Makes appropriations to various agencies for prior year costs for personal services and State contributions to Social Security. Effective immediately.

1 AN ACT concerning appropriations.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:

- 4 Section 5. The sum of \$7,940, or so much thereof as may be
- 5 necessary, is appropriated from the General Revenue Fund to the
- 6 Department of Central Management Services for Personal Services
- 7 and State Contributions to Social Security, including prior year
- 8 costs.
- 9 Section 10. The sum of \$14,110, or so much thereof as may
- 10 be necessary, is appropriated from the General Revenue Fund to
- 11 the Illinois Gaming Board for Personal Services and State
- 12 Contributions to Social Security, including prior year costs.
- 13 Section 15. The sum of \$11,490, or so much thereof as may
- 14 be necessary, is appropriated from the General Revenue Fund to
- 15 the Department of Insurance for Personal Services and State
- 16 Contributions to Social Security, including prior year costs.
- Section 20. The sum of \$1,271,290, or so much thereof as
- 18 may be necessary, is appropriated from the General Revenue Fund
- 19 to the Department of Natural Resources for Personal Services and
- 20 State Contributions to Social Security, including prior year

- 1 costs.
- 2 Section 25. The sum of \$30,250, or so much thereof as may
- 3 be necessary, is appropriated from the General Revenue Fund to
- 4 the Department of Children and Family Services for Personal
- 5 Services and State Contributions to Social Security, including
- 6 prior year costs.
- 7 Section 30. The sum of \$30,010, or so much thereof as may
- 8 be necessary, is appropriated from the General Revenue Fund to
- 9 the Department of Human Rights for Personal Services and State
- 10 Contributions to Social Security, including prior year costs.
- 11 Section 35. The sum of \$38,900, or so much thereof as may
- 12 be necessary, is appropriated from the General Revenue Fund to
- 13 the Department of Healthcare and Family Services for Personal
- 14 Services and State Contributions to Social Security, including
- 15 prior year costs.
- Section 40. The sum of \$17,020,270, or so much thereof as
- 17 may be necessary, is appropriated from the General Revenue Fund
- 18 to the Department of Human Services for Personal Services and
- 19 State Contributions to Social Security, including prior year
- 20 costs.

- 1 Section 45. The sum of \$987,170, or so much thereof as may
- 2 be necessary, is appropriated from the General Revenue Fund to
- 3 the Department of Public Health for Personal Services and State
- 4 Contributions to Social Security, including prior year costs.
- 5 Section 50. The sum of \$40,554,312, or so much thereof as
- 6 may be necessary, is appropriated from the General Revenue Fund
- 7 to the Department of Corrections for Personal Services and State
- 8 Contributions to Social Security, including prior year costs.
- 9 Section 55. The sum of \$3,380, or so much thereof as may
- 10 be necessary, is appropriated from the General Revenue Fund to
- 11 the Illinois Emergency Management Agency for Personal Services
- 12 and State Contributions to Social Security, including prior year
- 13 costs.
- Section 60. The sum of \$3,135,190, or so much thereof as
- 15 may be necessary, is appropriated from the General Revenue Fund
- 16 to the Department of Juvenile Justice for Personal Services and
- 17 State Contributions to Social Security, including prior year
- 18 costs.
- 19 Section 65. The sum of \$19,920, or so much thereof as may
- 20 be necessary, is appropriated from the General Revenue Fund to
- 21 the Department of State Police for Personal Services and State

- 1 Contributions to Social Security, including prior year costs.
- 2 Section 99. Effective date. This Act takes effect upon
- 3 becoming law.
