The House Committee on Health offers the following substitute to HR 1360:

## A RESOLUTION

Creating the House Study Committee on Alternatives to Opioids for Pain Management; and
 for other purposes.

WHEREAS, the opioid epidemic, also known as the opioid crisis, is a nationwide problem
in the United States that involves the widespread use of painkillers and subsequent popularity
of illegal opioids; and

6 WHEREAS, opioids are a class of drugs that includes illegal drugs such as heroin, synthetic
7 opioids such as fentanyl, and pain relievers available legally by prescription. Opioids can
8 help relieve severe pain but, unfortunately, are highly addictive, and withdrawals from them
9 are painful; and

WHEREAS, the National Center for Health Statistics at the Centers for Disease Control and
Prevention reports that more than 106,000 lives were lost from drug-involved overdoses in

12 2021, and 75 percent of all drug overdose deaths involved opioids; and

13 WHEREAS, the Department of Public Health reports there were 2,390 drug overdose deaths

14 in Georgia in 2021, and 71 percent were attributed to opioids; and

15 WHEREAS, in 2022, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention updated prescribing

16 guidelines to emphasize the efficacy of nonopioid alternatives for many common types of

17 acute pain and to encourage their use over opioids; and

18 WHEREAS, all 50 states have opioid prescribing guidelines, but only 16 states have19 statutory requirements mandating prescriber consideration of nonopioid alternatives; and

WHEREAS, Georgia should promote and encourage healthcare providers to inform their patients of nonopioid alternatives, discuss with their patients the advantages and disadvantages of the use of nonopioid alternatives, including any elevated risks of controlled substance abuse or misuse, and provide their patients with educational information on nonopioid alternatives; and

WHEREAS, it would be beneficial for policymakers to study ways to enhance awareness of nonopioid alternatives, including nonopioid pharmacologic treatment options, through educational programs for healthcare providers and to enhance collaboration and integration of care between all healthcare providers who assist in treating pain.

29 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES:

30 (1) Creation of House study committee. There is created the House Study Committee
 31 on Alternatives to Opioids for Pain Management.

32 (2) Members and officers. The committee shall be composed of 14 members to be33 appointed as follows:

34 (A) Seven members of the House of Representatives appointed by the Speaker of the
 35 House of Representatives, which shall include the chairpersons of the House Special

36 Committee on Healthcare, the House Committee on Health, and the House Committee

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| on Public Health. The Speaker shall designate a legislative member of the committee   |
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| as chairperson of the committee.  |
| (B) Five nonlegislative members appointed by the Speaker of the House of  |
| Representatives, which shall include:   |
| (i) A citizen representative from the Georgia Council for Recovery;   |
| (ii) A citizen representative who serves in an executive role in the field of criminal  |
| justice;  |
| (iii) A citizen representative who practices medicine as an independent physician   |
| whose specialty includes the treatment of acute pain;   |
| (iv) A citizen representative who has expertise in healthcare costs and works in the  |
| insurance industry; and   |
| (v) A citizen representative who has lost a family member to an overdose; and   |
| (C) Two state agency representatives as follows:  |
| (i) The commissioner of community health, or his or her designee; and   |
| (ii) The commissioner of behavioral health and developmental disabilities, or his or  |
| her designee.   |
| (3) <b>Powers and duties.</b> The committee shall undertake a study of the conditions, needs,   |
| issues, and problems mentioned above or related thereto and recommend any action or   |
| legislation which the committee deems necessary or appropriate.   |
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| (4) Meetings. The chairperson shall call all meetings of the committee. The committee   |
| (4) <b>Meetings.</b> The chairperson shall call all meetings of the committee. The committee may conduct such meetings at such places and at such times as it may deem necessary or   |

(B) Members of the committee who are state officials, other than legislative members,
or who are state employees shall receive no compensation for their services on the
committee, but they may be reimbursed for expenses incurred by them in the
performance of their duties as members of the committee in the same manner as they
are reimbursed for expenses in their capacities as state officials or employees.

68 (C) Members of the committee who are not legislator, state officials, or state 69 employees shall receive a daily expense allowance in an amount the same as that 70 specified in subsection (b) of Code Section 45-7-21 of the Official Code of Georgia 71 Annotated, as well as the mileage or transportation allowance authorized for state 72 employees.

(D) The allowances authorized by this resolution shall not be received by any member
of the committee for more than five days unless additional days are authorized. Funds
necessary to carry out the provisions of this resolution shall come from funds
appropriated to the House of Representatives; except that funds for the reimbursement
of the expenses of state officials, other than legislative members, and for the
reimbursement of the expenses of state employees shall come from funds appropriated
to or otherwise available to their respective agencies.

80 (6) **Report.** 

(A) In the event the committee adopts any specific findings or recommendations that
include suggestions for proposed legislation, the chairperson shall file a report of the
same prior to the date of abolishment specified in this resolution, subject to
subparagraph (C) of this paragraph.

(B) In the event the committee adopts a report that does not include suggestions for
proposed legislation, the chairperson shall file the report, subject to subparagraph (C)
of this paragraph.

(C) No report shall be filed unless the same has been approved prior to the date of
 abolishment specified in this resolution by majority vote of a quorum of the committee.

- 90 A report so approved shall be signed by the chairperson of the committee and filed with
- 91 the Clerk of the House of Representatives.
- 92 (D) In the absence of an approved report, the chairperson may file with the Clerk of the
- 93 House of Representatives a copy of the minutes of the meetings of the committee in lieu
- 94 thereof.
- 95 (7) Abolishment. The committee shall stand abolished on December 1, 2024.
