HOUSE MOTION

MR. SPEAKER:

I move that House Bill 1138 be amended to read as follows:

1	Page 8, between lines 38 and 39, begin a new paragraph and insert:
2	"SECTION 15. IC 25-27.6 IS ADDED TO THE INDIANA CODE
3	AS A NEW ARTICLE TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY
4	1, 2024]:
5	ARTICLE 27.6. LICENSED PROFESSIONAL MUSIC
6	THERAPISTS
7	Chapter 1. Definitions
8	Sec. 1. "Applicant" means an individual who applies to the
9	board for a license to practice music therapy.
10	Sec. 2. "Board" refers to the medical licensing board of Indiana.
11	Sec. 3. "Board certified music therapist" means an individual
12	who holds a current board certification from the Certification
13	Board for Music Therapists.
14	Sec. 4. "Council" refers to the music therapy advisory council
15	established by IC 25-27.6-2-1.
16	Sec. 5. "Licensed professional music therapist" means a person
17	licensed to practice music therapy under this article.
18	Sec. 6. (a) "Practice of music therapy" or "practice music
19	therapy" means providing professional services that:
20	(1) are delivered by a board certified music therapist;
21	(2) use clinical and evidence based music interventions to
22	accomplish individualized goals for clients of any age or

1	ability level within a therapeutic relationship; and
2	(3) include:
3	(A) developing individualized music therapy treatment
4	plans specific to the needs and strengths of each client; and
5	(B) establishing goals, objectives, and potential strategies
6	of the music therapy services that are appropriate for the
7	client and setting.
8	(b) The term does not include the screening, diagnosis, or
9	assessment of any physical, mental, or communication disorder.
10	Chapter 2. Music Therapy Advisory Council
11	Sec. 1. The music therapy advisory council is established as a
12	permanent entity under the executive branch of state government.
13 14	The council's purpose is to provide the board with expertise and
15	assistance in carrying out the board's duties under this chapter.
16	Sec. 2. (a) The council consists of the following five (5) members, who are familiar with the practice of music therapy, appointed by
17	the board:
18	(1) Three (3) members who are licensed professional music
19	therapists.
20	(2) One (1) member who is a licensed health care provider
21	who is not a music therapist.
22	(3) One (1) member who is a consumer.
23	(b) The board shall appoint a council member to serve as
24	chairperson. The chairperson serves at the pleasure of the board.
25	The chairperson serves a two (2) year term, but may be
26	reappointed by the board.
27	Sec. 3. (a) Except as otherwise provided in this section, a
28	member serves a term of four (4) years, ending on June 30.
29	(b) A vacancy in the council membership must be filled in the
30	same manner as a regular appointment. A member appointed to
31	fill a vacancy in the membership of the council may serve only for
32	the unexpired portion of the original, vacated term, but may be
33	reappointed by the board.
34	(c) A member serves without compensation.
35	(d) The initial appointments to the council are for a term that
36 37	ends June 30, 2027.
38	Sec. 4. (a) Notwithstanding section 2(a)(1) of this chapter, before July 1, 2025, a member is not required to be licensed under this
39	article.
40	(b) The board may reappoint a council member whose term
41	expires.
42	Sec. 5. (a) The council shall meet at least one (1) time annually
43	and at other times as called by the board.
44	(b) Three (3) members must be present to constitute a quorum.
45	Sec. 6. The executive branch shall staff the council.
46	Sec. 7. The board shall consult with the council:
47	(1) on issues related to music therapy; and

1	(2) before setting or changing fees under this article.
2	Sec. 8. The council may do the following:
3	(1) Facilitate the development of materials that the board may
4	use to educate the public concerning:
5	(A) music therapist licensure;
6	(B) the benefits of music therapy; and
7	(C) the use of music therapy:
8	(i) by individuals; and
9	(ii) in facilities or institutional settings.
0	(2) Act as a facilitator of statewide dissemination of
1	information between:
12	(A) the board; and
13	(B) any of the following:
4	(i) Music therapists.
15	(ii) The American Music Therapy Association or any
16	successor organization.
17	(iii) The Certification Board for Music Therapists or any
8	successor organization.
9	Sec. 9. The council shall, at least annually, provide analysis of
20	the following:
21	(1) Disciplinary actions taken.
22	(2) Appeals and denials.
23	(3) Revocation of licenses.
22 23 24 25	Chapter 3. Licensure
25	Sec. 1. A license applicant must meet the following
26	requirements:
27	(1) Be at least eighteen (18) years of age on the date of
28	application.
29	(2) Furnish satisfactory evidence to the board that the
30	applicant has received a bachelor's degree or higher in music
31	therapy or a related area (as determined by the board) from
32	a postsecondary educational institution that meets the
33	requirements of section 2 of this chapter.
34	(3) Furnish satisfactory evidence to the board that the
35	applicant does not have a:
36	(A) conviction for a crime of violence (as defined in
37	IC 35-50-1-2(a)(1) through IC 35-50-1-2(a)(21)); or
38	(B) conviction in the previous two (2) years that has a
39	direct bearing on the individual's ability to practice
10	competently.
11	(4) Furnish satisfactory evidence to the board that the
12	applicant has not been the subject of a disciplinary action by
12	
13	a licensing or certification agency of another state or
14	jurisdiction on the grounds that the individual was not able to
14 15	jurisdiction on the grounds that the individual was not able to practice as a music therapist without endangering the public.

