## A RESOLUTION

1 Honoring the life of the Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., and dedicating a road in his

2 memory; and for other purposes.

WHEREAS, the Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., stands as one of the most prominent
Georgians of the twentieth century; and

5 WHEREAS, Reverend King attended public school in Georgia, graduating from high school
6 at the age of 15, and received his bachelor's degree in 1948 from Morehouse College; and

WHEREAS, after three years of theological study at Crozer Theological Seminary in
Pennsylvania, where he was elected president of the senior class, he was awarded a divinity
degree in 1951, and, with a fellowship won at Crozer, he enrolled in graduate studies at
Boston University, completing his residence for the doctorate in 1953 and receiving his
doctoral degree in 1955; and

WHEREAS, in 1957, Reverend King was elected president of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, and, in the 11 years between 1957 and 1968, he traveled over six million miles and spoke over 2,500 times in support of civil rights and wrote five books as well as numerous articles; and WHEREAS, he led a massive protest in Birmingham, Alabama, that caught the attention of
the entire world, providing what he called a coalition of conscience and inspiring his "Letter
from a Birmingham Jail," a manifesto of the Civil Rights Movement in the United States; and

WHEREAS, Reverend King also planned and participated in numerous protests and
demonstrations for the cause of civil rights including the peaceful march on Washington,
D.C., of 250,000 people to whom he delivered his famous "I Have a Dream" address at the
Lincoln Memorial; and

WHEREAS, he was awarded five honorary degrees; was named Man of the Year by *Time*magazine in 1963; and, at the age of 35, was the youngest man to have been awarded the
Nobel Peace Prize; and

WHEREAS, through his tireless work on behalf of civil rights for all people, he became not
only the symbolic leader of African Americans in the United States but also a world figure
in the fight for justice for all; and

WHEREAS, it is abundantly fitting and proper that this remarkable and distinguishedGeorgian be recognized appropriately by dedicating a road in his memory.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AND ENACTED BY THE GENERAL
ASSEMBLY OF GEORGIA that the portion of Georgia Business Route 10 within the city
limits of Washington in Wilkes County is dedicated as the MLK Memorial Drive.

34 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Transportation is authorized and 35 directed to erect and maintain appropriate signs dedicating the MLK Memorial Drive.

- 36 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Clerk of the House of Representatives is authorized
- 37 and directed to make appropriate copies of this resolution available for distribution to the
- 38 family of the Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., and to the Department of Transportation.
