A BILL TO BE ENTITLED
AN ACT

1 To amend Chapter 3 of Title 38 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to
2 emergency management, so as to establish the homeland security division of the Georgia
3 Emergency Management and Homeland Security Agency; to provide for definitions; to
4 provide for the employment of peace officers by such division; to provide for the powers and
5 duties of such division; to revise the duties of the director of the Georgia Emergency
6 Management and Homeland Security Agency; to provide for immunities for officers or
7 agents employed by such division; to amend Code Section 16-11-130 of the Official Code
8 of Georgia Annotated, relating to exemptions from Code Sections 16-11-126 through
9 16-11-127.2, so as to authorize any officer or agent or retired officer or agent of such division
10 to carry a handgun on or off duty within this state with an exception; to amend Part 5 of
11 Article 8 of Chapter 2 of Title 47 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to
12 certain law enforcement personnel, so as to provide for disability allowances for officers or
13 agents employed by such division; to amend Chapter 3 of Title 35 of the Official Code of
14 Georgia Annotated, relating to the Georgia Bureau of Investigation, so as to revise the duties
15 of the director of the Georgia Bureau of Investigation pertaining to the Georgia Information
16 Sharing and Analysis Center; to revise the duties of the Georgia Information Sharing and
17 Analysis Center; to provide for related matters; to repeal conflicting laws; and for other
18 purposes.

19 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF GEORGIA:

20 PART I
21 SECTION 1-1.

22 Chapter 3 of Title 38 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to emergency
23 management, is amended by revising Code Section 38-3-3, relating to definitions, as follows:
24 "38-3-3.

25 As used in Articles 1 through 3 of this chapter, the term:

26 (1) 'Bioterrorism' means the intentional creation or use of any microorganism, virus,
27 infectious substance, or any component thereof, whether naturally occurring or
28 bioengineered, to cause death, illness, disease, or other biological malfunction in a
29 human, animal, plant, or other living organism in order improperly or illegally to
30 influence the conduct of government, to interfere with or disrupt commerce, or to
31 intimidate or coerce a civilian population.

32 (2) 'Emergency management' means the preparation for the carrying out of all emergency
33 functions other than functions for which military forces are primarily responsible to
34 prevent, minimize, and repair injury and damage resulting from emergencies, energy
35 emergencies, disasters, or the imminent threat thereof, of manmade or natural origin
36 caused by enemy attack, sabotage, acts of domestic or international terrorism, civil
37 disturbance, fire, flood, earthquake, wind, storm, wave action, oil spill or other water
38 contamination requiring emergency action to avert danger or damage, epidemic, air
39 contamination, blight, drought, infestation, explosion, riot or other hostile action,
40 radiological action, or other causes. These functions include, without limitation,
41 fire-fighting services; police services; emergency medical services; rescue; engineering;
42 warning services; communications; defense from radiological, chemical, biological, and
43 other special weapons to include weapons of mass destruction; evacuation of persons
44 from stricken areas; emergency welfare services; consequence management functions to
45 include victim services; emergency transportation; plant protection; temporary restoration
46 of public utility services; and other functions related to civilian protection, together with
47 all other activities necessary or incidental to the preparation for and carrying out of the
48 foregoing functions.

49 (2.1) 'Emergency Operations Command' means the unified command group comprising
50 the director of emergency management and homeland security, the director of the
51 Georgia Bureau of Investigation, the commissioner of public safety, the commissioner
52 of natural resources, the commissioner of transportation, and the adjutant general that is
53 responsible for coordinating the public safety response to natural disasters, homeland
54 security activities, and other emergencies within the state.

55 (3) 'Energy emergency' means a condition of danger to the health, safety, welfare, or
56 economic well-being of the citizens of this state arising out of a present or threatened
57 shortage of usable energy resources; also any condition of substantial danger to the
58 health, safety, or welfare of the citizens of this state resulting from the operation of any
59 electrical power-generating facility, the transport of any energy resource by any means
60 whatsoever, or the production, use, or disposal of any source material, special nuclear
61 material, or by-product, as defined by the Atomic Energy Act of 1954, 68 Stat. 919, 42
62 U.S.C. Section 2011, et seq.; also any nuclear incident, as defined by the Atomic Energy

63 Act of 1954, occurring within or outside this state, substantially affecting the health,
64 safety, or welfare of the citizens of this state.

