A RESOLUTION

- 1 Commemorating the 50th Anniversary of the passage of the Georgia Water Quality Control
- 2 Act and commending the water professionals, government officials, environmental
- 3 community, legal community, media, and citizens of Georgia for their role in improving and
- 4 enhancing the quality of all of Georgia's water resources; and for other purposes.
- 5 WHEREAS, the Georgia Water Quality Control Act was passed by the Georgia General
- 6 Assembly and signed into law in 1964 by Governor Carl Sanders; and
- 7 WHEREAS, at that time, there were 25 communities in Georgia which had no public sewer
- 8 system; 40 communities with a sewer system but no treatment facilities; 60 communities
- 9 with a sewer system but only primary treatment facilities; 50 communities with a sewer
- 10 system and secondary treatment facilities which were in need of improvement; and 395
- industries which had documented untreated or inadequately treated discharges to Georgia's
- 12 surface waters; and
- 13 WHEREAS, at the time of passage of the Act, many of Georgia's surface waters were
- 14 extremely polluted, and serious water quality problems existed all over the State of Georgia;
- 15 and
- 16 WHEREAS, the state established the Georgia Water Quality Control Board (later
- 17 reconstituted as the Georgia Environmental Protection Division as a result of the 1972
- 18 Reorganization of State Government under Governor Jimmy Carter) and Governor Sanders
- 19 appointed R.S. "Rock" Howard to be the board's executive secretary; and
- 20 WHEREAS, by the time the Federal Water Quality Control Act was passed in 1972, most
- 21 of Georgia's industries had been brought into compliance with the initial requirements of the
- 22 federal Act; and

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23 WHEREAS, over the ensuing four decades, billions of federal, state, and local dollars have

- been invested in planning, designing, and constructing modern publicly owned wastewater
- 25 treatment facilities throughout the state; and
- 26 WHEREAS, Georgia's water professionals are committed to operating these facilities to
- 27 maintain consistent compliance with extremely stringent standards; and
- 28 WHEREAS, both publicly and privately owned facilities have performed so well that they
- are no longer the most significant threat to Georgia's waters; and
- 30 WHEREAS, the quality of Georgia's waters has improved dramatically throughout this great
- 31 state over the 50 years since the passage of the original Act; and
- 32 WHEREAS, it is imperative that these improvements be sustained while continuing our
- 33 efforts to educate Georgians of their growing responsibility in the reduction of non-point
- 34 sources of pollution to Georgia's waters.
- 35 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE that the members of this body
- 36 commemorate the 50th anniversary of the passage of the Georgia Water Quality Control Act
- 37 and commend the water professionals, regulators, government officials, environmental
- 38 community, media, and citizens of Georgia for their role in the vast improvements in the
- 39 quality of water in Georgia's streams, rivers, lakes, and other water bodies over the past five
- 40 decades.
- 41 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that, in recognition of the often overlooked contributions of
- 42 water professionals to protecting our state's water resources and to ensuring that public water
- 43 systems provide Georgia's citizens with a reliable and safe supply of drinking water, the
- 44 members of this body commend the Georgia Association of Water Professionals and the
- 45 Georgia Rural Water Association and their members, and designate March 12, 2014, as
- 46 "Thank a Water Professional" Day at the state capitol.
- 47 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Secretary of the Senate is authorized and directed
- 48 to transmit an appropriate copy of this resolution to the Georgia Association of Water
- 49 Professionals and the Georgia Rural Water Association.
