A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT

- 1 To amend Article 1 of Chapter 2 of Title 49 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated,
- 2 relating to general provisions relative to the Department of Human Services, so as to provide
- 3 for the establishment of the Healthy Food Development Program; to provide for a short title;
- 4 to provide definitions; to provide for various benefits; to provide requirements; to provide
- 5 for a grocery ambassador; to provide for related matters; to repeal conflicting laws; and for
- 6 other purposes.

7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF GEORGIA:

8 SECTION 1.

- 9 Article 1 of Chapter 2 of Title 49 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to
- 10 general provisions relative to the Department of Human Services, is amended by adding a
- 11 new Code section to read as follows:
- 12 "49-2-19.1.
- 13 (a) This Code section shall be known and may be cited as the 'Healthy Food Development
- 14 Program Act.'
- 15 (b) As used in this Code section, the term:

16 (1) 'Corner store' means a retail establishment that sells grocery products and has less

- than 5,000 square feet of selling area.
- 18 (2) 'Eligible area' means a historically underutilized business zone, as defined by 15
- 19 <u>U.S.C. Section 632(p)(1).</u>
- 20 (3) 'Farmers' market' means a public market at which farmers and other producers sell
- 21 <u>fresh produce and healthy foods.</u>
- 22 (4) 'Grocery store' means a retail establishment that:
- 23 (A) Has a primary business of selling grocery products;
- 24 (B) Has at least 5,000 square feet of selling area that is used for a general line of food
- and nonfood grocery products; and
- 26 (C) Meets the eligibility requirements for the federal Supplemental Nutrition
- 27 <u>Assistance Program (SNAP).</u>
- 28 (5) 'Small food retailer' means a small business that is not a grocery store.
- 29 (c) The department may coordinate with the Department of Economic Development to
- 30 establish a Healthy Food Development Program to expand access to healthy foods in
- 31 eligible areas in this state by providing assistance to grocery stores, corner stores, farmers'
- markets, and other small food retailers.
- 33 (d) The Department of Public Health, Department of Natural Resources, Department of
- 34 Agriculture, and other relevant state agencies shall coordinate with the department and the
- 35 Department of Economic Development upon request to establish the Healthy Food
- 36 Development Program.
- 37 (e) The Healthy Food Development Program may provide a combination of any or all of
- 38 the following benefits to grocery stores, corner stores, farmers' markets, and other small
- food retailers in eligible areas:
- 40 <u>(1) Grants</u>;
- 41 (2) Loans;
- 42 (3) State tax credits;

- 43 (4) Equipment;
- 44 (5) Other financial assistance; and
- 45 (6) Technical assistance.
- 46 (f) The benefits provided in subsection (e) of this Code section shall be awarded to grocery
- 47 <u>stores, corner stores, farmers' markets, and other small food retailers in eligible areas on</u>
- 48 a competitive basis, with priority given to projects with the greatest potential impact to
- 49 expand access to healthy foods in eligible areas that are underserved by retail sales of
- 50 <u>healthy food in this state.</u>
- 51 (g) Grocery stores, corner stores, farmers' markets, and other small food retailers are
- 52 <u>encouraged to work cooperatively to expand access to healthy foods in eligible areas in this</u>
- 53 state.
- 54 (h) The department and the Department of Economic Development may contract with
- 55 <u>nonprofit organizations to promote and implement this program.</u>
- 56 (i) Grocery stores, corner stores, farmers' markets, and other small food retailers
- 57 participating in the Healthy Food Development Program shall be strongly encouraged to:
- 58 (1) Apply and accept benefits from the federal Supplemental Nutrition Assistance
- 59 <u>Program (SNAP);</u>
- 60 (2) Apply and accept benefits from the federal Women, Infants, and Children (WIC)
- 61 program; and
- 62 (3) Employ residents of this state.
- 63 (j) Resources may be provided to assist grocery stores, corner stores, farmers' markets, and
- other small food retailers in acquiring the necessary technology to accept SNAP and WIC
- 65 benefits.
- 66 (k) As a condition of participating in the Healthy Food Development Program, persons or
- entities operating grocery stores, corner stores, farmers' markets, and other small food
- 68 retailers shall agree in writing to sell produce or other healthy foods for at least three years,

69 provided that this requirement is not applicable if the individual or entity, or its successor,

- 70 <u>ceases all of its retail food sales operations.</u>
- 71 (1) The department shall designate a grocery ambassador to assist retailers of healthy foods
- in this state by:
- 73 (1) Providing research and data on eligible areas with insufficient grocery access;
- 74 (2) Coordinating with the department and the Department of Economic Development and
- other relevant state agencies;
- 76 (3) Providing assistance to small grocery retailers in this state, including obtaining and
- 77 <u>expediting regulatory procedures; and</u>
- 78 (4) Providing other assistance as needed.
- 79 (m) The department and the Department of Economic Development may issue grants, on
- 80 <u>a competitive basis, for the establishment of a commercial distribution system for fresh</u>
- 81 produce and healthy foods."

SECTION 2.

83 All laws and parts of laws in conflict with this Act are repealed.