65 (4) 'Energy resources' means all forms of energy or power including, without limitation,
66 oil, gasoline, and other petroleum products; natural or synthetic gas; electricity in all
67 forms and from all sources; and other fuels of any description, except wood.

68 (4.1) 'Homeland security activity' means any activity related to the prevention or
69 discovery of, response to, or recovery from:

70 (A) A terrorist attack;

71 (B) A hostile military or paramilitary action; or

72 (C) An extraordinary law enforcement emergency.

73 (4.2) 'Homeland security division' means a division within the Georgia Emergency
74 Management and Homeland Security Agency comprising officers or agents who are
75 certified as peace officers by the Georgia Peace Officer Standards and Training Council
76 and whose full time is dedicated to the preservation of public order and homeland
77 security activity.

78 (4.3) 'Pandemic influenza emergency' means the declaration by the World Health
79 Organization of at least a Phase 5 Pandemic Alert for influenza occurring in the United
80 States or the State of Georgia or the declaration by the Centers for Disease Control and
81 Prevention of at least a Category 2 Pandemic Severity Index for influenza occurring in
82 the United States or the State of Georgia.

83 (5) 'Political subdivision' means:

84 (A) Cities having a population of over 1,000;

85 (B) Cities having a population of less than 1,000 in which the Governor has established
86 a local organization; and

87 (C) Counties.

88 (6) 'Public health emergency' means the occurrence or imminent threat of an illness or
89 health condition that is reasonably believed to be caused by bioterrorism or the
90 appearance of a novel or previously controlled or eradicated infectious agent or biological
91 toxin and poses a high probability of any of the following harms:

92 (A) A large number of deaths in the affected population;

93 (B) A large number of serious or long-term disabilities in the affected population; or

94 (C) Widespread exposure to an infectious or toxic agent that poses a significant risk
95 of substantial future harm to a large number of people in the affected population.

96 (7) 'State of emergency' means the condition declared by the Governor when, in his or
97 her judgment, the threat or actual occurrence of a disaster, emergency, or energy
98 emergency in any part of the state is of sufficient severity and magnitude to warrant
99 extraordinary assistance by the state to supplement the efforts and available resources of

100 the several localities and relief organizations in preventing or alleviating the damage,
 101 loss, hardship, or suffering threatened or caused thereby."

102 **SECTION 1-2.**

103 Said chapter is further amended by revising Code Section 38-3-20, relating to Georgia
 104 Emergency Management and Homeland Security Agency created, director, staff, offices,
 105 director's duties, and disaster coordinator, as follows:

106 "38-3-20.

107 (a) There is established the Georgia Emergency Management and Homeland Security
 108 Agency with a director of emergency management and homeland security who shall be the
 109 head thereof. The Georgia Emergency Management and Homeland Security Agency shall
 110 be assigned to the Office of Planning and Budget for administrative purposes only as
 111 provided in Code Section 50-4-3.

112 (b) The Governor shall appoint the director of emergency management and homeland
 113 security. He or she shall hold office at the pleasure of the Governor, who shall fix his or
 114 her compensation. The director of emergency management and homeland security shall
 115 hold no other state office.

116 (c) The director may employ such professional, technical, clerical, stenographic, and other
 117 personnel, may fix their compensation, and may make such expenditures within the
 118 appropriation therefor, or from other funds made available for purposes of emergency
 119 management and homeland security, as may be necessary to carry out the purposes of
 120 Article 9 of Chapter 3 of Title 35; Article 1, this article, and Article 3 of this chapter; and
 121 the duties of the agency and the director described in Part 4 of Article 2 of Chapter 5 of
 122 Title 46, the 'Georgia Emergency Telephone Number 9-1-1 Service Act of 1977,' as
 123 amended.

124 (d) The director and other personnel of the Georgia Emergency Management and
 125 Homeland Security Agency shall be provided with appropriate office space, furniture,
 126 equipment, supplies, stationery, and printing in the same manner as provided for personnel
 127 of other state agencies.

