A RESOLUTION

- 1 Encouraging the celebration of the month of June, 2018, as LGBTQ Pride Month across the
- 2 United States, and the celebration of Atlanta Pride during the months of September and
- 3 October, 2018; and for other purposes.
- 4 WHEREAS, lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and queer (LGBTQ) rights are human
- 5 rights, to be recognized and protected by the United States Constitution; and
- 6 WHEREAS, the United States should continue to strive to ensure that the promise of equality
- 7 is realized for all people in the United States; and
- 8 WHEREAS, all people in the United States should be treated fairly and equally, regardless
- 9 of sexual orientation or gender identity; and
- 10 WHEREAS, the struggle of the Stonewall protestors and countless other LGBTQ people for
- 11 equality should be remembered and commended; and
- 12 WHEREAS, those who took a stand for human rights and dignity at the Stonewall Inn in
- 13 New York City on June 28, 1969, are among the pioneers within the movement for LGBTQ
- 14 equality; and
- 15 WHEREAS, in 1974, Elaine Noble became the first openly LGBTQ candidate elected to a
- state legislature in the United States when she won a seat in the Massachusetts House of
- 17 Representatives; and
- 18 WHEREAS, on January 8, 1978, Harvey Milk was the first openly LGBTQ elected official
- 19 in California's history; and
- 20 WHEREAS, in 1980, Democrats took a stand in support of gay rights at the Democratic
- 21 National Convention; and

WHEREAS, in May, 1996, in Romer v. Evans, the United States Supreme Court decided that

- 23 a Colorado constitutional amendment preventing the enactment of protections for gays and
- 24 lesbians in that state was unconstitutional; and
- 25 WHEREAS, in 1997, Cathy Woolard was elected to represent the 6th District of the Atlanta
- 26 City Council and became the first openly LGBTQ elected official in Georgia's history; and
- 27 WHEREAS, in 2000, Karla Drenner was elected to represent Georgia House District 66 and
- 28 became the first openly LGBTQ member of the Georgia General Assembly; and
- 29 WHEREAS, on June 26, 2003, the Supreme Court of the United States ruled in Lawrence
- 30 v. Texas that, under the 14th Amendment, states could not criminalize the private, intimate
- 31 relationships of same-sex couples; and
- 32 WHEREAS, the year 2012 marked the first year that all 50 states in the United States had a
- 33 least one openly LGBTQ elected official; and
- 34 WHEREAS, on June 26, 2013, the United States Supreme Court ruled, in *United States v*.
- 35 Windsor, that Section 3 of the Defense of Marriage Act (DOMA) was unconstitutional and
- 36 that the federal government cannot discriminate against married lesbian and gay couples for
- 37 the purposes of determining federal benefits and protections; and
- 38 WHEREAS, on June 26, 2015, the United States Supreme Court, in the case of *Obergefell*
- 39 v. Hodges, decided by a vote of 5-4 that the 14th Amendment requires all states to license
- 40 marriages between same-sex couples and to recognize all marriages that were lawfully
- 41 performed out of state; and
- 42 WHEREAS, during the 2015-2016 legislative session, both the Georgia House of
- 43 Representatives and the Senate passed House Bill 757, which would have allowed
- 44 state-sanctioned discrimination against the LGBTQ community; and
- WHEREAS, on March 28, 2016, Georgia Governor Nathan Deal vetoed House Bill 757,
- 46 stating, "I do not think we have to discriminate against anyone to protect the faith-based
- 47 community in Georgia....Georgia is a welcoming state, filled with warm, friendly, and loving
- 48 people....That is the character of Georgia. I intend to do my part to keep it that way."; and

49 WHEREAS, the month of June, 2018, should be recognized as LGBTQ Pride Month in the

- 50 United States to honor those who fought for the LGBTQ community and equality; and
- 51 WHEREAS, Atlanta Pride will be held during the months of September and October, 2018,
- 52 to celebrate LGBTQ progress and to remember the work that still remains; and
- 53 WHEREAS, the United States was founded on the principle that all persons are created
- 54 equal.
- 55 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES that
- 56 the members of this body encourage the celebration of the month of June, 2018, as LGBTQ
- 57 Pride Month across the United States and the celebration of Atlanta Pride during the months
- of September and October, 2018.
- 59 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Clerk of the House of Representatives is authorized
- and directed to make appropriate copies of this resolution available for distribution to the
- 61 public and the press.
