of members to form a joint committee to develop and periodically update 10 11 performance measures, a rating system, and a rating standard in accordance with specified criteria for 12 13 applicants to qualify for the award; requiring approval by both councils of the performance measures, 14 15 rating system, and rating standard developed by the 16 joint committee; providing minimum standards; 17 prohibiting members of the joint committee from being 18 compensated, but authorizing reimbursement for travel and other necessary expenses; authorizing a provider 19 20 to apply to the Department of Health for the award; requiring the joint committee to develop an 21 22 application form; requiring the department to conduct 23 two application cycles each year; specifying that ch. 24 120, F.S., does not apply to the applications for or 25 the award of the grant by the State Surgeon General; 26 requiring the State Surgeon General to assemble an evaluation team to assess applications; requiring each 27 28 application to be evaluated independently of any other

"Bill" Bankhead, Jr., and David 66 Coley Cancer Research Program; amending s. 1004.435, 67 68 F.S.; revising the responsibilities of the Florida 69 Cancer Control and Research Advisory Council with 70 regard to the Cancer Center of Excellence Award 71 program; providing an effective date. 72 73 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida: 74 75 Section 381.925, Florida Statutes, is created Section 1. 76 to read: 77 381.925 Cancer Center of Excellence Award.-78 (1)The Legislature intends to recognize hospitals, 79 treatment centers, and other providers in this state which 80 demonstrate excellence in patient-centered coordinated care for 81 persons undergoing cancer treatment and therapy in this state. 82 The goal of this program is to encourage excellence in cancer 83 care in this state, attract and retain the best cancer care 84 providers to the state, and help Florida providers be recognized

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85 nationally as a preferred destination for quality cancer care. 86 The Cancer Center of Excellence Award will recognize providers 87 that exceed service standards and excel in providing quality, 88 comprehensive, and patient-centered coordinated care. 89 The Florida Cancer Control and Research Advisory (2) 90 Council, established in s. 1004.435, and the Biomedical Research 91 Advisory Council, established in s. 215.5602, shall select seven 92 members and six members, respectively, to form a joint 93 committee. 94 (a) The joint committee, consisting of 13 members, shall: 95 1. By January 1, 2014, develop rigorous performance 96 measures, a rating system, and a rating standard that must be 97 achieved to document and distinguish a cancer center that excels 98 in providing quality, comprehensive, and patient-centered 99 coordinated care. 2. Review at least every 3 years, and revise if 100 101 applicable, the performance measures, rating system, and rating 102 standard to ensure providers are continually enhancing their 103 programs to reflect best practices and advances in cancer 104 treatment and care from the perspective of quality, 105 comprehensive and patient-centered coordinated care. 106 3. Submit its proposed performance measures, rating 107 system, and rating standard to the Florida Cancer Control and 108 Research Advisory Council and the Biomedical Research Advisory 109 Council to be approved by both councils prior to the evaluation 110 of any provider under such criteria.

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111 The criteria established by the joint committee must (b) 112 require, at a minimum, that each hospital, treatment center, or 113 other provider: 114 1. Maintain a license in this state which authorizes 115 health care services to be provided. A provider may not have 116 been disciplined or subjected to any administrative enforcement 117 action by state or federal regulatory authorities within the 118 preceding 3 years. 119 2. Be accredited by the Commission on Cancer of the 120 American College of Surgeons. 121 3. Actively participate in at least one regional cancer 122 control collaborative that is operating pursuant to the Florida 123 Comprehensive Cancer Control Program's cooperative agreement 124 with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's National 125 Comprehensive Cancer Control Program. 126 4. Demonstrate excellence in and dissemination of 127 scientifically rigorous cancer research. 128 5. Integrate training and education of biomedical 129 researchers and health care professionals. 130 Meet enhanced cancer care coordination standards which, 6. 131 at a minimum, focus on: 132 a. Coordination of care by cancer specialists and nursing 133 and allied health professionals. 134 b. Psychosocial assessment and services. 135 c. Suitable and timely referrals and followup. 136 d. Providing accurate and complete information on 137 treatment options, including clinical trials, which consider 138 each person's needs, preferences, and resources, whether

| 152 | (d) The Department of Health shall provide such staff, |
| 153 | information, and other assistance as is reasonably necessary to |
| 154 | assist the joint committee in carrying out its responsibilities. |
| 155 | (3)(a) A provider may apply to the Department of Health |
| 156 | for a Cancer Center of Excellence Award. The joint committee |
| 157 | must develop an application form to be used by the Department of |
| 158 | Health that requires, among other things, submission of |
| 159 | documentation by the provider which demonstrates that the |
| 160 | criteria in subsection (2) have been met. |
| 161 | (b) After January 1, 2014, the Department of Health shall |
| 162 | annually conduct two application cycles. The applications are |
| 163 | not applications for licensure, the grant of the award by the |
| 164 | State Surgeon General is not final agency action, and the Cancer |
| 165 | Center of Excellence Award program is not subject to the |

