A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT

To amend Chapter 33 of Title 43 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to
 physical therapists, so as to revise provisions regarding granting licenses and disciplining
 licensees; to provide for related matters; to repeal conflicting laws; and for other purposes.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF GEORGIA:

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SECTION 1.

6 Chapter 33 of Title 43 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to physical
7 therapists, is amended in Code Section 43-33-18, relating to refusal to grant or restore
8 licenses, discipline of licensees, suspension, revocation, or restriction of licenses, and
9 immunity for violation reporters, by revising subsection (a) as follows:

"(a) The board shall have authority to refuse to grant or restore a license to an applicant or
to discipline a physical therapist licensed under this article upon a finding by the board that
the licensee or applicant has:

- (1) Identified himself or herself as a doctor without also clearly informing the public of
 his or her professional credential as a physical therapist;
- 15 (2) Performed physical therapy care and services without examination and evaluation of 16 patients or clients in order to determine a physical therapy diagnosis, prognosis, and plan

of intervention, which, in the case of patients who have self-referred, means the physicaltherapist has:

19 (A) Failed to refer the patient to an individual licensed pursuant to Article 2 of Chapter 11 of Title 43 or Article 2 of Chapter 34 of Title 43 if at any time the physical 20 21 therapist has reason to believe that the patient has symptoms or conditions that require 22 treatment beyond the scope of practice of the physical therapist or, regardless of the 23 patient's condition, if after 21 days or eight visits from the initiation of a physical 24 therapy plan of intervention, the physical therapist has not received a referral from the 25 patient's provider who is licensed pursuant to Article 2 of Chapter 11 of Title 43 or 26 Article 2 of Chapter 34 of Title 43. The day and visit limitations contained in this 27 subparagraph shall not apply:

(i) In the case of services provided for health promotion, wellness, fitness, or
maintenance purposes, in which case the physical therapist shall refer a client seen for
health promotion, wellness, fitness, or maintenance purposes to an appropriate
individual licensed pursuant to Article 2 or 4 of Chapter 34 of Title 43 if the client
exhibits or develops signs and symptoms beyond the scope of practice of the physical
therapist;

34 (ii) In the case of a patient diagnosed within the previous nine months with a
 35 neuromuscular or developmental condition when the evaluation, treatment, or services
 36 are being provided for problems or symptoms associated with that previously
 37 diagnosed condition; or

38 (iii) In the case of a patient diagnosed within the previous 90 days with a chronic
 39 musculoskeletal condition and noted by a current relevant document from an
 40 appropriate licensed health care provider; or

41 (B) Ordered radiology, performed surgery, ordered laboratory or body fluid testing,
42 diagnosed disease, or practiced medicine; or

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43	(C) Failed to provide each self-referred patient with a written disclosure that a physical
44	therapy diagnosis is not a medical diagnosis by a physician or based on radiological
45	imaging and that such services might not be covered by the patient's health plan or
46	insurer;
47	(D) Not satisfied the additional requirements for seeing a patient who has self-referred,
48	which shall include:
49	(i) A doctorate in physical therapy or equivalent degree from an accredited institution
50	plus two years of clinical practice experience;
51	(ii) A doctorate in physical therapy or equivalent and:
52	(I) Post graduate certification;
53	(II) American Board of Physical Therapy Specialties Board Certification; or
54	(III) Residency or fellowship training; or
55	(iii) Five years of clinical practice experience; or
56	(E) Performed dry needling treatment interventions without consulting an individual
57	licensed pursuant to Article 2 or 4 of Chapter 34 of Title 43; or
58	(3) Acted in a manner inconsistent with generally accepted standards of physical therapy
59	practice, regardless of whether actual injury to a patient occurs, or failed to provide the
60	expected minimal standard of patient or client management, which shall include that:
61	(A) A physical therapist is fully responsible for managing all aspects of the physical
62	therapy care of each patient. A physical therapist shall provide:
63	(i) The initial evaluation, determination of physical therapy diagnosis, prognosis, and
64	plan of intervention and documentation of the initial evaluation;
65	(ii) Periodic reevaluation and documentation of findings for each patient; and
66	(iii) The documented episode of care for each patient, including the patient's response
67	to the plan of intervention at the time of completion of the episode of care;
68	(B) A physical therapist shall assure the qualifications of all physical therapist
69	assistants and physical therapy aides under his or her direction and supervision;

(C) For each patient on each date of service, a physical therapist shall provide all of the
intervention that requires the education, skills, knowledge, and abilities of a physical
therapist;

(D) A physical therapist shall determine the use of physical therapist assistants and
 physical therapy aides to ensure the delivery of care that is safe, effective, and efficient.

A physical therapist may use physical therapy aides for designated routine tasks. A
 physical therapy aide shall work under the supervision of a physical therapist;

(E) A physical therapist shall communicate the overall plan of care with the patient or
the patient's legally authorized representative;

(F) A physical therapist's responsibility shall include accurate documentation andbilling of the services provided;

(G) A physical therapist shall adhere to the recognized standards for professional
conduct and code of ethics of the physical therapy profession as established by rule; and

- (H) A physical therapist shall ensure that he or she has liability coverage either
 independently or provided by the entity by which he or she is employed."
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SECTION 2.

86 All laws and parts of laws in conflict with this Act are repealed.
