A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT

To amend Title 16, Chapter 4 of Title 30, and Chapter 6 of Title 40 of the Official Code of 1 2 Georgia Annotated, relating to crimes and offenses, rights of persons with disabilities, and 3 uniform rules of the road, respectively, so as to change references to assistance and guide 4 dogs to service dogs; to provide for definitions and conforming changes; to provide for a 5 criminal penalty for a person who causes death or physical harm to a service dog; to provide 6 for exceptions; to revise provisions relating to the use and training of service dogs; to provide for a penalty for persons who misrepresent the need for a service dog; to provide for related 7 8 matters; to repeal conflicting laws; and for other purposes.

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BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF GEORGIA:

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SECTION 1.

Title 16 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to crimes and offenses, is amended in Chapter 11, relating to offenses against public order and safety, by revising Code Section 16-11-107.1, relating to harassment of assistance dog by humans or other dogs and penalty, as follows:

15 "16-11-107.1.

16 (a) As used in this Code section, the term:

17 (1) 'Assistance dog' means a dog that is or has been trained by a licensed or certified 18 person, organization, or agency to perform physical tasks for a physically challenged person. Assistance dogs include guide or leader dogs that guide individuals who are 19 legally blind; hearing dogs that alert individuals who are deaf or hard of hearing to 20 21 specific sounds; and service dogs for individuals with disabilities other than blindness or deafness, which are trained to perform a variety of physical tasks, including, but not 22 23 limited to, pulling a wheelchair, lending balance support, picking up dropped objects, or 24 providing assistance in a medical crisis.

(2) 'Harass' means to engage in any conduct directed toward an assistance <u>a service</u> dog
 that is knowingly likely to impede or interfere with the assistance <u>service</u> dog's
 performance of its duties or that places the <u>blind</u>, deaf, or physically limited physically
 or mentally impaired person being served or assisted by the <u>service</u> dog in danger of
 injury.

30 (3)(2) 'Notice' means an oral or otherwise communicated warning proscribing the
 31 behavior of another person and a request that the person stop the particular behavior.

32 (3) 'Service dog' shall have the same meaning as set forth in Code Section 30-4-1.

(b) Any person who knowingly and intentionally with criminal negligence harasses or
attempts to harass an assistance a service dog, knowing when he or she knows or should
<u>know</u> the dog to be an assistance a service dog, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon
conviction thereof, shall be punished by imprisonment for not less than 90 days or a fine
not to exceed \$500.00, or both.

(c) Any person who has received notice that his or her behavior is interfering with the use
of an assistance a service dog and who continues to knowingly and intentionally harass an
assistance the service dog, knowing the dog to be an assistance dog, shall be guilty of a
misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by imprisonment for not less
than 90 days or a fine not to exceed \$500.00, or both, provided that any person who is

43 convicted of a second or subsequent violation of this subsection shall be punished as for44 a misdemeanor of a high and aggravated nature.

(d) Any person who knowingly and intentionally with criminal negligence allows his or
her dog to harass an assistance a service dog, knowing when he or she knows or should
know the dog to be an assistance a service dog, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon
conviction thereof, shall be punished by imprisonment for not less than 90 days or a fine
not to exceed \$500.00, or both, provided that any person who is convicted of a second or
subsequent violation of this subsection shall be punished as for a misdemeanor of a high
and aggravated nature.

(e) Any person who knowingly and intentionally with criminal negligence allows his or
her dog to cause death or physical harm to an assistance <u>a service</u> dog by rendering a part
of the assistance service dog's body useless or by seriously disfiguring the assistance
<u>service</u> dog, knowing when he or she knows or should know the dog to be an assistance <u>a</u>
<u>service</u> dog, shall be punished as for a misdemeanor of a high and aggravated nature.

57 (f) Any person who causes death or physical harm to a service dog by rendering a part of

58 the service dog's body useless or by seriously disfiguring the service dog, when he or she

59 knows or should know the dog to be a service dog, shall be guilty of a felony and, upon 60 conviction thereof, shall be punished by imprisonment for not less than one nor more than

(a) <u>Physically or mentally impaired Blind persons, persons with visual disabilities, persons</u>

119 (b)(1) Every totally or partially blind person shall have the right to be accompanied by a guide dog, and every physically disabled person and every deaf physically or mentally 120 121 impaired person shall have the right to be accompanied by a service dog, especially 122 trained for the purpose, in any of the places listed in subsection (a) of this Code section 123 without being required to pay an extra charge for the guide or service dog; provided, 124 however, that he or she shall be liable for any damage done to the premises or facilities 125 by such service dog. In addition, if such totally or partially blind person, physically 126 disabled person, or deaf physically or mentally impaired person is a student at a private 127 or public school in this state, such person shall have the right to be accompanied by a 128 guide dog or service dog subject to liability for damage as provided in the preceding sentence. The guide dog or service dog must be identified as having been trained by a 129 school for seeing eye, hearing, service, or guide dogs. 130

(2) Every person engaged in the training of a guide dog or service dog for the purpose 131 132 of accompanying a person as provided in paragraph (1) of this subsection shall have the same right to be accompanied by such service dog being trained as the totally or partially 133 134 blind person, deaf person, or physically disabled physically or mentally impaired person 135 has under paragraph (1) of this subsection, so long as such trainer is engaged in owner 136 training or is identified as an agent or employee of a school for seeing eye, hearing, 137 service, or guide service dogs.

- 191 <u>a service dog or train or raise service dogs for the purpose of obtaining accommodations</u>
- 192 or securing rights under this chapter shall be guilty of a misdemeanor of a high and
- 193 aggravated nature and, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine not to exceed
- 194 <u>\$2,000.00, imprisonment for not more than 30 days, or both.</u>"

All laws and parts of laws in conflict with this Act are repealed.

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