2	(6) Hold current board certification from the Certification
3	Board for Music Therapists or its successor organization.
4	(7) Pay the fee established by the board.
5	Sec. 2. An applicant must have a bachelor's degree or higher in
6	music therapy or a related area (as determined by the board) from
7	a postsecondary educational institution that meets the following
8	requirements at the time of the applicant's graduation:
9	(1) If the institution is located in the United States or a
0	territory of the United States, the institution was accredited
1	by a regional accrediting body recognized by the Commission
2	on Recognition of Postsecondary Accreditation.
3	(2) If the institution is located in Canada, the institution was
4	a member in good standing with the Association of
5	Universities and Colleges of Canada.
6	(3) If the institution is located in a foreign country other than
7	Canada, the institution:
8	(A) was recognized by the government of the country
9	where the school was located as a program to train in the
0.0	practice of music therapy; and
1	(B) maintained a standard of training substantially
22	equivalent to the standards of institutions accredited by a
23	regional accrediting body recognized by the Commission
22 23 24 25	on Recognition of Postsecondary Accreditation.
25	Sec. 3. (a) A license issued by the board under this chapter is
26	valid for the remainder of the renewal period in effect on the date
27	the license is issued.
28	(b) An individual may renew a license by:
.9	(1) paying a renewal fee on or before the expiration date of
0	the license; and
1	(2) providing evidence of the individual's maintained status as
2	a board certified music therapist.
3	(c) A license is invalid if an individual:
4	(1) fails to pay a renewal fee on or before the expiration date
5	of a license; or
6	(2) is unable to prove that the individual has maintained
7	status as a board certified music therapist.
8	Sec. 4. (a) The board may reinstate an invalid license up to three
9	(3) years after the expiration date of the license if the individual
.0	holding the invalid license meets the requirements under
-1	IC 25-1-8-6.
-2	(b) If more than three (3) years have elapsed since the date the
-3	license expired, the individual holding the license may renew the
4	license by:
-5	(1) satisfying the requirements for renewal established by the
-6	board; and
7	(2) meeting the requirements of IC 25-1-8-6

1	Sec. 5. (a) The board shall exempt an individual from the
2	requirements in this chapter and grant the individual a music
3	therapy license if the individual meets the following requirements:
4	(1) Holds, before July 1, 2024, a bachelor's degree or higher
5	in music therapy or a related discipline from a postsecondary
6	educational institution that meets the requirements in section
7	2 of this chapter.
8	(2) Furnishes satisfactory evidence to the board that the
9	individual does not have a:
10	(A) conviction for a crime of violence (as defined in
11	IC 35-50-1-2(a)(1) through IC 35-50-1-2(a)(21)); or
12	(B) conviction in the previous two (2) years that has a
13	direct bearing on the individual's ability to practice
14	competently.
15	(3) Has engaged in the practice of music therapy for at least
16	three (3) years.
17	(4) Holds current board certification from the Certification
18	Board for Music Therapists or its successor organization.
19	(5) Files an initial application to the board before July 1, 2025.
20	(b) This section expires January 1, 2026.
21	Chapter 4. Scope of Practice
22	Sec. 1. A licensed professional music therapist may do the
23	following:
24	(1) Accept referrals for music therapy services from medical,
25	developmental, mental health, or education professionals,
26	family members, and client caregivers or others involved and
27	authorized with the provision of client services. However,
28	before engaging in the practice of music therapy with:
29	(A) a client for an identified clinical or developmental
30	need, the music therapist shall review with the health care
31	provider involved in the client's care the client's diagnosis,
32	treatment needs, and treatment plan; and
33	
	(B) a client who is a primary or secondary school student
34	who is referred for an identified educational need, the
35	music therapist shall review with the individualized family
36	service plan team or individualized education program
37	team concerning the student's diagnosis, treatment needs,
38	and treatment plan.
39	(2) Conduct a music therapy assessment of a client to
40	determine if music therapy treatment is indicated. If
41	treatment is indicated, the music therapist shall collect
42	systematic, comprehensive, and accurate information to
43	determine the appropriateness and type of music therapy
44	services to provide for the client.
45	(3) Develop an individualized music therapy treatment plan
46	for the client that is based on the results of the music therapy
47	assessment. The music therapy treatment plan must include
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individualized goals and objectives that focus on the assessed needs and strengths of the client and specify music therapy approaches and interventions to be used to address these goals and objectives. (4) Implement an individualized music therapy treatment plan that is consistent with any other developmental, rehabilitative, habilitative, medical, mental health, preventive, wellness care, or educational services being provided to the client. When providing educational or health care services, a music therapist may not replace the services provided by an audiologist or a speech-language pathologist. (5) Evaluate the client's response to music therapy and the music therapy treatment plan, which includes documenting the change and progress of the client and suggesting modifications, as appropriate.

