## A RESOLUTION

- 1 Affirming Georgia's adoption of the Common Core Standards; and for other purposes.
- 2 WHEREAS, Georgia led a bipartisan coalition of 47 states in developing a new set of
- 3 stronger academic standards designed to give our students the best possible chance of success
- 4 throughout their K-12 education, college and careers; and
- 5 WHEREAS, in 2009, under the leadership of former Georgia Governor Sonny Perdue, the
- 6 National Governors Association in partnership with the Council of Chief State School
- 7 Officers recognized a need for academic standards in K-12 education, developed by states
- 8 and that states could voluntarily choose to adopt, that are aligned to the expectations of two-
- 9 and four-year colleges and have been internationally benchmarked; and
- 10 WHEREAS, this partnership convened a group of education experts to work on developing
- 11 the standards to "provide a consistent, clear understanding of what students are expected to
- learn, so teachers and parents know what they need to do to help them," and "are designed
- 13 to be robust and relevant to the real world, reflecting the knowledge and skills that our young
- 14 people need for success in college and careers"; and
- 15 WHEREAS, the Common Core Georgia Performance Standards (CCGPS) were drafted and
- posted for public comment before being adopted by the state in Fall 2012; and
- 17 WHEREAS, Georgia has joined 44 other states, the District of Columbia, and two territories,
- along with the Department of Defense Education Activity, in formally adopting this set of
- 19 core standards for kindergarten through high school in English language arts, mathematics,
- and grades 6-12 literacy in science, history/social studies, and technical subjects; and
- 21 WHEREAS, the CCGPS were heavily based on the Georgia Performance Standards (GPS)
- 22 and represent a common sense next step from these standards by providing a consistent
- 23 framework to prepare students for success in college and the 21st century workplace; and

24 WHEREAS, the CCGPS will ensure that all Georgia students have an equal access and

- 25 opportunity to master the skills and knowledge needed for success beyond high school; and
- 26 WHEREAS, the standards create a foundation to work collaboratively across states and
- 27 districts, pooling resources and expertise, to create curricular tools, professional
- 28 development, common assessments, and other instructional materials; and
- 29 WHEREAS, the CCGPS is not a curriculum and maintains both flexibility and control for
- 30 local educators, schools and systems to decide how to teach their students and what
- 31 textbooks to use; and
- 32 WHEREAS, under the CCGPS all personally identifiable information about individual
- 33 students is still protected by state and federal privacy laws, and no such information will be
- 34 shared with the federal government or with other states; and
- 35 WHEREAS, the federal government did not play any role in the development of the CCPGS
- and no state has been penalized by the federal government or had federal funds withheld
- 37 specifically for declining to implement the standards; and
- 38 WHEREAS, a broad coalition of stakeholders across Georgia's education, business, faith, and
- 39 civic communities support these standards, including: Georgia Chamber of Commerce, GE,
- 40 IBM, Microsoft, Siemens, State Farm, Verizon, Georgia Association of Educational Leaders,
- 41 Georgia Association of Educators, Georgia Parent Teacher Association, Georgia Partnership
- 42 for Excellence in Education, Georgia School Boards Association, Georgia School
- 43 Superintendents Association, Southern Education Foundation, Technical College System of
- 44 Georgia, and the University System of Georgia; and
- 45 WHEREAS, the CCGPS allows parents to know where their children stand and further
- 46 empowers them to be partners in their child's education.
- 47 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES that
- 48 this body affirms Georgia's adoption of the Common Core Standards as a critical tool to help
- 49 ensure our students are graduating high school both college and career ready, providing clear
- 50 educational standards while allowing local districts and schools the flexibility needed to
- 51 deliver quality instruction in the classroom.

52 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in order to maintain the trust of our state's educators and

- 53 school professionals, business and civic leaders, and most importantly, parents and families,
- 54 Georgia must honor the commitment we have made to implementing the CCGPS and offer
- our educators the proper support to guarantee the success of the standards.
- 56 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the CCGPS are internationally benchmarked and
- 57 provide our students with an edge by ensuring mastery of knowledge and skills needed to
- 58 perform today's high-skill, high-wage occupations, enabling Georgia students to competently
- 59 compete in the global jobs market, and ensuring Georgia businesses and educational
- 60 institutions that our state is training our students for college and career.