128 (e) The director, subject to the direction and control of the Governor, shall:

129 (1) Be the executive head of the Georgia Emergency Management and Homeland
 130 Security Agency and shall be responsible to the Governor for carrying out the program
 131 for emergency management and homeland security in this state;

132 (2) Serve as the central authority reporting to the Governor on all matters relating to
 133 homeland security;

134 (3) Have ~~command and control~~ authority over ~~all operational~~ areas involving imminent
 135 or current terrorist activity within this state, including, but not limited to, leading and

- 136 ~~directing the actions of the Homeland Security Task Force and the Homeland Security~~
 137 ~~Central Command when activated by the Governor~~ Emergency Operations Command;
 138 (4) Coordinate the activities of all organizations for emergency management and
 139 homeland security within the state;
 140 (5) Maintain liaison with and cooperate with emergency management agencies and
 141 organizations of other states and of the federal government;
 142 (6) ~~Oversee all~~ Through risk and threat assessments, ~~and~~ coordinate ~~all~~ plans for timely
 143 and complete responses through a network of state, local, and federal organizations,
 144 including, but not limited to, the coordination of efficient and timely flow of information;
 145 (7) Be responsible for crisis and consequence management planning, including, but not
 146 limited to, measures to identify, acquire, and plan the use of resources needed to
 147 anticipate, prevent, or resolve a threat or act of terrorism;
 148 (8) Coordinate and review ~~all~~ activities involving homeland security within any agency,
 149 authority, or entity of this state, including, but not limited to, ~~oversight of~~ homeland
 150 security activities found within the Department of Public Safety, the Georgia Bureau of
 151 Investigation, the Georgia National Guard, the Department of Natural Resources, the
 152 Department of Community Health, and the Department of Public Health;
 153 (9) Evaluate information developed by the criminal justice community in regard to
 154 threats or potential threats of terrorism; ~~and~~
 155 (10) Serve as this state's security manager for the purpose of identifying and processing
 156 state personnel for security clearances through the United States Department of
 157 Homeland Security; and
 158 (11) Have such additional authority, duties, and responsibilities authorized by Article 1,
 159 this article, and Article 3 of this chapter as may be prescribed by the Governor and such
 160 additional authority, duties, and responsibilities as described in Article 9 of Chapter 3 of
 161 Title 35 and Part 4 of Article 2 of Chapter 5 of Title 46, the 'Georgia Emergency
 162 Telephone Number 9-1-1 Service Act of 1977,' as amended.
 163 (f) The director of emergency management and homeland security shall also be the
 164 disaster coordinator and shall act for the Governor when requested to do so."

165 SECTION 1-3.

166 Said chapter is further amended by adding two new Code sections to read as follows:

167 "38-3-20.1.

168 (a) There is established the homeland security division. The director of emergency
 169 management and homeland security shall have the power to appoint such a number of
 170 officers or agents, who shall be peace officers, as may be necessary to meet the needs of
 171 the Georgia Emergency Management and Homeland Security Agency. The homeland

172 security division shall have jurisdiction throughout this state with such duties and powers
173 as are prescribed by law.

174 (b) It shall be the duty of the homeland security division to:

175 (1) Focus on homeland security activity throughout this state in conjunction and
176 cooperation with federal, state, and local law enforcement agencies and to safeguard the
177 lives and property of the public;

178 (2) Detect, deter, and investigate violations of the criminal laws of this state, any other
179 state, or the United States in relation to homeland security activity within this state and
180 shall have authority to apprehend and arrest those persons who violate such criminal
181 laws;

182 (3) Serve and execute warrants in relation to any homeland security activity;

183 (4) Apprehend and arrest any person who is a fugitive from justice in relation to any
184 homeland security activity;

185 (5) In conjunction and cooperation with federal, state, and local law enforcement
186 agencies, identify and investigate violations of Article 6 of Chapter 11 of Title 16;

187 (6) Perform agency duties and responsibilities outlined in Article 27 of Chapter 2 of
188 Title 20, relating to loitering at or disrupting schools;

189 (7) Train local law enforcement, other state agency, and private sector partners in
190 homeland security activity; and

191 (8) Aid public and private sector critical infrastructure partners in conducting security
192 and vulnerability assessments.

