## A RESOLUTION

- 1 Commending Hi-Hope Service Center on its 60th anniversary of supporting individuals with
- 2 intellectual and developmental disabilities; and for other purposes.
- 3 WHEREAS, Hi-Hope Service Center was founded in 1960 by the parents of six young
- 4 students from Gwinnett County and community leaders, establishing one of the first
- 5 organizations in Georgia to teach children with intellectual disabilities; and
- 6 WHEREAS, Hi-Hope Service Center owes a special debt of gratitude to Mrs. Nell Moses,
- 7 the mother of a three-year-old with a developmental disability whose determination to find
- 8 better options for her child and the help of the Georgia Association for Retarded Children,
- 9 the local paper, the Lawrenceville Jaycees, and friends ultimately resulted in the founding
- 10 of Hi-Hope Service Center; and
- WHEREAS, Hi-Hope Service Center recognizes the leadership of the first board of directors
- who were as follows: Mrs. Nell Moses, president; Mr. Walker Haywood and Mrs. William
- 13 Turner, vice-presidents; Mr. P.K. Martin, treasurer; and Mr. W.J. Moseley, secretary; and
- 14 WHEREAS, Mrs. Vinie Lowry started in 1961 as the school's first paid teacher and worked
- 15 at Hi-Hope Service Center for 19 years, retiring from the position of director of Hi-Hope
- 16 Training Center; and
- 17 WHEREAS, Hi-Hope Service Center successfully transitioned to an organization supporting
- intellectually and developmentally disabled adults following the full integration of student
- 19 programs in the public school system; and
- 20 WHEREAS, the mission of Hi-Hope Service Center is to provide quality services that
- 21 empower adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities to define and live a
- 22 meaningful life; and

23 WHEREAS, Hi-Hope Service Center currently runs a day program, an employment program,

- 24 a residential program, an adapted communication program, and a behavioral support program
- supporting 236 individuals, 20 of whom are group home residents and receive around the
- 26 clock support; and
- 27 WHEREAS, Hi-Hope Service Center was awarded the Gwinnett Chamber's D. Scott
- 28 Hudgens Jr. Humanitarian Award in 2005, the Gwinnett County Parks and Recreation
- Volunteer of the Year Award in 2006 and 2016, the Pinnacle Small Business Award in 2011,
- 30 and the Gwinnett Chamber of Commerce Impact Regional Business Award in the Nonprofit
- 31 Sector in 2016; and
- 32 WHEREAS, in 2015, Hi-Hope Service Center entered into a long-term joint management
- 33 agreement with The Enterline Foundation, establishing a collaboration that further secures
- 34 the future for adults with developmental disabilities; and
- 35 WHEREAS, throughout its 60 years of service to the Gwinnett community, Hi-Hope Service
- 36 Center has carried on its founders' legacy of compassion and innovation and strove to serve
- as an example to others in the community.
- 38 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES that
- 39 the members of this body recognize and commend Hi-Hope Service Center for its dedication
- 40 to community service and commitment to improving opportunities for individuals with
- 41 intellectual and developmental disabilities.
