The House Committee on Education offers the following Substitute to HB 1131:

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT

- 1 To amend Part 3 of Article 16 of Chapter 2 of Title 20 of the Official Code of Georgia
- 2 Annotated, relating to health of students in elementary and secondary education, so as to
- 3 provide for evidence based suicide awareness and training programs and a state-wide
- 4 anonymous reporting program; to provide for a definition; to provide for evidence based
- 5 youth violence prevention training programs; to provide for student violence prevention

8 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF GEORGIA:

9 SECTION 1.

- 10 Part 3 of Article 16 of Chapter 2 of Title 20 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated,
- 11 relating to health of students in elementary and secondary education, is amended by revising
- 12 Code Section 20-2-779.1, relating to suicide prevention and awareness training and no duty
- 13 of care imposed, as follows:
- 14 "20-2-779.1.
- 15 (a) As used in this Code section, the term 'evidence based' means a program or practice
- 16 that:

- 17 (1) Demonstrates a statistically significant effect on relevant outcomes based on:
- 18 (A) Strong evidence from at least one well-designed and well-implemented
- 19 <u>experimental study;</u>
- 20 (B) Moderate evidence from at least one well-designed and well-implemented
- 21 <u>quasi-experimental study; or</u>
- 22 (C) Promising evidence from at least one well-designed and well-implemented
- 23 correlational study with statistical controls for selection bias; or
- 24 (2) Demonstrates a rationale based on high-quality research findings or positive
- evaluation that such program or practice is likely to improve relevant outcomes, and
- 26 <u>includes ongoing efforts to examine the effects of such program or practice.</u>
- 27 (a)(1)(b) The Department State Board of Education shall adopt rules to require that:
- 28 (1) All all certificated public school personnel receive annual training in suicide
- awareness and prevention. This training shall be provided within the framework of
- existing in-service training programs offered by the Department of Education or as part
- of required professional development offered by a local school system;

- 45 (2)(c)(1) The Department of Education shall, in consultation with the Department of

- a list of approved evidence based training materials to fulfill the requirements of this
- paragraph (1) of subsection (a) of this Code section which may include training materials
- currently being used by a local school system if such training materials meet any criteria
- established by the department. <u>Such materials shall include training on how to identify</u>
- 52 appropriate mental health services, both within the school and also within the larger

- 61 (2) By January 1, 2025, the Department of Education shall, in consultation with the

- 63 Prevention Program established pursuant to Code Section 37-1-27, develop and post a list
- of approved evidence based training materials, including no-cost programming, if any,
- 65 to fulfill the requirements of paragraph (2) of subsection (b) of this Code section. Such
- materials shall, at a minimum, do the following:

- 75 <u>fulfill the requirements of paragraph (3) of subsection (b). Such materials shall, at a</u>

- 77 (A) How to recognize the observable warning signs and signals of persons who may
- be at risk of harming themselves or others;
- 79 (B) The importance of taking threats seriously and seeking help; and
- 80 (C) The steps that can be taken to report dangerous, violent, threatening, harmful, or
- 81 <u>potentially harmful behavior.</u>
- 82 (4)(A) The Department of Education shall make the lists of approved evidence based
- 83 <u>training materials required under this subsection, including no-cost programming, if</u>
- 84 any, publicly available on its website.
- 85 (B) The Department of Education shall keep the list of approved evidence based
- 86 training materials timely updated by reviewing such list, at a minimum, every 36
- months.
- 88 (5) To assist public schools and local school systems in developing their own policies
- 89 for student suicide awareness and prevention as provided for in this subsection, the
- 90 <u>Department of Education, in consultation with the Department of Behavioral Health and</u>
- 91 <u>Developmental Disabilities and the Suicide Prevention Program established pursuant to</u>

