AS PASSED SENATE

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT

- 1 To amend Title 2 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to agriculture, so as to
- 2 enact the "Food Insecurity Eradication Act"; to provide for definitions; to create the Georgia
- 3 Food Security Advisory Council; to provide for duties; to provide for appointments and
- 4 reimbursements; to provide for reporting requirements; to provide for related matters; to
- 5 provide for an effective date and automatic repeal; to repeal conflicting laws; and for other
- 6 purposes.

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BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF GEORGIA:

8 SECTION 1.

- 9 Title 2 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to agriculture, is amended by 10 adding a new chapter to read as follows:
- 11 "<u>CHAPTER 24</u>
- 12 2-24-1.
- 13 This chapter shall be known and may be cited as the 'Georgia Food Insecurity Eradication
- 14 Act.'

- 15 2-24-2.
- 16 As used in this chapter, the term:
- 17 (1) 'Council' means the Georgia Food Security Advisory Council.
- 18 (2) 'Food bank' means an established nonprofit charitable organization which is qualified
- as exempt from taxation under the provisions of Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal
- 20 Revenue Code of 1986 and which, as part of an existing food bank network, maintains
- 21 a food distribution operation providing food to nonprofit food pantries and feeding
- 22 centers that offer groceries or meals to persons in need of food assistance.
- 23 (3) 'Food insecurity' means a household-level economic and social condition of limited
- or uncertain access to adequate food.
- 25 (4) 'SNAP' means the federally and state funded Georgia State Nutrition Assistance
- 26 Program and the Georgia Grown Farm to Food Bank Program.
- 27 (5) 'WIC program' means the federally funded health and nutrition program for infants
- and children aged one to five years (including foster children), pregnant women,
- breastfeeding mothers (up to one year), postpartum women (up to six months), and a
- 30 low-income parent or guardian who is the sole provider of children under age five who
- 31 are at risk of food insecurity and who are at or below 185 percent of the federal poverty
- 32 level.
- 33 2-24-3.
- 34 (a) There is established the Georgia Food Security Advisory Council created within the
- 35 Department of Agriculture, and the council shall:
- 36 (1) Advise the General Assembly and all state agencies as appropriate on best practices
- 37 to alleviate food insecurity;
- 38 (2) Recommend regulatory solutions to the WIC program. The solutions should include
- but are not necessarily limited to changes that support an easier process for grocery store
- 40 owners and other food providers who obtain and maintain their WIC license;

41 (3) Recommend ways the State of Georgia can use tax credits, including the New Market

- 42 Tax Credit, as an economic incentive to create and maintain grocery stores in
- 43 <u>food-insecure areas</u>;
- 44 (4) Recommend ways to maximize current educational programs that educate the public
- on purchasing and consuming healthy foods;
- 46 (5) Recommend ways to maximize current funding efforts to assist food banks and food
- 47 pantries;
- 48 (6) Recommend policies which expand the number of farmers' markets which may
- 49 <u>accept SNAP benefits;</u>
- 50 (7) Recommend policies that encourage the use of food co-ops and community gardens
- 51 <u>located in Georgia;</u>
- 52 (8) Recommend policies that increase collaboration between the State of Georgia and
- 53 <u>nonprofits which seek to eradicate food insecurity;</u>
- 54 (9) Recommend policies that increase collaboration between the State of Georgia and
- private entities which seek to end food insecurity;
- 56 (10) Create bylaws not in conflict with this Code section;
- 57 (11) Research and identify best practices to reduce food insecurity;
- 58 (12) Publish on the council's website a list of existing publicly accessible resources on
- 59 research and best practices for agencies, departments, and organizations to use in
- 60 <u>alleviating food insecurity; and</u>
- 61 (13) Solicit and accept donations, gifts, grants, property, or matching funds from any
- 62 public or private source for use by the council in conducting the activities required
- 63 pursuant to this Code section.
- 64 2-24-4.
- 65 (a) The Georgia Food Security Advisory Council shall consist of at least 16 members as
- 66 <u>follows:</u>

- 67 (1) Three ex officio members as follows:
- (A) The Commissioner of Agriculture or his or her designee;
- 69 (B) The Commissioner of Labor or his or her designee;
- 70 (C) The State School Superintendent or his or her designee;
- 71 (2) Four members appointed by the Governor as follows:
- 72 (A) One citizen who shall serve as chairperson of the council and who shall not be a
- 73 <u>state employee;</u>
- 74 (B) One representative from the Department of Public Health;
- 75 (C)The Commissioner of the Department of Human Services or his or her designee;
- 76 (D) One representative from an institution of higher learning dedicated to alleviating
- food insecurity;
- 78 (3) Five members appointed by the Lieutenant Governor as follows:
- 79 (A) One representative from a hospital or health system with programming seeking to
- 80 <u>end food insecurity;</u>
- 81 (B) One representative from an organization dedicated to solving food insecurity by
- using scientific methods and research based principles;
- 83 (C) One representative from a food policy council;
- 84 (D) One grocery or retail store owner or operator; and
- 85 (E) One representative from a municipal chamber of commerce located in an urban
- 86 area;
- 87 (4) Four members appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives as follows:
- 88 (A) One Georgia farmer;
- 89 (B) One CEO of a food bank or food bank supporting organization that is part of a
- 90 statewide network dedicated to solving food insecurity through increased access to
- 91 <u>emergency food assistance and other federal nutrition programs;</u>
- 92 (C) One representative from a municipal chamber of commerce located in an urban
- 93 <u>area; and</u>

94 (D) One representative who is or is an agent of an owner or operator of a Georgia

- 95 farmers' market.
- 96 (b) Any vacancy on the council resulting from the resignation of a member or otherwise
- 97 <u>shall be filled in the same manner in which the original appointment was made.</u>
- 98 (c) The council members shall receive no salary, but may be allowed a per diem and travel
- 99 expenses as allowed by law and available appropriations. Non-ex officio members of the
- 100 council shall be reimbursed by the Department of Agriculture. Ex officio members shall
- be reimbursed by their respective agencies.
- 102 <u>2-24-5.</u>
- 103 (a) Meetings shall be at the call of the chairperson. Meetings may be held in person or
- virtually as often as the chairperson deems necessary, but shall not be held fewer than four
- times each calendar year. The council shall provide meaningful opportunities for public
- input at meetings.
- 107 (b) The Department of Agriculture shall provide a space in either Atlanta, Georgia, or
- another designated space as agreed upon by the majority of the council for the purposes of
- 109 council meetings.
- 110 2-24-6.
- 111 (a) Beginning July 1, 2024, and no later than July 1 of each year thereafter, the council
- shall submit a report to the Governor and General Assembly reporting:
- 113 (1) Any and all activities undertaken by the council in the past year, and any progress
- made toward the mission of the council;
- 115 (2) The status of funding of the council, including any grant funds solicited, accepted,
- or used and any remaining balances; and
- 117 (3) Recommendations for actions or policies that may be undertaken by the Governor or
- the General Assembly to alleviate food insecurity.

119 (b) Prior to submission, a draft of the annual report shall be made available for

- dissemination and public comment at a public meeting.
- 121 <u>2-24-7.</u>
- 122 This chapter shall stand automatically repealed on June 30, 2026."
- 123 **SECTION 2.**
- 124 This Act shall become effective upon its approval by the Governor or upon its becoming law
- 125 without such approval.
- 126 SECTION 3.
- 127 All laws and parts of laws in conflict with this Act are repealed.
