A RESOLUTION

- 1 Creating the House Study Committee on the Economic Impact of Expanding the Renewable
- 2 Energy Market in Georgia; and for other purposes.
- 3 WHEREAS, the gross domestic product in the United States will grow at an average annual
- 4 rate of 2.9 percent per year through 2030, and electricity consumption will grow over this
- 5 same period at a rate of 0.8 percent per year, which means electric power consumption, and
- 6 the accompanying infrastructure to produce and deliver electricity, will be about 43 percent
- 7 greater in 2030 than it is today, and Georgia accounts for 3.7 percent of total United States
- 8 electricity consumption, ranking eighth nationally, and is the fourth-fastest growing state in
- 9 the nation; and
- 10 WHEREAS, between 2005 and 2010, 49 out of 50 states in this country experienced an
- increase in their average cost per kilowatt for electricity, and on average over the five years,
- 12 retail electricity costs in the United States increased by 4.1 percent annually and are
- 13 continuing to rise; and
- 14 WHEREAS, experience over the past ten years has demonstrated how the continued
- dependence on traditional fuel sources has an extreme impact on the economic well-being,
- security, and health of the people of the State of Georgia and the United States of America;
- 17 and
- 18 WHEREAS, the current economic models used to determine the generation cost per kilowatt
- 19 hour of various forms of electricity do not accurately take into account the totality of the
- 20 costs, including but not limited to government subsidies, long-term health care costs, and
- 21 water consumption; and
- WHEREAS, the State of Georgia spends more than \$33 billion annually to purchase energy
- 23 from other states, primarily from Texas, Kentucky, Louisiana, and Wyoming; and

24 WHEREAS, the State of Georgia has an abundance of renewable energy resources, including

- 25 solar, biomass, and recoverable resources, such as landfill gases and solid waste; and
- 26 WHEREAS, twenty-nine states plus two territories and Washington, D.C. have renewable
- 27 portfolio standards, and eight states and two territories have renewable portfolio goals; and
- 28 WHEREAS, renewable portfolio standards are the least expensive and most market friendly
- 29 method to grow America's renewable energy market and lessen our nation's dependence on
- 30 foreign oil; and
- 31 WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of the citizens of the State of Georgia to
- 32 comprehensively study the possible implications and ramifications of a state renewable
- 33 portfolio standard; and
- 34 WHEREAS, it is vital that the legislature recognize the crucial need to utilize the state's
- 35 renewable energy resources to reap an abundance of economic, environmental, and national
- 36 security benefits, and encourage further development of the renewable energy market in
- 37 Georgia by establishing goals for electric utility companies to implement renewable and
- 38 recoverable portfolio standards.

- 39 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES that
- 40 there is created the House Study Committee on the Economic Impact of Expanding the
- 41 Renewable Energy Market in Georgia to be composed of five members of the House of
- 42 Representatives to be appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives. The
- 43 Speaker of the House of Representatives shall select one of the members appointed as the
- 44 chairperson of the committee. The chairperson shall call all meetings of the committee.
- 45 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the committee shall undertake a study of the conditions,
- 46 needs, issues, and problems mentioned above or related thereto and recommend any actions
- 47 or legislation which the committee deems necessary or appropriate. The committee may
- 48 conduct such meetings at such places and at such times as it may deem necessary or
- 49 convenient to enable it to exercise fully and effectively its powers, perform its duties, and
- 50 accomplish the objectives and purposes of this resolution. The legislative members of the
- 52 legislative committees but shall receive the same for not more than five days unless

committee shall receive the allowances authorized for legislative members of interim

- 53 additional days are authorized. The funds necessary to carry out the provisions of this
- 54 resolution shall come from the funds appropriated to the House of Representatives. In the

55 event the committee makes a report of its findings and recommendations, with suggestions

- 56 for proposed legislation, if any, such report shall be made on or before December 31, 2013.
- 57 The committee shall stand abolished on December 31, 2013.
