A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT

- 1 To amend Article 2 of Chapter 3 of Title 16 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated,
- 2 relating to justification and excuse, so as to provide for immunity from criminal liability for
- 3 possession of certain materials or images under certain circumstances; to provide for related
- 4 matters; to repeal conflicting laws; and for other purposes.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF GEORGIA:

6 SECTION 1.

- 7 Article 2 of Chapter 3 of Title 16 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to
- 8 justification and excuse, is amended by adding a new Code section to read as follows:
- 9 "16-3-22.1.
- 10 (a) Any individual who in good faith has possession of materials or images that are in
- violation of Article 3 of Chapter 12 of this title shall be immune to the same extent as a law
- 12 <u>enforcement officer would be immune from criminal liability for such possession when</u>
- such possession is for the purpose of reporting such violation:
- 14 (1) To law enforcement officials; or
- 15 (2) As allowed and required by Code Section 19-7-5.
- 16 (b) The official report of the law enforcement agency or the Division of Family and
- 17 <u>Children Services of the Department of Human Services shall create a rebuttable</u>
- presumption of good faith and reasonableness on the part of the individual who has
- 19 <u>possession.</u>
- 20 (c) The purpose of this Code section is to provide for those individuals who act in good
- 21 <u>faith to assist law enforcement officers or the Division of Family and Children Services of</u>
- 22 the Department of Human Services when the health and safety of a child are being
- 23 <u>adversely affected and threatened by the conduct of another. This Code section shall be</u>
- 24 <u>liberally construed so as to carry out the purposes thereof."</u>
