AN ACT

- RELATING TO THE BARBER AND COSMETOLOGY SERVICES ACT; AMENDING SECTION 2 54-5802, IDAHO CODE, TO REVISE A DEFINITION; AMENDING SECTION 54-5810, 3 IDAHO CODE, TO PROVIDE FOR BARBER AND BARBER-STYLIST APPRENTICESHIP 4 5 AND TO MAKE TECHNICAL CORRECTIONS; AND AMENDING SECTION 54-5817, IDAHO CODE, TO PROVIDE FOR BARBER AND BARBER-STYLIST APPRENTICESHIP. 6
- Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Idaho: 7

8 SECTION 1. That Section 54-5802, Idaho Code, be, and the same is hereby g amended to read as follows:

54-5802. DEFINITIONS. As used in this chapter: 10

(1) "Apprentice" means a person registered with the barber and cosme-11 12 tology services licensing board to learn an occupation in a licensed establishment who, while so learning, performs or assists in performing any prac-13 tices of barbering, barber-styling, or cosmetology. 14

(2) "Approved or licensed school" means a postsecondary barber or cos-15 16 metology school that:

(a) Is licensed under its official name by the barber and cosmetology 17 services licensing board; and 18

(b) Admits as students only those individuals who meet the requirements 19 of paragraphs (a) and (b) in section 54-5810(7), Idaho Code. 20

(3) "Barber" means a person licensed to practice barbering as defined 21 22 in this section.

23 (4) "Barbering" means any one (1) or any combination of the following practices when performed on the upper part of the human body for cosmetic 24 purposes and not for the treatment of disease or physical or mental ailments: 25 (a) Shaving the face or cutting, trimming, arranging, dressing, curl-

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ing, cleansing, singeing or performing similar work on the hair;

- (b) Fitting, cutting or dressing hairpieces or toupees;
- (c) Giving facial and scalp massages or treatments with oils, creams, 29 lotions or other preparations, either by hand or by a mechanical appli-30
- ance; and 31
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 - (d) Applying cosmetic preparations, antiseptics, powders, oils, clays 33 or lotions to the scalp, face, neck or other parts of the upper body.

(5) "Barber-styling" means any one (1) or any combination of the fol-34 lowing practices when performed on the upper part of the human body for cos-35 36 metic purposes and not for the treatment of disease or physical or mental ailments: 37

(a) Shaving the face or cutting, trimming, arranging, dressing, curl-38 ing, waving by any method, straightening, cleansing, singeing, bleach-39 40 ing, coloring or performing similar work on the hair;

(b) Fitting, cutting or dressing hairpieces or toupees; 41

(c) Giving facial and scalp massages or treatments with oils, creams, 1 2 lotions or other preparations, either by hand or by a mechanical appliance; and 3 (d) Applying cosmetic preparations, antiseptics, powders, oils, clays 4 or lotions to the scalp, face, neck or other parts of the upper body. 5 "Barber-stylist" means a person licensed to practice bar-6 (6) 7 ber-styling as defined in this section. (7) "Board" means the barber and cosmetology services licensing board 8 established by section 54-5806, Idaho Code. 9 (8) "Bureau" means the bureau of occupational licenses. 10 11 (9) "Cosmetologist" means a person licensed to practice cosmetology as defined in this section. 12 (10) "Cosmetology" means any one (1) or any combination of the following 13 practices when performed on the human body for cosmetic purposes and not for 14 the treatment of disease or physical or mental ailments: 15 16 (a) Cutting, trimming, arranging, dressing, curling, waving by any method, cleansing, singeing, bleaching, coloring or performing similar 17 work on the hair; 18 (b) Fitting, cutting or dressing hairpieces or toupees; 19 Noninvasive care of the skin by application of cosmetic prepa-20 (C) 21 rations, antiseptics, tonics, lotions, creams and essential oils to cleanse, massage, exfoliate, hydrate and stimulate; makeup ap-22 plication; pore extraction; use of chemical exfoliants approved for 23 professional esthetic use; particle exfoliation; use of any class I 24 medical device, as classified by the United States food and drug admin-25 istration, designed for care of the skin, except that a class II medical 26 device designed for care of the skin may be used as directed and super-27 vised by an authorized and licensed health care practitioner; temporary 28 removal of superfluous hair by lotions, creams, waxing, tweezing, de-29 pilatories or other means; and tinting or perming the eyebrows and 30 eyelashes; and 31 (d) Manicuring and pedicuring nails and applying artificial nails. 32 (11) "Department" means the Idaho department of self-governing agen-33 34 cies. (12) "Electrologist" means a person licensed to practice electrology, 35 as defined in this section, and skilled in the permanent removal of unwanted 36 hair. 37 (13) "Electrology" or "electrolysis" means the permanent removal of 38 39 hair by destroying the hair-producing cells of the skin and vascular system through the use of equipment and devices approved by and registered with the 40 United States food and drug administration. 41 (14) "Establishment" means a place licensed under this chapter, other 42 than a licensed school, where barbering, barber-styling, cosmetology or 43 electrology is practiced. 44 (15) "Esthetician" means a person licensed to practice esthetics as de-45 fined in this section. 46 (16) "Esthetics" means noninvasive care of the skin by application of 47 cosmetic preparations, antiseptics, tonics, lotions, creams and essential 48 oils to cleanse, massage, exfoliate, hydrate and stimulate; makeup applica-49 tion; pore extraction; use of chemical exfoliants approved for professional 50

