A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT

- 1 To amend Article 4 of Chapter 11 of Title 16 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated,
- 2 relating to dangerous instrumentalities and practices, so as to define certain terms; to prohibit
- 3 the possession of an assault weapon; to prohibit the possession of a high-capacity magazine;
- 4 to change provisions relating to exemptions for the possession of assault weapons and
- 5 high-capacity magazines; to provide for enhanced penalties for the use of an assault weapon
- 6 or firearm with a high-capacity magazine during the commission of certain crimes; to
- 7 harmonize a cross-reference; to repeal conflicting laws; and for other purposes.

8 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF GEORGIA:

9 SECTION 1.

- 10 Article 4 of Chapter 11 of Title 16 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to
- dangerous instrumentalities and practices, is amended by revising Code Section 16-11-121,
- 12 relating to definitions, as follows:
- 13 "16-11-121.
- 14 As used in this part, the term:
- 15 (1) 'Antique firearm' means any firearm not designed or redesigned for using rim-fire or
- 16 conventional center-fire ignition with fixed ammunition and manufactured in or before
- 17 <u>1898, including any matchlock, flintlock, percussion cap, or similar type of ignition</u>
- system or replica thereof, whether actually manufactured before or after the year 1898,
- and any firearm using fixed ammunition manufactured in or before 1898, for which
- 20 <u>ammunition is no longer manufactured in the United States and is not readily available</u>
- in the ordinary channels of commercial trade.
- 22 (2) 'Assault weapon' means:
- 23 (A) A semiautomatic, center-fire rifle able to accept detachable magazines and any one
- 24 <u>of the following:</u>
- 25 (i) A pistol grip that protrudes conspicuously beneath the action of the weapon;
- 26 (ii) A forward pistol grip;
- 27 (iii) A thumbhole stock;

28 (iv) A folding or telescoping stock; 29 (v) A grenade launcher or flare launcher; or 30 (vi) A flash suppressor or a threaded barrel designed to accommodate a flash 31 suppressor; 32 (B) A semiautomatic, center-fire rifle that has a fixed magazine with the capacity to 33 accept more than ten rounds; 34 (C) A semiautomatic, center-fire rifle that has an overall length of less than 30 inches; (D) A semiautomatic pistol that has the capacity to accept a detachable magazine and 35 36 any one of the following: 37 (i) A threaded barrel capable of accepting a flash suppressor, forward handgrip, or 38 silencer; 39 (ii) A second handgrip; 40 (iii) A shroud that is attached to or partially or completely encircles the barrel, except a slide that encloses the barrel, that allows the bearer to fire the weapon without 41 42 burning the bearer's hand; or 43 (iv) The capacity to accept a detachable magazine at some location outside of the 44 pistol grip; 45 (E) A semiautomatic pistol with a fixed magazine that has the capacity to accept more 46 than ten rounds; 47 (F) A semiautomatic shotgun that has both of the following: 48 (i) A folding or telescoping stock; and 49 (ii) A pistol grip that protrudes conspicuously beneath the action of the weapon, 50 thumbhole stock, or vertical handgrip; 51 (G) A semiautomatic shotgun that has the ability to accept a detachable magazine; or 52 (H) Any shotgun with a revolving cylinder. 53 Such term shall not include any antique firearm or pistols sanctioned by the International Olympic Committee and by USA Shooting that were used for Olympic target shooting 54 55 purposes as of June 30, 2013. 56 (3) 'Dangerous weapon' means any weapon commonly known as a 'rocket launcher,' 'bazooka,' or 'recoilless rifle' which fires explosive or nonexplosive rockets designed to 57 58 injure or kill personnel or destroy heavy armor, or similar weapon used for such purpose. 59 The term shall also mean a weapon commonly known as a 'mortar' which fires high explosive from a metallic cylinder and which is commonly used by the armed forces as 60

an antipersonnel weapon or similar weapon used for such purpose. The term shall also

mean a weapon commonly known as a 'hand grenade' or other similar weapon which is

designed to explode and injure personnel or similar weapon used for such purpose. The

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64 term shall also mean an assault weapon and any weapon equipped with a high-capacity

- 65 <u>magazine.</u>
- 66 (4) 'High-capacity magazine' means a magazine capable of holding more than ten rounds
- of ammunition, but shall not include any of the following:
- 68 (A) A feeding device that has been permanently altered so that it cannot accommodate
- 69 <u>more than ten rounds</u>;
- 70 (B) A .22 caliber tube ammunition feeding device; or
- 71 (C) A tubular magazine that is contained in a lever-action firearm.
- 72 (2)(5) 'Machine gun' means any weapon which shoots or is designed to shoot,
- automatically, more than six shots, without manual reloading, by a single function of the
- 74 trigger.
- 75 (6) 'Magazine' means any ammunition feeding device.
- 76 $\frac{(3)(7)}{(3)}$ 'Person' means any individual, partnership, company, association, or corporation.
- 77 (4)(8) 'Sawed-off rifle' means a weapon designed or redesigned, made or remade, and
- intended to be fired from the shoulder; and designed or redesigned, made or remade, to
- use the energy of the explosive in a fixed metallic cartridge to fire only a single projectile
- through a rifle bore for each single pull of the trigger; and which has a barrel or barrels
- of less than 16 inches in length or has an overall length of less than 26 inches.
- 82 (5)(9) 'Sawed-off shotgun' means a shotgun or any weapon made from a shotgun whether
- by alteration, modification, or otherwise having one or more barrels less than 18 inches
- in length or if such weapon as modified has an overall length of less than 26 inches.
- 85 (6)(10) 'Shotgun' means a weapon designed or redesigned, made or remade, and intended
- to be fired from the shoulder; and designed or redesigned, and made or remade, to use the
- 87 energy of the explosive in a fixed shotgun shell to fire through a smooth bore either a
- number of ball shot or a single projectile for each single pull of the trigger.
- 89 $\frac{7}{(11)}$ 'Silencer' means any device for silencing or diminishing the report of any
- 90 portable weapon such as a rifle, carbine, pistol, revolver, machine gun, shotgun, fowling
- piece, or other device from which a shot, bullet, or projectile may be discharged by an
- 92 explosive."
- 93 **SECTION 2.**
- 94 Said article is further amended by revising Code Section 16-11-122, relating to possession
- 95 of sawed off shotgun or rifle, machine gun, silencer, or dangerous weapon prohibited, as
- 96 follows:

