A RESOLUTION

1 Honoring the life of Mr. Carl Evans; dedicating an intersection in his memory; repealing a
2 certain resolution; repealing conflicting laws; and for other purposes.

3 WHEREAS, our nation's security continues to rely on patriotic men and women who put
4 their personal lives on hold in order to place themselves in harm's way to protect the
5 freedoms that all United States citizens cherish; and

6 WHEREAS, Mr. Evans served as a guardian of this nation's freedom and liberty with the
7 United States military, valiantly and courageously defending democracy during World War I;
8 and

9 WHEREAS, Mr. Evans demonstrated selfless service to this nation and an unyielding
10 commitment to protecting the people and ideals of the United States; and

11 WHEREAS, he embodied the spirit of service, willing to find meaning in something greater
12 than himself; and

13 WHEREAS, it is abundantly fitting and proper that this remarkable and distinguished
14 Georgian be recognized appropriately by dedicating an intersection in his memory.

15 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AND ENACTED BY THE GENERAL
16 ASSEMBLY OF GEORGIA:

- 17 (1) That the intersection of State Route 101 and Preacher Smith Road in Floyd County is
18 dedicated as the Private Carl Clifton Evans Memorial Intersection;
- 19 (2) That the Department of Transportation is authorized and directed to erect and maintain
20 appropriate signs dedicating the Private Carl Clifton Evans Memorial Intersection;
- 21 (3) That Part XIX and the nineteenth undesignated paragraph of Part XXIII of Senate
22 Resolution 844 (Ga. L. 2020, p. 832) are hereby repealed;
- 23 (4) That the Clerk of the House of Representatives is authorized and directed to make
24 appropriate copies of this resolution available for distribution to the family of
25 Mr. Carl Evans and to the Department of Transportation; and
- 26 (5) That all laws and parts of laws in conflict with this Resolution are repealed.