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97 program shall, at a minimum: 98 (i) Be accessible by any person to report anonymously a dangerous, violent, 99 threatening, harmful, or potentially harmful activity which occurs on, or is threatened to occur on, school property or which relates to a student or school personnel; 100 (ii) Provide support 24 hours per day, seven days per week for anonymous reporting 101 102 through, at a minimum, a mobile telephone application and a multilingual crisis 103 center, which shall be staffed by individuals with evidence based counseling and 104 crisis intervention training; (iii) Promptly forward reported information to the appropriate school based team; 105 (iv) Support a coordinated response to an identified crisis by schools, local 106 emergency 9-1-1 public safety answering points, and local law enforcement agencies 107 when response by schools and law enforcement is to be reasonably expected; 108 109 (v) Require and certify the training of school based teams in each school to receive 110 notice of any report submitted to the state-wide anonymous reporting program concerning the school, a student, or school personnel; 111 112 (vi) Require and certify the training of local emergency 9-1-1 public safety answering point personnel to receive notice of any report submitted to the state-wide anonymous 113 reporting program that requires response from a local law enforcement agency: 114 (vii) Promote public awareness and education about the state-wide anonymous 115 116 reporting program and its reporting methods, prior to its launch; and (viii) Comply with all federal and state laws. 117 (B)(i) In the first year in which the state-wide anonymous reporting program is 118 implemented, the Department of Education shall require all school systems to submit 119 a report on the total number of disciplinary actions in the previous 12 months, 120 disaggregated by school, type of disciplinary action, as well as the gender and race of 121 the student subject to the disciplinary action. 122

123	(ii) Each year following implementation of the state-wide anonymous reporting
124	program, the Department of Education shall require all school systems to submit

138	(i) A designated point of contact within each local emergency 9-1-1 public safety

140	(ii) A designated point of contact within each school in this state, who shall be

142	(D) The Department of Education shall operate, or contract with a provider to operate,

144	(i) A website to educate students on the availability of the state-wide anonymous
145	reporting program and which provides guidance on how and when to use such

147	(ii) A toll-free telephone hotline that can be used to provide anonymous tips
148	regarding dangerous violent threatening harmful or notentially harmful activity

(5)(A)(d)(1) Each local school system board of education or public school governing 151 152 body shall: 153 (A) Adopt policies, rules, and regulations adopt a policy on student suicide awareness and prevention. Such policies, rules, and regulations shall be developed in 154 155 consultation with school and community stakeholders, school employed mental health 156 professionals, and suicide prevention experts, and shall, at a minimum, address procedures relating to suicide prevention, intervention, and postvention: 157 (B) Adopt policies, rules, and regulations for providing relevant and current 158 information to students and their families and to school personnel regarding publicly 159 available resources for the anonymous reporting of a dangerous, violent, threatening, 160 harmful, or potentially harmful activity which occurs on, or is threatened to occur on, 161 162 school property or which relates to a student or school personnel; 163 (C) Adopt policies, rules, and regulations for the implementation of the state-wide anonymous reporting program provided for in paragraph (6) of subsection (c) of this 164 165 Code section; and 166 (D) Implement an evidence based youth violence prevention training program to instruct students how to recognize the observable warning signs and signals of someone 167 who may be at risk of harming himself, herself, or others; the importance of taking 168 threats seriously and seeking help; and how to report someone who is at risk, including 169 170 by using the state-wide anonymous reporting program. 171 (2) Each local board of education or public school governing body shall require each 172 public school that sponsors or otherwise permits student organizations or clubs to 173 designate a student-led youth violence prevention club to sustain awareness activities 174 related to suicide prevention and violence prevention. Such student violence prevention club, including existing clubs, shall: 175

176	(A) Be open to all members of the student body;
177	(B) Engage in awareness activities related to youth suicide prevention, youth violence
178	prevention, and social inclusion;
179	(C) Foster opportunities for student leadership development; and
180	(D) Have at least one administrator, teacher, or other school personnel serve as a
181	faculty advisor. (B) To assist local school systems in developing their own policies for
182	student suicide prevention, the Department of Education, in consultation with the
183	Suicide Prevention Program within the Department of Behavioral Health and
184	Developmental Disabilities, shall establish a model policy for use by local school
185	systems in accordance with this Code section.
186	(b)(e) No person shall have a cause of action for any loss or damage caused by any act or
187	omission resulting from the implementation of the provisions of this Code section or
188	resulting from any training, or lack thereof, required by this Code section.
189	(e)(f) The training, or lack thereof, required by the provisions of this Code section shall
190	not be construed to impose any specific duty of care."

191 **SECTION 2.**

192 This Act shall become effective on July 1, 2024.

193 **SECTION 3.**

194 All laws and parts of laws in conflict with this Act are repealed.