- 97 "16-11-122.
- No person shall have in his <u>or her</u> possession any sawed-off shotgun, sawed-off rifle,
- 99 machine gun, dangerous weapon, or silencer except as provided in Code Section
- 100 16-11-124."

101 SECTION 3.

- Said article is further amended by revising Code Section 16-11-124, relating to exemptions
- 103 from application of this part, as follows:
- 104 "16-11-124.
- 105 (a) This part shall not apply to:
- 106 (1) A peace officer of any duly authorized police agency of this state or of any political
- subdivision thereof, or a law enforcement officer of any department or agency of the
- 108 United States who is regularly employed and paid by the United States, this state, or any
- such political subdivision, or an employee of the Department of Corrections of this state
- who is authorized in writing by the commissioner of corrections to transfer or possess
- such firearms while in the official performance of his or her duties;
- 112 (2) A member of the National Guard or of the armed forces of the United States to wit:
- the army, navy, marine corps, air force, or coast guard who, while serving therein,
- possesses such firearm in the line of duty;
- 115 (3) Any sawed-off shotgun, sawed-off rifle, machine gun, dangerous weapon, or silencer
- which has been modified or changed to the extent that it is inoperative. Examples of the
- requisite modification include weapons with their barrel or barrels filled with lead, hand
- grenades filled with sand, or other nonexplosive materials;
- (4) Possession of a sawed-off shotgun, sawed-off rifle, machine gun, dangerous weapon,
- or silencer by a person who is authorized to possess the same because he or she has
- registered the sawed-off shotgun, sawed-off rifle, machine gun, dangerous weapon, or
- silencer in accordance with the dictates of the National Firearms Act, 68A Stat. 725 (26
- 123 U.S.C. Sections 5841-5862); and
- 124 (5) A security officer employed by a federally licensed nuclear power facility or a
- licensee of such facility, including a contract security officer, who is trained and qualified
- under a security plan approved by the United States Nuclear Regulatory Commission or
- other federal agency authorized to regulate nuclear facility security; provided, however,
- that this exemption shall apply only while such security officer is acting in connection
- with his or her official duties on the premises of such nuclear power facility or on
- properties outside the facility property pursuant to a written agreement entered into with
- the local law enforcement agency having jurisdiction over the facility. The exemption
- under this paragraph does not include the possession of silencers.

(b) The Department of Law shall create rules and regulations to exempt models of competitive pistols that would otherwise fall within the definition of 'assault weapon' from being classified as an assault weapon. The exempt competitive pistols may be based on recommendations by USA Shooting consistent with the regulations contained in the USA Shooting official rules or may be based on the recommendation or rules of any other organization that the department deems relevant."

139 **SECTION 4.**

- 140 Said article is further amended by revising subsection (a) of Code Section 16-11-151, relating
- 141 to prohibited training, as follows:
- 142 "(a) As used in this Code section, the term 'dangerous weapon' has the same meaning as
- found in paragraph (1) of Code Section 16-11-121."
- SECTION 5.
- Said article is further amended by revising paragraph (1) of subsection (a) of Code Section
- 146 16-11-160, relating to the use of machine guns, sawed-off rifles, sawed-off shotguns, or
- 147 firearms with silencers during the commission of certain offenses, as follows:
- "(a)(1) It shall be unlawful for any person to possess or to use a machine gun, sawed-off
- rifle, sawed-off shotgun, or a firearm equipped with a silencer, assault weapon, or firearm
- equipped with a high-capacity magazine, as those terms are defined in Code Section
- 151 16-11-121, during the commission or the attempted commission of any of the following
- offenses:
- (A) Aggravated assault as defined in Code Section 16-5-21;
- (B) Aggravated battery as defined in Code Section 16-5-24;
- 155 (C) Robbery as defined in Code Section 16-8-40;
- (D) Armed robbery as defined in Code Section 16-8-41;
- (E) Murder or felony murder as defined in Code Section 16-5-1;
- (F) Voluntary manslaughter as defined in Code Section 16-5-2;
- (G) Involuntary manslaughter as defined in Code Section 16-5-3;
- 160 (H) Sale, possession for sale, transportation, manufacture, offer for sale, or offer to
- manufacture controlled substances in violation of any provision of Article 2 of Chapter
- 162 13 of this title, the 'Georgia Controlled Substances Act';
- (I) Terroristic threats or acts as defined in Code Section 16-11-37;
- (J) Arson as defined in Code Section 16-7-60, 16-7-61, or 16-7-62 or arson of lands as
- defined in Code Section 16-7-63;
- 166 (K) Influencing witnesses as defined in Code Section 16-10-93; and
- 167 (L) Participation in criminal gang activity as defined in Code Section 16-15-4."

168 **SECTION 6.**

All laws and parts of laws in conflict with this Act are repealed.