193 (c) The director may, and if requested by the Governor shall, authorize and direct the
194 homeland security division to cooperate with and render assistance to any law enforcement
195 agency of this state or of any municipality, county, or other political subdivision thereof
196 in any criminal case, in the prevention or detection of violations of any law, or in the
197 apprehension or arrest of persons who violate the criminal laws of this state, any other
198 state, or the United States upon, in the case of municipalities, counties, or other political
199 subdivisions, a request by the governing authority or chief law enforcement officer of any
200 such municipality, county, or other political subdivision, by the sheriff of any county, or
201 by a judge of the superior court of any county.

202 (d) The homeland security division shall cooperate with all other law enforcement
203 agencies of this state or of any municipality, county, or other political subdivision thereof
204 in enforcing the laws of this state, any other state, or the United States in relation to
205 homeland security activity.

206 (e) Officers or agents of the homeland security division shall carry firearms while
207 performing their duties.

208 (f) In no case where the homeland security division is exercising any power or performing
 209 any duty authorized by this Code section shall it usurp any of the duties or authority of any
 210 sheriff of any county or any chief of police of any municipal or county police force.

211 38-3-20.2.

212 All immunities for peace officers provided for under Title 35 or any other law shall apply
 213 to the officers or agents of the homeland security division."

214 **SECTION 1-4.**

215 Said chapter is further amended by repealing Code Section 38-3-22.2, relating to
 216 establishment of the Airport Antiterrorism Training Committee and annual training, in its
 217 entirety.

218 **PART II**

219 **SECTION 2-1.**

220 Code Section 16-11-130 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to exemptions
 221 from Code Sections 16-11-126 through 16-11-127.2, is amended by revising subsection (c)
 222 as follows:

223 "(c)(1) As used in this subsection, the term 'courthouse' means a building or annex
 224 occupied by judicial courts and containing rooms in which judicial proceedings are held.

225 (2) Except to the extent provided for in subsection (c.1) of this Code section, Code
 226 Sections 16-11-126 through 16-11-127.2 shall not apply to or affect any:

227 (A) Sheriff, retired sheriff, deputy sheriff, or retired deputy sheriff if such retired
 228 sheriff or deputy sheriff is eligible to receive or is receiving benefits under the Peace
 229 Officers' Annuity and Benefit Fund provided under Chapter 17 of Title 47, the Sheriffs'
 230 Retirement Fund of Georgia provided under Chapter 16 of Title 47, or any other public
 231 retirement system established under the laws of this state for service as a law
 232 enforcement officer;

233 (B) Member of the Georgia State Patrol, agent of the Georgia Bureau of Investigation,
 234 retired member of the Georgia State Patrol, or retired agent of the Georgia Bureau of
 235 Investigation if such retired member or agent is receiving benefits under the Employees'
 236 Retirement System of Georgia;

237 (B.1) Officer or agent of the homeland security division of the Georgia Emergency
 238 Management and Homeland Security Agency or retired officer or agent of the
 239 homeland security division of the Georgia Emergency Management and Homeland

240 Security Agency if such retired officer or agent is receiving benefits under the
241 Employees' Retirement System of Georgia:

242 (C) Full-time law enforcement chief executive engaging in the management of a
243 county, municipal, state, state authority, or federal law enforcement agency in the State
244 of Georgia, including any college or university law enforcement chief executive who
245 is registered or certified by the Georgia Peace Officer Standards and Training Council;
246 or retired law enforcement chief executive who formerly managed a county, municipal,
247 state, state authority, or federal law enforcement agency in the State of Georgia,
248 including any college or university law enforcement chief executive who was registered
249 or certified at the time of his or her retirement by the Georgia Peace Officer Standards
250 and Training Council, if such retired law enforcement chief executive is receiving
251 benefits under the Peace Officers' Annuity and Benefit Fund provided under Chapter 17
252 of Title 47 or is retired in good standing and receiving benefits from a county,
253 municipal, State of Georgia, state authority, or federal retirement system;