esthetic use; particle exfoliation; use of any class I medical device, as classified by the United States food and drug administration, designed for are of the skin, except that a class II medical device designed for care of the skin may be used as directed and supervised by an authorized and licensed health care practitioner; temporary removal of superfluous hair by lotions, creams, waxing, tweezing, depilatories or other means; and tinting or perming the eyebrows and eyelashes.

8 (17) "Haircutter" means a person licensed to practice haircutting as9 defined in this section.

(18) "Haircutting" means cutting, trimming, arranging, dressing, curl ing, cleansing, singeing or performing similar work on the hair and fitting,
 cutting or dressing hairpieces or toupees.

(19) "Instructor" means a barber, barber-stylist or cosmetologist li censed to teach barbering, barber-styling or cosmetology in a barber school,
 a cosmetology school or an establishment meeting the requirements for apprenticeship training.

(20) "Instructor trainee" means a barber, barber-stylist or cosmetologist attending a licensed school to receive training to teach barbering,
barber-styling or cosmetology.

(21) "Makeover or glamour photography business" means a business offer ing photographic services to the general public in which the business's em ployees apply cosmetic products to customers' faces or arrange the hair of
 customers in connection with the sale or attempted sale of photographic ser vices.

(22) "Makeup artist" means a person certificated to practice makeupartistry as defined in this section.

(23) "Makeup artistry" means noninvasive care of the skin by application of cosmetic preparations for cleansing and the application of makeup,
which includes the application of cosmetics or any pigment product that is
used to cover, camouflage or decorate the skin.

31 (24) "Nail technician" means a person licensed to practice nail tech-32 nology as defined in this section.

33 (25) "Nail technology" means any one (1) or more of the following prac-34 tices when performed on the human body:

- (a) Manicuring and pedicuring nails;
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(b) Applying artificial nails; and

(c) Massaging the hands and feet.

(26) "Nail technology instructor" means a nail technician licensed toteach nail technology at a school of cosmetology.

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(27) "Person" means a human individual.

(28) "Retail cosmetics dealer" means a stationary business offering
cosmetic products for sale at retail to the general public, in which the
business's employees apply cosmetic products to customers' faces in connection with the sale or attempted sale of the products without compensation
from the customer other than the regular price of the products.

(29) "Retail thermal styling equipment dealer" means a retail business
that offers thermal styling equipment, such as curling irons, curling wands,
flat irons, heated hair rollers, blow-dryers or other devices using heat to
style hair, for sale at retail to members of the general public and whose employees engage in the limited use of thermal styling equipment on customers

in connection with the sale or attempted sale of the equipment without com-pensation from the customer other than the regular price of the equipment.

3 (30) "Student" means a person learning barbering, barber-styling, cos4 metology or electrology at a licensed school who, while so learning, per5 forms or assists in performing any practices of barbering, barber-styling,
6 cosmetology or electrology.

