House Resolution 1228 By: Representative Mallow of the 163<sup>rd</sup>

## A RESOLUTION

Recognizing April 2-8, 2022, as Week of the Young Child at the state capitol; and for other
 purposes.

WHEREAS, the first years of a child's life are the period of the most rapid brain development and lay the foundation for all future learning. Children's cognitive, physical, social and emotional, and language and literacy developments are built on a foundation of positive interactions with adults, peers, and their environment; and

WHEREAS, sixty-five percent of children in our state have all available parents in the
workforce, making child care a pressing need. Nation wide, women are quitting their jobs
at a higher rate than men. That gender resignation gap is widest in the states with the most
child care disruptions; and

WHEREAS, high quality early care and education can help ameliorate the effects of poverty, detect and remediate delays, identify and help prevent child neglect, and lead to positive outcomes for individual children, helping them better prepare for school and increase their success in life. Participation in high quality early childhood education saves taxpayer dollars, makes working families more economically secure, and prepares children to succeed in school, earn higher wages, and live healthier lives; and

WHEREAS, the lack of sufficient public investment in the face of the COVID-19 pandemic 17 18 has forced child care programs, educators, and families into a series of impossible choices 19 with devastating consequences. Many child care providers have, at great personal and 20 professional cost, managed to keep their doors open during the pandemic to better support 21 children and families in their communities. The average wage for child care providers, who 22 are skilled and valuable frontline professionals risking their health to provide education and 23 care during a global pandemic, is less than \$12.00 per hour, with Black and Latina child care 24 workers making even less; and

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WHEREAS, young children need developmentally appropriate, accessible, and available
early care and education settings, which provide them access to an early childhood education
workforce that reflects a rich diversity of linguistic, racial, and cultural identities; and

WHEREAS, working families need sufficient high quality child care spaces beginning at birth to be available in the community, with robust subsidies, scholarships, and tax credits for families at all income levels that support the true cost of quality early childhood education; and

WHEREAS, early childhood educators need the ability to earn a family-sustaining wage that is commensurate with the required education and skills they bring to the complex and valuable work they do. They deserve to have the ability to have basic workplace benefits such as health insurance, retirement, paid sick leave, paid vacation, and professional development leave; and

WHEREAS, we celebrate the Week of the Young Child so that we can continue to recognize
and advance the early childhood education profession, and advocate for a sustainable system
of child care.
