A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT

- 1 To amend Chapter 1 of Title 28 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to
- 2 general provisions regarding the General Assembly, so as to provide for the establishment
- 3 of the Legislative Commission on the Disparate Impact of COVID-19; to provide for a
- 4 definition; to provide for membership, appointments, vacancies, chairperson, quorum, and
- 5 expenses; to provide for powers and duties; to provide for a report; to provide for automatic
- 6 repeal; to provide for related matters; to repeal conflicting laws; and for other purposes.

7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF GEORGIA:

8 SECTION 1.

- 9 Chapter 1 of Title 28 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to general
- 10 provisions regarding the General Assembly, is amended by adding a new Code section to
- 11 read as follows:
- *"*28-1-18.
- 13 (a) As used in this Code section, the term 'COVID-19' means severe acute respiratory
- syndrome coronavirus 2 (SARS-CoV-2), and any mutation or viral fragments thereof, or
- any disease or condition caused by severe acute respiratory syndrome coronavirus 2

16 (SARS-CoV-2), which were the subject of the public health state of emergency declared

- by the Governor on March 14, 2020.
- 18 (b) There is established the Legislative Commission on the Disparate Impact of
- 19 <u>COVID-19</u>. The commission shall expire on June 30, 2024, or upon a two-thirds' vote of
- 20 <u>the membership of the commission, whichever is earlier.</u>
- 21 (c) The commission shall consist of 20 members as follows:
- 22 (1) Four members appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, all of
- 23 whom have expertise in evaluating disparities in education, housing, and human services;
- 24 (2) Four members appointed by the President of the Senate, all of whom have expertise
- 25 <u>in evaluating the impact of COVID-19 on essential workers;</u>
- 26 (3) Three members appointed by the majority leader of the House of Representatives,
- 27 <u>two of whom have expertise in public health and infectious diseases and one of whom</u>
- 28 <u>shall be a teacher;</u>
- 29 (4) Three members appointed by the majority leader of the Senate, two of whom have
- 30 <u>expertise in small business and one of whom shall be a housing advocate;</u>
- 31 (5) Three members appointed by the minority leader of the House of Representatives,
- 32 <u>two of whom have expertise in nursing homes and one of whom shall be a representative</u>
- of higher education; and
- 34 (6) Three members appointed by the minority leader of the Senate, two of whom have
- 35 <u>expertise in health care delivery and one of whom has expertise in the hospitality</u>
- 36 <u>industry.</u>
- 37 (d) Any member of the commission appointed pursuant to subsection (c) of this Code
- 38 <u>section may be a member of the General Assembly.</u>
- 39 (e) All initial appointments to the commission shall be made not later than September 1,
- 40 <u>2022.</u>
- 41 (f) The Speaker of the House of Representatives and the President of the Senate shall
- 42 jointly select the chairperson of the commission from among the members of the

commission. Such chairperson shall schedule the first meeting of the commission, which

- shall be held not later than September 1, 2022.
- 45 (g) Any vacancy shall be filled by the appointing individual.
- 46 (h) A majority of the commission shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of any
- 47 business.
- 48 (i) Members of the commission shall serve without compensation but shall receive the
- 49 <u>same expense allowance per day as that received by a member of the General Assembly</u>
- 50 for each day such member of the commission is in attendance at a meeting of such
- commission, plus either reimbursement for actual transportation costs while traveling by
- 52 public carrier or the same mileage allowance for use of a personal car in connection with
- such attendance as members of the General Assembly receive. Such expense and travel
- 54 <u>allowance shall be paid in lieu of any per diem, allowance, or other remuneration now</u>
- 55 received by any such member for such attendance.
- 56 (i) The commission shall have the following powers and duties:
- 57 (1) To analyze any disparate impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on different racial,
- 58 <u>ethnic, gender, and socioeconomic groups in the state;</u>
- 59 (2) To identify the causes for such disparate impact;
- 60 (3) To assess the effects of federal and state responses to the COVID-19 pandemic on
- 61 <u>such disparate impact;</u>
- 62 (4) To appoint and convene at least two working groups to analyze the impact of the
- 63 <u>COVID-19 pandemic, one to focus on the pandemic's impact on education, housing, and</u>
- 64 <u>human services needs and another to focus on the pandemic's impact on labor, commerce,</u>
- and public health needs;
- (5) To hold one or more public hearings as necessary to carry out the purposes of this
- 67 <u>Code section;</u>

68 (6) To request from any executive department, board, commission, or other agency of

- 69 this state such assistance and data as necessary, reasonable, and available to carry out the
- 70 purposes of this Code section;
- 71 (7) To accept any gift, donation, or bequest for the purpose of performing the duties
- described in this Code section;
- 73 (8) To establish bylaws to govern its procedures; and
- 74 (9) To perform other such acts as may be necessary and appropriate to carry out the
- duties described in this subsection.
- 76 (k) The commission shall meet as often as deemed necessary by the chairperson.
- 77 (1) Not later than January 1, 2023, and annually thereafter, the commission shall submit
- a report to the Governor, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the President of the
- 79 <u>Senate, the majority leader of the House of Representatives, the majority leader of the</u>
- 80 Senate, the minority leader of the House of Representatives, and the minority leader of the
- 81 Senate on: (1) the results of the commission's analysis pursuant to subsection (j) of this
- 82 Code section; and (2) recommendations for policy changes and amendments to the general
- 83 statutes necessary to address the causes for any disparate impact of the COVID-19
- pandemic and to improve outcomes during any future pandemic.
- 85 (m) This Code section shall stand repealed by operation of law on June 30, 2024."

SECTION 2.

87 All laws and parts of laws in conflict with this Act are repealed.
