## A RESOLUTION

Urging the United States Congress to enact legislation removing cannabis from the federal
 Controlled Substances Act, exempting certain activities related to marijuana, facilitating the
 full spectrum of private banking services for cannabis related business, and encouraging
 scientific research as related to cannabis products; and for other purposes.

5 WHEREAS, at least thirty-six states, four United States territories, and the District of 6 Columbia have authorized the use of medical cannabis; at least 22 states, the United States 7 Virgin Islands, and the District of Columbia have decriminalized cannabis; and at least 8 fifteen states, the Northern Mariana Islands, the District of Columbia, and three Native 9 American tribes have legalized adult use of cannabis; and

WHEREAS, in the enactment of legislation allowing for the use of cannabis for medicinal
or recreational purposes, states have provided for the regulation and taxation of the use of
cannabis; and

WHEREAS, cannabis remains a Schedule I drug under the federal Controlled Substances
Act, classifying it among the most dangerous drugs in the Act; and

WHEREAS, alcohol and tobacco remain outside the purview of the federal Controlled Substances Act and have significant negative impacts on individual and public health, including physical injuries, psychological and social harm, and the onset of chronic, often fatal illnesses related to regular use; and

WHEREAS, continued scheduling of cannabis under the federal Controlled Substances Act
hinders the ability of medical cannabis dispensaries and other cannabis related businesses to
operate without the prospect of federal seizures, forfeitures, arrests, and other enforcement
and prosecutorial actions; and

WHEREAS, such hindrance creates a problem for medical cannabis dispensaries and cannabis related businesses that are operating legally pursuant to state law and presents difficulties for consumers or businesses that are authorized to grow, sell, or purchase cannabis products under state law; and

WHEREAS, many financial institutions have been unable to do business with cannabisrelated businesses because of existing federal law and policies; and

WHEREAS, many cannabis related businesses rely upon cash transactions, which increases
the risk of various crimes and prohibits the collection of taxes by individual states and
territories; and

WHEREAS, in the interest of promoting efficient business practices, financial institutions
 should be confident in serving businesses operating legally under state law so long as safety
 and soundness requirements are met; and

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35 WHEREAS, legislation has been introduced in Congress to provide for specific regulatory

36 protection and immunity from federal prosecution for depository institutions providing

37 financial services to cannabis related businesses acting under applicable state law; and

WHEREAS, maintaining business relationships with financial institutions will allow for
 greater access to loans and debit and credit transactions for businesses serving the cannabis

40 industry, their employees, and for consumers purchasing cannabis legally under state law.

## 41 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES that

42 the members of this body urge Congress to enact legislation:

- 43 (1) Removing cannabis from the federal Controlled Substances Act;
- 44 (2) Exempting any production, distribution, possession, or use of marijuana carried out45 in compliance with state laws;
- 46 (3) Providing immunity from federal prosecution and regulatory protections for financial
  47 institutions legally providing services to cannabis related businesses, licensees, and
  48 consumers pursuant to applicable state law; and
- 49 (4) Encouraging scientific research into the efficacy, doses, routes of administration, and
   50 side effects of commonly used and commercially available cannabis products in the
- 51 Unites States.

52 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Clerk of the House of Representatives is authorized 53 and directed to make appropriate copies of this resolution available for distribution to the 54 President of the United States, the U.S. Senate Majority Leader, the U.S. Senate Minority 55 Leader, the U.S. Speaker of the House, the U.S. House Majority Leader, and the U.S. House 56 Minority Leader.