254 (D) Police officer of any county, municipal, state, state authority, or federal law
255 enforcement agency in the State of Georgia, including any college or university police
256 officer who is registered or certified by the Georgia Peace Officer Standards and
257 Training Council, or retired police officer of any county, municipal, state, state
258 authority, or federal law enforcement agency in the State of Georgia, including any
259 college or university police officer who was registered or certified at the time of his or
260 her retirement by the Georgia Peace Officer Standards and Training Council, if such
261 retired police officer is receiving benefits under the Peace Officers' Annuity and Benefit
262 Fund provided under Chapter 17 of Title 47 or is retired in good standing and receiving
263 benefits from a county, municipal, State of Georgia, state authority, or federal
264 retirement system; or

265 (E) Person who is a citizen of this state and:

266 (i) Has retired with at least ten years of aggregate service as a law enforcement
267 officer with powers of arrest under the laws of any state of the United States or of the
268 United States;

269 (ii) Separated from service in good standing, as determined by criteria established by
270 the Georgia Peace Officer Standards and Training Council, from employment with
271 his or her most recent law enforcement agency; and

272 (iii) Possesses on his or her person an identification card for retired law enforcement
273 officers as issued by the Georgia Peace Officer Standards and Training Council;
274 provided, however, that such person meets the standards for the issuance of such card
275 as provided for by the council, including, but not limited to, maintenance of
276 qualification in firearms training.

277 In addition, any such sheriff, retired sheriff, deputy sheriff, retired deputy sheriff, member
 278 or retired member of the Georgia State Patrol, agent or retired agent of the Georgia
 279 Bureau of Investigation, officer or retired officer of the Department of Natural Resources,
 280 officer or agent or retired officer or agent of the homeland security division of the
 281 Georgia Emergency Management and Homeland Security Agency, active or retired law
 282 enforcement chief executive, person who is a retired law enforcement officer as provided
 283 for in paragraph (2) of this subsection, or other law enforcement officer referred to in this
 284 subsection shall be authorized to carry a handgun on or off duty anywhere within this
 285 state, including, but not limited to, in a courthouse except to the extent provided for in
 286 subsection (c.1) of this Code section, and Code Sections 16-11-126 through 16-11-127.2
 287 shall not apply to the carrying of such firearms."

288 **SECTION 2-2.**

289 Part 5 of Article 8 of Chapter 2 of Title 47 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated,
 290 relating to certain law enforcement personnel, is amended by revising subsection (b) of Code
 291 Section 47-2-221, relating to disability allowances payable to personnel for certain
 292 disabilities arising in the line of duty, as follows:

293 "(b)(1) Notwithstanding the disability allowance provided for in Code Section 47-2-123,
 294 any employee of the Department of Natural Resources appointed as a deputy
 295 conservation ranger under Code Section 27-1-17, any parole officer employed by the
 296 State Board of Pardons and Paroles, any probation officer employed by the Department
 297 of Corrections, any officer or agent of the homeland security division of the Georgia
 298 Emergency Management and Homeland Security Agency, and any community
 299 supervision officer employed by the Department of Community Supervision who, while
 300 a contributing member of this retirement system and upon becoming permanently
 301 disabled due to an act of external violence or injury incurred in the line of law
 302 enforcement duty, becomes eligible for disability retirement allowances shall, after a
 303 medical examination and upon certification by the medical board that such member is,
 304 in their opinion, permanently disabled, be entitled to a monthly allowance as computed
 305 on the member's life expectancy without option. Such monthly allowance as shall be
 306 payable to the member only, during his or her life or length of disability, shall not
 307 exceed 80 percent of the service allowance that would have been payable to the member
 308 had he or she accumulated not more than 30 years of creditable service and had retired
 309 at age 65. Such allowance shall be computed on the basis of the member's monthly
 310 earnable compensation for the month in which his or her permanent disability occurred.
 311 Such permanent disability retirement shall apply regardless of the length of service of any
 312 such member; and such member shall be deemed to have acquired 30 or more years of

313 creditable service. In addition, a member so disabled in the line of law enforcement duty
 314 shall receive a monthly supplemental benefit which shall be in the amount of \$5.00 per
 315 month for each year of creditable service as an employee of the Department of Natural
 316 Resources who has been appointed as a deputy conservation ranger under Code Section
 317 27-1-17, parole officer of the State Board of Pardons and Paroles, probation officer of the
 318 Department of Corrections, officer or agent of the homeland security division of the
 319 Georgia Emergency Management and Homeland Security Agency, or ~~any~~ community
 320 supervision officer employed by the Department of Community Supervision. Such
 321 additional monthly supplemental benefit shall in no event exceed \$150.00 per month.