7 SECTION 2. That Section 54-5810, Idaho Code, be, and the same is hereby 8 amended to read as follows:

54-5810. QUALIFICATIONS FOR LICENSURE -- INSTRUCTORS -- APPRENTICES 9 10 -- STUDENTS. (1) To qualify for licensure under this chapter, an applicant for licensure must: 11 12 (a) Be at least sixteen and one-half (16 1/2) years of age; (b) Have completed at least two (2) years of high school or have at-13 tained an equivalent education as determined by the board; 14 (c) Be of good moral character; and 15 16 (d) Pass an examination for the occupation in which the applicant is seeking licensure, which examination shall be conducted or approved by 17 the board. 18 (2) Except as otherwise provided, and in addition to the requirements 19 listed in subsection (1) of this section, an applicant for licensure: 20 21 (a) As a barber, must have: (i) Ceompleted and graduated from a course of instruction of at 22 least nine hundred (900) hours in a barber school approved by the 23 board; or 24 (ii) Completed at least one thousand eight hundred (1,800) hours 25 26 as an apprentice in an apprenticeship that covered all aspects of the practice of barbering; 27 (b) As a barber-stylist, must have: 28 Ceompleted and graduated from a course of instruction of at 29 (i) least one thousand five hundred (1, 500) hours in a barber school 30 approved by the board; or 31 (ii) Completed at least three thousand (3,000) hours as an appren-32 tice in an apprenticeship that covered all aspects of the practice 33 of barber-styling; 34 (c) As a cosmetologist_ must have: 35 Completed and graduated from a course of instruction of at (i) 36 least one thousand six hundred (1,600) hours in a cosmetology 37 school approved by the board; or 38 (ii) Completed at least three thousand two hundred (3,200) hours 39 as an apprentice in an apprenticeship that covered all aspects of 40 the practice of cosmetology; 41 42 (d) As an electrologist, must have: Completed and graduated from a course of instruction of at 43 (i) least six hundred (600) hours in a school approved by the board; or 44 (ii) Completed at least one thousand two hundred (1,200) hours as 45 an apprentice in a cosmetology establishment under the direct per-46 47 sonal supervision of a licensed electrologist instructor. Such establishment must have at least one (1) licensed electrologist 48 49 on-site in accordance with board rules;

26		(i) A minimum six (6) month course of barber instructing as a stu-
27		dent in a licensed barber school; or
28		(ii) A minimum three (3) month course of barber instructing as a
29		student in a licensed barber school, if the applicant has at least
30		two (2) years of experience as a licensed barber.
31		To qualify as a barber-stylist instructor, an applicant must:
32		Hold a current barber-stylist license or a cosmetologist license;

46	(b)	Hold a current license as a cosmetologist, electrologist, estheti-
47		n or nail technician; and
48		Have at least five (5) years of experience as a licensed cosmetol-
49	ogi	st, electrologist, esthetician or nail technician, which years of

experience immediately precede the application for an instructor's li-1 2 cense, or have satisfactorily completed: A minimum six (6) month teacher's course of instruction in a (i) 3 school of cosmetology; or 4 (ii) A minimum three (3) month teacher's course of instruction 5 in a school of cosmetology, if the applicant has at least two (2) 6 7 years of experience as a licensed cosmetologist, electrologist, esthetician or nail technician. 8 (6) To be gualified to hold an apprenticeship for purposes of this chap-9 10 ter, a person must: 11 (a) Be at least sixteen and one-half (16 1/2) years of age; (b) Have completed at least two (2) years of high school or have at-12 tained an equivalent education as determined by the board; and 13 (c) Be registered as an apprentice with the board. 14 (7) To be considered a student for purposes of this chapter, a person 15 16 must: (a) Be at least sixteen and one-half (16 1/2) years of age; 17 (b) Have completed at least two (2) years of high school or have at-18 tained an equivalent education as determined by the board; and 19 (c) Be registered as a student in a licensed barber school or cosmetol-20 21 ogy school. 22 SECTION 3. That Section 54-5817, Idaho Code, be, and the same is hereby amended to read as follows: 23 54-5817. PRACTICE OF BARBERING, BARBER-STYLING, OR COSMETOLOGY 24 APPRENTICE. No barber, barber-stylist, or cosmetology apprentice may prac-25 26 tice independently. A <u>barber, barber-stylist, or</u> cosmetology apprentice may perform any and all acts necessary for professional training in the 27 28

may perform any and all acts necessary for <u>professional</u> training in the cosmetology profession within the scope of this chapter when such acts are performed in compliance with board rule, including immediate personal supervision of the apprentice by a licensed instructor. Barber or cosmetology establishments employing apprentices shall keep a daily work record of the attendance of such apprentices and shall, upon the termination of such apprenticeship, certify to the board the total number of hours worked and the
