AS PASSED SENATE

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT

- 1 To amend Article 1 of Chapter 5 of Title 49 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated,
- 2 relating to children and youth services, so as to allow a child-placing agency to decline to
- 3 accept a referral from the department and decline to perform services not referred under a
- 4 contract with the department based on the child-placing agency's sincerely held religious
- 5 beliefs; to prevent the department from discriminating against or causing any adverse action
- 6 against a child-placing agency based on its sincerely held religious beliefs; to provide for
- 7 assertion of such rights; to provide for definitions; to provide for a short title; to provide for
- 8 legislative findings; to provide for related matters; to repeal conflicting laws; and for other
- 9 purposes.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF GEORGIA:

SECTION 1.

- 12 This Act may be known and may be cited as the "Keep Faith in Adoption and Foster Care
- 13 Act."

14 SECTION 2.

- 15 The General Assembly finds that maintaining a diverse network of adoption and foster care
- 16 service providers which accommodate children from various cultural backgrounds is a high
- 17 priority of this state such that reasonable accommodations should be made to allow people
- 18 of different geographical regions, backgrounds, and beliefs to remain within and become a
- 19 part of such network. The General Assembly finds that it is important that decisions
- 20 regarding the placement of children be made using the best interests of the child standard,
- 21 including using child-placing organizations best able to provide for a child's physical,
- 22 psychological, spiritual, and emotional needs and development. The General Assembly finds
- 23 that child-placing agencies have the right to provide services in accordance with the agencies'
- 24 sincerely held religious beliefs.

- 26 Article 1 of Chapter 5 of Title 49 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to
- 27 children and youth services, is amended by adding a new Code section to read as follows:
- 28 "49-5-25.
- 29 (a) As used in this Code section, the term 'adverse action' means an action that results in,
- 30 <u>directly or indirectly, the denial of funding; the refusal to renew funding; the cancellation</u>
- 31 of funding; the denial of a contract for services; the refusal to renew a contract for services;
- 32 the cancellation of a contract for services; the denial of a license; the refusal to renew a
- 33 <u>license</u>; the cancellation of a license; an enforcement action; deterrence or prevention of
- reasonable actions; and any other similar action that materially alters the terms of funding,
- 35 <u>a contract, or a license.</u>
- 36 (b) When making referrals for adoption or foster care services to child-placing agencies
- 37 <u>under contract with the department, the department shall use its best efforts to refer services</u>
- 38 to a child-placing agency that is able to provide such services. If a child-placing agency
- 39 <u>declines to accept the department's referral, the department shall not use such declination</u>
- 40 <u>in determining whether such referral is in the best interests of the child.</u> To the extent
- 41 <u>allowed by federal law, including compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act and</u>
- 42 <u>Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, a child-placing agency may decline to accept a</u>
- 43 <u>referral for adoption or foster care services under a contract with the department based on</u>
- 44 <u>the child-placing agency's sincerely held religious beliefs.</u> If a child-placing agency
- declines to accept a referral, the department shall immediately refer those services to
- 46 <u>another child-placing agency</u>. The department shall not take any adverse action against a
- 47 <u>child-placing agency or an organization that seeks to become a child-placing agency on the</u>
- basis, wholly or partly, that such child-placing agency or organization has declined to
- 49 <u>accept a referral for adoption or foster care services that do not comply with such</u>
- 50 <u>child-placing agency's or organization's sincerely held religious beliefs.</u>
- 51 (c) For services not referred under a contract with the department, a child-placing agency
- 52 <u>may decline to perform any service that conflicts with the child-placing agency's sincerely</u>
- 53 <u>held religious beliefs, and the department shall not take any adverse action against such</u>
- 54 <u>child-placing agency for declining to perform such service.</u>
- 55 (d) The department or child-placing agency may assert this Code section as a defense in
- 56 any judicial or administrative proceeding and otherwise allowed by law. Nothing in this
- 57 Code section shall be construed to constitute a waiver of sovereign immunity of the state
- or any of its boards, departments, bureaus, or agencies, or any officer or employee thereof."

SECTION 4.

60 All laws and parts of laws in conflict with this Act are repealed.