322 (2) In lieu of the foregoing, any member so disabled in the line of law enforcement duty
 323 shall be entitled to receive a minimum monthly disability retirement benefit equal to 2
 324 percent of his or her monthly earnable compensation for the month in which his or her
 325 permanent disability occurred for each year of creditable service determined as though
 326 he or she had continued in service as a deputy conservation ranger, probation officer,
 327 parole officer, officer or agent of the homeland security division of the Georgia
 328 Emergency Management and Homeland Security Agency, or a community supervision
 329 officer until his or her mandatory retirement age."

330 PART III

331 SECTION 3-1.

332 Chapter 3 of Title 35 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to the Georgia
 333 Bureau of Investigation, is amended by revising Article 9, relating to the Georgia
 334 Information Sharing and Analysis Center, as follows:

335 "ARTICLE 9

336 35-3-200.

337 As used in this article, the term:

338 (1) 'Center' means the Georgia Information Sharing and Analysis Center.

339 (2) 'Fusion center' means collaborative effort which combines resources, expertise,
 340 intelligence, and other information from various agencies of state and local governments
 341 with the goal of maximizing the ability of this state to detect, prevent, and respond to
 342 criminal activities or to otherwise engage in homeland security activities.

343 (3) 'Homeland security activity' means any activity related to the prevention or discovery
 344 of, response to, or recovery from:

345 (A) A terrorist attack;

- 346 (B) A hostile military or paramilitary action; or
347 (C) An extraordinary law enforcement emergency.

348 35-3-201.

349 There is established the Georgia Information Sharing and Analysis Center as a distinct
350 division within the Georgia Bureau of Investigation. The center shall be a fusion center
351 maintaining criminal intelligence and terrorism analytical components. The officer or
352 agent charged with operating the center shall report directly to the director.

353 35-3-202.

354 ~~(a) Responsibility for the development, maintenance, and operations of the center shall be~~
355 ~~vested in the director.~~

356 ~~(b) The director shall appoint and maintain the necessary professional and support staff to~~
357 ~~enable the center to effectively and efficiently carry out its duties and responsibilities under~~
358 ~~this article~~ Reserved.

359 35-3-203.

360 (a) ~~The director through the center shall share and provide homeland security activity~~
361 ~~information to the director of emergency management and homeland security, including,~~
362 ~~but not limited to, threats, warnings, and developing situations, when an investigation~~
363 ~~reveals conduct of a terroristic nature or in material support of terroristic activities,~~
364 ~~recruitment of terrorists, or information on the activities of known terrorist organizations.~~

365 (b) The center shall liaise with ~~the bureau,~~ the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Joint
366 Terrorism Task Force, United States Department of Homeland Security, and other local,
367 state, and federal intelligence and law enforcement officials for purposes of carrying out
368 its duties and responsibilities under this article.

369 ~~(c) The center shall allow unrestricted access to secure communications equipment to the~~
370 ~~director of emergency management and homeland security and his or her representatives~~
371 ~~who possess the appropriate federally approved security clearances for the dissemination~~
372 ~~of homeland security activity information by the United States Department of Homeland~~
373 ~~Security.~~

374 ~~(d) The director of emergency management and homeland security shall serve as this~~
375 ~~state's security manager for the purpose of identifying and processing state personnel for~~
376 ~~security clearances through the United States Department of Homeland Security.~~

377 35-3-204.

378 (a) Membership in the center shall consist of the director, the director of emergency
 379 management and homeland security, the commissioner of public safety, the commissioner
 380 of natural resources, the commissioner of corrections, the state fire marshal, the Attorney
 381 General, the adjutant general, and state and local fire service, law enforcement, homeland
 382 security, emergency management, corrections, and other appropriate agencies and
 383 disciplines as determined by the director of emergency management and homeland security
 384 ~~in consultation with the director~~. Such members ~~shall~~ may assign or make available their
 385 analysts or other personnel to the center as such need is determined by the director of
 386 ~~emergency management and homeland security~~.

387 (b) The director of emergency management and homeland security ~~shall~~ may maintain
