A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT

- 1 To amend Chapter 1 of Title 10 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to selling
- 2 and other trade practices, so as to provide for regulation of certain practices by providers of
- 3 broadband services; to provide for related matters; to repeal conflicting laws; and for other
- 4 purposes.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF GEORGIA:

6 SECTION 1.

- 7 Chapter 1 of Title 10 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to selling and other
- 8 trade practices, is amended by adding a new article to read as follows:

9 "ARTICLE 35

- 10 <u>10-1-920.</u>
- 11 (a) As used in this Code section, the term:
- 12 (1) 'Broadband internet access service' means a mass-market retail service by wire or
- radio that provides the capability to transmit data to and receive data from all or
- substantially all internet endpoints, including any capabilities that are incidental to and
- enable the operation of the communications service, but excluding dial-up internet access
- service. The term also encompasses any service that the Federal Communications
- Commission finds to be providing a functional equivalent of the service described in this
- paragraph or that is used to evade the protections set forth in this Code section.
- 19 (2) 'End user' means any individual or entity that uses a broadband internet access
- 20 <u>service.</u>
- 21 (3) 'Paid prioritization' means the management of a broadband provider's network to
- 22 <u>directly or indirectly favor some traffic over other traffic, including through the use of</u>
- 23 <u>techniques such as traffic shaping, prioritization, resource reservation, or other forms of</u>
- 24 <u>preferential traffic management, either:</u>

19 LC 34 5515 25 (A) In exchange for consideration, monetary or otherwise, from a third party; or 26 (B) To benefit an affiliated entity. 27 The term does not include the provision of tiered internet access service or offerings to 28 a retail end user. 29 (4) 'Reasonable network management' means a practice that has a primarily technical 30 network management justification, but does not include other business practices. A 31 network management practice is reasonable if it is primarily used for and tailored to 32 achieving a legitimate network management purpose, taking into account the particular 33 network architecture and technology of the broadband internet access service. 34 (5) 'Tiered internet access service' means offering end users a choice between different packages of service with clearly advertised speeds, prices, terms, and conditions; for 35 36 example, a 10 megabit service for one price and a 50 megabit service for a different price. 37 (b) Any person providing broadband internet access service in this state shall publicly 38 disclose accurate information regarding the network management practices, performance 39 characteristics, and commercial terms of its broadband internet access service sufficient to 40 enable consumers to make informed choices regarding the purchase and use of such service and entrepreneurs and other small businesses to develop, market, and maintain internet 41 42 offerings. The disclosure must be made via a publicly available, easily accessible website. 43 (c) A person engaged in the provision of broadband internet access service in this state, 44 insofar as the person is so engaged, may not: 45 (1) Block lawful content, applications, services, or nonharmful devices, subject to 46 reasonable network management; 47 (2) Impair or degrade lawful internet traffic on the basis of internet content, application, 48 or service, or use of a nonharmful device, subject to reasonable network management; or 49 (3) Engage in paid prioritization.

- 50 (d) Nothing in this Code section:
- 51 (1) Supersedes any obligation or authorization a provider of broadband internet access
- 52 <u>service may have to address the needs of emergency communications or law</u>
- 53 enforcement, public safety, or national security authorities, consistent with or as
- 54 permitted by applicable law, or limits the provider's ability to do so; or
- 55 (2) Prohibits reasonable efforts by a provider of broadband internet access service to
- 56 <u>address copyright infringement or other unlawful activity."</u>

57 **SECTION 2.**

All laws and parts of laws in conflict with this Act are repealed.
