A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT

- 1 To amend Article 10 of Chapter 2 of Title 20, Title 36, and Part 1 of Article 3 of Chapter 5
- 2 of Title 50 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to contracts and purchases by
- 3 public schools, local government, and general authority, duties, and procedure relative to
- 4 government purchasing, respectively, so as to modify provisions relating to contractual and
- 5 purchasing preferences for Georgia service providers and certain supplies, materials,
- 6 equipment, and agricultural products grown, manufactured, or produced in this state; to
- 7 provide for a short title; to provide for related matters; to provide for an effective date and
- 8 applicability; to repeal conflicting laws; and for other purposes.

9 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF GEORGIA:

SECTION 1.

11 This Act shall be known and may be cited as the "Georgia Jobs Matter Act."

12 SECTION 2.

- 13 Article 10 of Chapter 2 of Title 20 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to
- 14 contracts and purchases by public schools, is amended by revising Code Section 20-2-500,
- 15 relating to promulgation of rules and regulations by the State Board of Education for
- 16 contracts or purchases over \$100,000.00, as follows:
- 17 "20-2-500.
- 18 (a)(1) Local boards of education shall provide that contracts for <u>services</u> or <u>for</u> purchases
- of supplies, materials, equipment, or agricultural products, including but not limited to
- school buses but not including instructional materials or beverages for immediate
- 21 consumption, for public elementary and secondary schools supported in whole or in part
- from public funds shall give preference as far as may be reasonable and practicable to
- such providers of services located in this state or employing Georgia residents and
- 24 <u>preference to</u> supplies, materials, equipment, and agricultural products as may be

available, manufactured, or produced in this state. Such preference shall not sacrifice
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- (2) Local boards of education shall provide that, in determining whether such a preference is reasonable in any case where the value of a contract for or purchase of such supplies, materials, equipment, or agricultural products exceeds \$100,000.00, the local school district shall consider, among other factors, information submitted by the bidder which may include the bidder's estimate of the multiplier effect on gross state domestic product and the effect on public revenues of the state and the effect on public revenues of political subdivisions resulting from acceptance of a bid or offer to sell Georgia manufactured or produced goods as opposed to out-of-state manufactured or produced goods. Any such estimates shall be in writing. No local school district shall divide a contract or purchase which exceeds \$100,000.00 for the purpose of avoiding the requirements of this paragraph. Local boards of education shall require that a local school system, when issuing a request for a competitive bid, shall state in such bid request and place the bidding contractors on notice that the school or school district shall consider information relating to the effects on employment within this state. No bid shall be considered unless accompanied by an employment impact statement which shall include:
- (A) The number of jobs expected to be created in this state or the number of jobs expected to be retained that might otherwise be lost if the contract is awarded to another contractor;
 - (B) The number of jobs expected to be created in this state or the number of jobs expected to be retained that might otherwise be lost if the contract is awarded to another contractor by the subcontractors expected to be used by the contractor in the performance of the contract; and
- (C) A guarantee from the contractor that, as a condition of such contract, the jobs
 created or retained in this state shall not be moved outside of this state during the
 duration of the contract.
- (3) The local school system considering bid proposals shall require from the bidder such
 information as needed to substantiate any claim by a bidder that jobs will be created or
 retained in this state.
- 56 (b) Vendors resident in the State of Georgia are to be granted the same preference over 57 vendors resident in another state in the same manner, on the same basis, and to the same 58 extent that preference is granted in awarding bids for the same goods or services by such 59 other state to vendors resident therein over vendors resident in the State of Georgia.
- 60 (c) Nothing in this Code section shall negate the requirements of Code Section 50-5-73."

SECTION 3.

62 Title 36 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to local government, is amended

- 63 by revising in its entirety Chapter 84, relating to purchasing preferences relative to provisions
- 64 applicable to counties, municipal corporations, and other governmental entities, as follows:

65 "CHAPTER 84

- 66 36-84-1.
- 67 (a) As used in this Code section, the term 'local government' means a county, municipality,
- or consolidated government.
- 69 (b) Local governments, when contracting for <u>services</u> or <u>for</u> purchasing supplies, materials,
- quipment, or agricultural products, excluding beverages for immediate consumption, shall
- 71 give preference as far as may be reasonable and practicable to providers of services located
- 72 <u>in this state or employing Georgia residents and preference</u> to such supplies, materials,
- equipment, and agricultural products as may be available, manufactured, or produced in
- this state. Such preference shall not sacrifice quality.
- 75 (c) In determining whether such a preference is reasonable in any case where the value of
- a contract for or purchase of such supplies, materials, equipment, or agricultural products
- 77 exceeds \$100,000.00, the local government shall consider, among other factors,
- 78 information submitted by the bidder which may include the bidder's estimate of the
- 79 multiplier effect on gross state domestic product and the effect on public revenues of the
- 80 state and the effect on public revenues of political subdivisions resulting from acceptance
- 81 of a bid or offer to sell Georgia manufactured or produced goods as opposed to out-of-state
- 82 manufactured or produced goods. Any such estimates shall be in writing. No local
- 83 government shall divide a contract or purchase which exceeds \$100,000.00 for the purpose
- 84 of avoiding the requirements of this subsection. When issuing a request for a competitive
- 85 <u>bid, a local government shall state in such bid request and place the bidding contractors on</u>
- 86 <u>notice that the local government receiving such bid shall consider information relating to</u>
- 87 <u>the effects on employment within this state.</u> No bid shall be considered unless
- 88 <u>accompanied by an employment impact statement which shall include:</u>
- 89 (1) The number of jobs expected to be created in this state should the bid be awarded to
- 90 the contractor and the number of jobs expected to be retained that might otherwise be lost
- 91 <u>if the contract is awarded to another contractor;</u>
- 92 (2) The number of jobs expected to be created in this state should the bid be awarded to
- 93 <u>the contractor or the number of jobs expected to be retained that might otherwise be lost</u>
- 94 <u>if the contract is awarded to another contractor by the subcontractors expected to be used</u>
- by the contractor in the performance of the contract; and

96 (3) A guarantee from the contractor that, as a condition of such contract, the jobs created 97 or retained in this state shall not be moved outside of this state during the duration of the

- 98 <u>contract.</u>
- 99 (d) The local government considering bid proposals shall require from the bidder such
- information as needed to substantiate any claim by a bidder that jobs will be created or
- retained in this state.
- 102 (d)(e) Nothing in this Code section shall negate the requirements of Code Section
- 103 50-5-73."