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| 167 | (4)(a) The State Surgeon General shall appoint a team of |

| 184 | (b) Each evaluator must be independent and free of any |

| 187 | participate on the evaluation team must sign a conflict of |
| 188 | interest attestation before being appointed to the evaluation |
| 189 | team. |
| 190 | (5)(a) Two evaluation team members may, as necessary, |
| 191 | conduct an onsite evaluation to verify submitted application |
| 192 | documentation. |
| 193 | (b) Each member on the evaluation team shall report to the |
| 194 | State Surgeon General those applicants that achieved or exceeded |
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195 the required score based on the rating system developed in 196 subsection (2) which demonstrates the cancer center excels in providing quality, comprehensive, and patient-centered 197 198 coordinated care. 199 The State Surgeon General shall, after consultation (C) 200 with the evaluation team, determine if the review process was 201 objective and consistent to ensure a fair and high quality 202 evaluation process, and grant the awards. 203 The State Surgeon General shall notify the Governor of (6) 204 which providers have been granted the Cancer Center of 205 Excellence Award by the State Surgeon General. 206 The award shall be recognized for a period of 3 years (7) 207 after the date of the award. A provider may reapply for 208 subsequent awards. 209 (8) A provider that receives a Cancer Center of Excellence Award may use the designation in its advertising and marketing 210 211 for up to 3 years after the date of the award. In addition, a 212 provider that receives a Cancer Center of Excellence Award may 213 be granted, for 3 years after the date of the award, a 214 preference in competitive solicitations related to cancer care 215 or research undertaken by a state agency or state university. 216 (9) The State Surgeon General shall report to the 217 President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of 218 Representatives by January 31, 2014, the status of implementing 219 the Cancer Center of Excellence Award program, and by December 220 15 annually thereafter, the number of applications received, the 221 number of award recipients by application cycle, a list of award 222 recipients, and recommendations to strengthen the program.

267 (12) (a) Beginning in the 2011-2012 fiscal year and 268 thereafter, \$25 million from the revenue deposited into the 269 Health Care Trust Fund pursuant to ss. 210.011(9) and 210.276(7) 270 shall be reserved for research of tobacco-related or cancer-271 related illnesses. 287 Beginning July 1, 2014, funds appropriated to entities (C) 288 listed in paragraph (b) and any other entity that performs or is 289 associated with cancer research or care that receives a specific 290 appropriation for biomedical research, research-related 291 functions, operations or other supportive functions, or expansion of operations in the General Appropriations Act must 292 293 submit an annual fiscal-year progress report to the President of 294 the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives by 295 December 15. 327 (4) In order to attract and retain experienced research 328 talent and attendant national grant-producing researchers to 329 integrated cancer research and care institutions in this state, 330 the Department of Health may award only one endowment per 331 integrated cancer research and care institution that applies, on 332 a form developed by the department, for an endowed research

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333 chair grant. The endowment for the research chair is subject to 334 a specific appropriation for this purpose in the General 335 Appropriations Act. The funds used for such purpose must be 336 independent of funds appropriated pursuant to s. 215.5602(12). A 337 recipient of endowed research chair funds is required to place 338 the funds in an interest-bearing account and the interest must 339 be added to the principal balance of the endowment. The 340 endowments are to be used to provide secure funding for research 341 chairs for at least 7 years and to attract experienced and 342 promising researchers whose continued employment for this period 343 is not contingent upon grant awards associated with time-limited 344 research projects. In addition, the Legislature intends for the 345 research chairs to specialize in a cancer-related research field 346 that will facilitate coordination among research institutions 347 within the state, attract other promising researchers and 348 funding to the state, and assist in the sharing of knowledge, 349 resources, and facilities to spur initiatives that facilitate 350 commercialization of scientific or technological advancements 351 related to cancer research. 352 Upon selection of an endowed research chair, the (a) 353 institution shall notify the chairs of the appropriations 354 committees of the Senate and the House of Representatives. An 355 institution funded pursuant to this subsection shall provide to 356 the Governor, the President of the Senate, and the Speaker of 357 the House of Representatives an annual progress report by 358 December 15 that must, at a minimum: 359 1. Describe the research program or institution receiving 360 the endowed research chair funds.

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361 2. Identify the endowed research chair's name. 362 3. Indicate the amount of the endowment funds used for the chair's salary. 363 364 State the endowment balance, expenditures, interest 4. 365 rate, and interest earned. 366 5. Describe the general responsibilities of the researcher 367 who is to be selected for the endowed research chair. 368 Identify the percentage of time devoted to research and 6. 369 research-related activities if the endowed research chair also 370 serves as a member of the faculty. 371 7. Describe the status of recruitment activities and 372 identify any barriers to attracting promising researchers to the 373 state. 374 8. Identify any federal or private grants or donations 375 generated as a result of the endowed research chair's efforts. 376 9. Describe initiatives that spur the sharing of 377 knowledge, facilities, and resources and facilitate 378 commercialization of scientific or technological advancements 379 related to cancer research. 380 (b) If an institution must replace an endowed research 381 chair, the endowment must cease funding expenses associated with 382 the endowed research chair, other than reasonable costs for recruitment, until a replacement chair has been retained. While 383 384 the endowed research chair is vacant, the endowment must 385 continue to earn interest and all earnings must be added to the 386 balance of the endowment. A vacancy tolls the 7-year timeframe 387 for the endowed research chair.
