IN THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

HOUSE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 5

BY HEALTH AND WELFARE COMMITTEE

A JOINT MEMORIAL

TO THE SENATE AND THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE UNITED STATES IN CON-GRESS ASSEMBLED, AND TO THE CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION REPRESENTING THE STATE OF IDAHO IN THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES.

We, your Memorialists, the House of Representatives and the Senate of the State of Idaho assembled in the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature, do hereby respectfully represent that:

WHEREAS, Article 1, Section 23, of the Constitution of the State of Idaho provides in part that: "The rights to hunt, fish and trap, including by the use of traditional methods, are a valued part of the heritage of the State of Idaho and shall forever be preserved for the people and managed through the laws, rules and proclamations that preserve the future of hunting, fishing and trapping. Public hunting, fishing and trapping of wildlife shall be a preferred means of managing wildlife."; and

WHEREAS, Section 36-103, Idaho Code, provides that: "All wildlife, including all wild animals, wild birds, and fish, within the state of Idaho, is hereby declared to be the property of the state of Idaho. It shall be preserved, protected, perpetuated, and managed. It shall be only captured or taken at such times or places, under such conditions, or by such means, or in such manner, as will preserve, protect, and perpetuate such wildlife, and provide for the citizens of this state and, as by law permitted to others, continued supplies of such wildlife for hunting, fishing and trapping."; and

WHEREAS, Idaho is responsible for managing all wildlife wherever it is located within the borders of the State of Idaho, drawing upon the best available science to monitor the size and health of wildlife populations throughout the state; and

WHEREAS, In May of 2011, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service delisted gray wolves in the Northern Rockies and Western Great Lakes and Idaho resumed management of gray wolves within the state's boundaries with continued monitoring and reporting requirements. Based on the delisting, the Idaho Fish and Game Commission directed the Fish and Game Department to: Manage wolves in a manner that will ensure wolves remain under responsible state management in conjunction with the rest of Idaho's wildlife; (2) Manage wolves as big game animals consistent with the goals and objectives of the 2002 Idaho Wolf Conservation and Management Plan approved by the Idaho Legislature and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to keep wolves off the Endangered Species List; (3) Control wolves where they depredate on livestock and other domestic animals or threaten human safety; (4) Control the population of wolves and other predators as needed to address areas where elk or other prey populations are below management objectives; (5) Develop wolf hunting season recommendations for consideration by the commission and develop trapping recommendations; and (6) Conduct additional species management planning as appropriate; and

WHEREAS, given the state's wildlife management responsibilities, agencies of the state and their designees should be afforded full access to all state and federal lands within the state, as well as all means of wilderness entry and animal tracking, for these management purposes. Furthermore, mandating the destruction of data acquired from tracking wildlife by entry on federal lands is a heavy-handed interference with the possession of chattels that by right belong to the State of Idaho, contrary to the best science practices for wildlife management, and needlessly hostile to the spirit of cooperation needed to properly steward the wildlife resources with which Idaho has been blessed.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth Idaho Legislature, the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that we urge Idaho's congressional delegation and all members of the United States Congress to take necessary action to authorize the State of Idaho, its agencies and designees, full access to all state and federal lands within the state, as well as all means of wilderness entry and animal tracking, to fulfill wildlife management responsibilities of the State of Idaho.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives be, and she is hereby authorized and directed to forward a copy of this Memorial to the President of the United States, the Secretary of the Interior, the Secretary of Agriculture, the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives of Congress, and to the congressional delegation representing the State of Idaho in the Congress of the United States.