104 **SECTION 4.**

- Part 1 of Article 3 of Chapter 5 of Title 50 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated,
- relating to general authority, duties, and procedure relative to government purchasing, is
- amended by revising Code Section 50-5-60, relating to preference to supplies, equipment,
- materials, and printing produced in Georgia generally, as follows:
- 109 "50-5-60.
- 110 (a) The state and any department, agency, or commission thereof, when contracting for
- services or for purchasing supplies, materials, equipment, or agricultural products,
- excluding beverages for immediate consumption, shall give preference as far as may be
- reasonable and practicable to such providers of services located in this state or employing
- 114 Georgia residents and preference to supplies, materials, equipment, and agricultural
- products as may be <u>available</u>, manufactured, or produced in this state. Such preference
- shall not sacrifice quality.
- 117 (b) Vendors resident in the State of Georgia are to be granted the same preference over
- vendors resident in another state in the same manner, on the same basis, and to the same
- extent that preference is granted in awarding bids for the same goods or services by such
- other state, or by any local government of such state, to vendors resident therein over
- vendors resident in the State of Georgia.
- (c) In determining whether such a preference is reasonable in any case where the value of
- 123 a contract for or purchase of such supplies, materials, equipment, or agricultural products
- exceeds \$100,000.00, the state or its department, agency, or commission shall consider,
- among other factors, information submitted by the bidder which may include the bidder's
- estimate of the multiplier effect on gross state domestic product and the effect on public
- revenues of the state and the effect on public revenues of political subdivisions resulting
- from acceptance of a bid or offer to sell Georgia manufactured or produced goods as
- opposed to out-of-state manufactured or produced goods. Any such estimates shall be in
- writing. The state or its department, agency, or commission shall not divide a contract or
- purchase which exceeds \$100,000.00 for the purpose of avoiding the requirements of this

subsection. The state and any department, agency, or commission thereof, when issuing a request for a competitive bid, shall state in such bid request and place the bidding contractors on notice that such state, department, agency, or commission shall consider information relating to the effects on employment within this state. No bid shall be considered unless accompanied by an employment impact statement which shall include: (1) The number of jobs expected to be created in this state should the bid be awarded to the contractor and the number of jobs expected to be retained that might otherwise be lost if the contract is awarded to another contractor; (2) The number of jobs expected to be created in this state should the bid be awarded to the contractor or the number of jobs expected to be retained that might otherwise be lost if the contract is awarded to another contractor by the subcontractors expected to be used by the contractor in the performance of the contract; and (3) A guarantee from the contractor that, as a condition of such contract, the jobs created or retained in this state shall not be moved outside of this state during the duration of the 146 contract. (c) The state and any department, agency, or commission thereof considering bid proposals shall require from the bidder such information as needed to substantiate any claim by a bidder that jobs will be created or retained in this state. (d) Nothing in this Code section shall negate the requirements of Code Section 50-5-7."

151 **SECTION 5.**

Said part is further amended by revising Code Section 50-5-61, relating to state and local authority preferences for supplies, materials, equipment, and agricultural products produced in Georgia, as follows:

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(a) State and local authorities created by law, in the purchase of and when contracting for any services or for purchasing supplies, materials, equipment, and or agricultural products, excluding beverages for immediate consumption, shall give preference as far as may be reasonable and practicable to such providers of services located in this state or employing Georgia residents and preference to supplies, materials, equipment, and agricultural products as may be available, manufactured, or produced in this state. Such preference shall not sacrifice quality.

(b) In determining whether such a preference is reasonable in any case where the value of a contract for or purchase of such supplies, materials, equipment, or agricultural products exceeds \$100,000.00, the state or local authority shall consider, among other factors, information submitted by the bidder which may include the bidder's estimate of the multiplier effect on gross state domestic product and the effect on public revenues of the

192 **SECTION 6.**

- 193 Said part is further amended by revising Code Section 50-5-62, which is reserved, as follows:
- 194 "50-5-62.

50-5-73."

- 195 <u>The Department of Administrative Services, in awarding all contracts, shall give preference</u>
- 196 <u>to:</u>

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- (1) Sellers of products produced, grown, or manufactured in Georgia;
- 198 (2) Sellers who maintain a business located in Georgia;
- (3) Providers of services who are located in this state, maintain a business license in this
- state, and promise as a condition of any such contract to continue to remain so located
- and licensed during the duration of the contract;

202	(4) Any business that promises to employ residents of Georgia for the purpose of
203	satisfying the terms of any such contract and that promises to continue such employment
204	throughout the duration of the contract as a condition of the contract; and
205	(5) Any person or entity that pays income taxes to the state. Reserved."
206	SECTION 7.
207	This Act shall become effective on July 1, 2017, and shall apply to contracts entered into on
208	or after such date.
209	SECTION 8.
210	All laws and parts of laws in conflict with this Act are repealed.
