#### A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT

To amend Code Section 48-8-3 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to 1 exemptions from sales and use tax, so as to suspend the issuance of new certificates of 2 3 exemption for certain high-technology data center equipment during a certain period; to 4 provide for an exception; to revise the new quality job requirement for such exemption; to 5 amend Chapter 7 of Title 50 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to the 6 Department of Economic Development, so as to create the Special Commission on Data 7 Center Energy Planning; to provide for membership and operation; to provide for powers and 8 duties; to provide for reporting; to provide for automatic repeal; to provide for related 9 matters; to provide for an effective date; to repeal conflicting laws; and for other purposes.

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#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF GEORGIA:

11	SECTION 1.
12	Code Section 48-8-3 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to exemptions from
13	sales and use tax, is amended by adding a new subparagraph to paragraph (68.1) and revising
14	division (68.1)(G)(vi) to read as follows:
15	"(A.1) For the period commencing on July 1, 2024, and ending on June 30, 2026,
16	unless otherwise provided by an Act of the General Assembly based on the findings of

17	the Special Commission on Data Center Energy Planning established pursuant to
18	Article 10 of Chapter 7 of Title 50, the commissioner shall suspend the issuance of any
19	new certificates of exemption pursuant to this paragraph, except for any
20	high-technology data center customer that is subject to an ongoing contract that was
21	entered into prior to July 1, 2024, with a high-technology data center that has applied
22	for a certificate of exemption pursuant to this paragraph prior to July 1, 2024."
23	"(vi) 'New quality jobs' shall have the same meaning as provided in paragraph (2) of
24	subsection (a) of Code Section 48-7-40.17 means employment for an individual
25	which:
26	(I) Is located in this state;
27	(II) Has a regular work week of 30 hours or more;
28	(III) Is not a job that is or was located in Georgia already, regardless of which
29	taxpayer employed the individual; and
30	(IV) Pays at or above 150 percent of the average wage of the county in which it is
31	located."
32	SECTION 2.
33	Chapter 7 of Title 50 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to the Department
34	of Economic Development, is amended by revising Article 10, which is reserved, to read as
35	follows:
36	"ARTICLE 10

38	(a) There is created the Special Commission on Data Center Energy Planning.
39	(b) The commission shall be composed of 14 members as follows:

40	(1) The Governor shall appoint three members, one of whom shall be a representative

42	Transmission, and one of whom shall be a member of an electric membership

45	(3) The President of the Senate shall appoint two members;
46	(4) The minority leader of the House of Representatives shall appoint one member;

59	(a) The commission may conduct meetings at such places and times as it deems necessary
60	or convenient to enable it to fully and effectively exercise its powers, perform its duties,
61	and accomplish the objectives and purposes of this article. The commission shall hold
62	meetings at the call of the chairperson.
63	(b) A quorum for transacting business shall be a majority of the members of the

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65	(c) Legislative members of the commission shall receive the allowances provided for in
66	Code Section 28-1-8. Nonlegislative members shall receive a daily expense allowance in
67	the amount specified in subsection (b) of Code Section 45-7-21 as well as the mileage or
68	transportation allowance authorized for state employees. Members of the commission who
69	are state officials, other than legislative members, or state employees shall receive no
70	compensation for their services on the commission, but shall be reimbursed for expenses
71	incurred by them in the performance of their duties as members of the commission in the
72	same manner as they are reimbursed for expenses in their capacities as state officials or
73	state employees. The funds necessary for the reimbursement of the expenses of state
74	officials, other than legislative members, and state employees shall come from funds
75	appropriated to or otherwise available to their respective departments. All other funds
76	necessary to carry out the provisions of this article shall come from funds appropriated to
77	the commission.

95	the Governor, the President of the Senate, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and

99	(a) The commission shall have the following powers:
100	(1) To authorize entering into contracts or agreements through the commission's
101	chairperson necessary or incidental to the performance of its duties;
102	(2) To establish rules and procedures for conducting the business of the commission;

104	(4) To request the attendance and testimony of such witnesses and the production of such
105	documents as the commission deems necessary to fulfill its duties.

111	The commission shall be abolished and this article shall stand repealed on June 30, 2026."
112	<b>SECTION 3.</b>
113	This Act shall become effective upon its approval by the Governor or upon its becoming law
114	without such approval.