- (6) Develop a plan for determining when the provision of music therapy is no longer needed in collaboration with the client, physician, or other health care or educational provider of the client, family members of the client, and any other appropriate person upon whom the client relies for support.
- (7) Minimize any barriers to ensure that the client receives music therapy in the least restrictive environment.
- (8) Collaborate with and educate the client, the client's family, caregiver, and any other appropriate person regarding the needs of the client that are being addressed in music therapy and the manner in which the individualized music therapy treatment addresses those needs.
- (9) Use appropriate knowledge and skills to provide an informed practice, including the use of research, reasoning, and problem solving skills to determine appropriate actions in the context of each specific clinical setting.
- (10) Provide music therapy to the client in an individual or a group setting.
- (11) Provide music therapy that includes music improvisation, receptive music listening, song writing, lyric discussion, music and imagery, singing, music performance, learning through music, music combined with other arts, music assisted relaxation, music based patient education, electronic music technology, adapted music intervention, and movement to music.
- Sec. 2. (a) A licensed professional music therapist shall do the following:
 - (1) When engaging in the practice of music therapy with a client, collaborate, as applicable, with the client's treatment team, including the client's physician, psychologist, licensed clinical social worker, or other mental health professional.
 - (2) When engaging in the practice of music therapy with a

1 client who has a communication disorder, collaborate and 2 discuss the individualized music therapy treatment plan with 3 the client's audiologist or speech-language pathologist so that 4 the licensed professional music therapist may work with the 5 client and address communication skills. 6 (3) Notify the board of a change in the licensed professional 7 music therapist's address. 8 (b) When providing educational or health care services, a 9 licensed professional music therapist may not replace the services 10 provided by an audiologist or a speech-language pathologist. 11 Unless authorized to practice speech-language pathology, licensed 12 professional music therapists may not evaluate, examine, instruct, 13 or counsel on speech, language, communication, and swallowing 14 disorders and conditions. An individual licensed as a professional 15 music therapist may not represent to the public that the individual 16 is authorized to treat a communication disorder. This does not 17 prohibit an individual licensed as a professional music therapist 18 from representing to the public that the individual may work with 19 clients who have a communication disorder and address 20 communication skills. 21 **Chapter 5. Unlawful Practices** 22 Sec. 1. This chapter does not limit music therapy services 23 performed by an individual who: 24 (1) does not use a title specified in this chapter; and 25 (2) is any of the following: 26 (A) A licensed, certified, or registered health care 27 professional, counselor, or education professional acting 28 within the scope of the individual's license, certificate, or 29 registration. 30 (B) A student, an intern, or a trainee pursuing a course of 31 study in a health care profession, counseling, education, or 32 to gain licensure under this article. 33 (C) An individual who is not a resident of Indiana if the 34 individual performs music therapy in Indiana for not more 35 than: 36 (i) five (5) days in any one (1) month; or 37 (ii) fifteen (15) days in any one (1) calendar year; 38 and the individual is authorized to perform music therapy 39 in the state in which the individual resides. 40 (D) An individual who performs music therapy under the 41 supervision of a licensed music therapist. 42 Sec. 2. (a) Beginning July 1, 2025, an individual may not: 43 (1) profess to be a licensed music therapist; 44 (2) use the title: 45 (A) "licensed music therapist";

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(C) "music therapist"; or

46 47 (B) "licensed professional music therapist (LPMT)"; or

1	(3) use any other words indicating or implying that the
2	individual is a licensed music therapist;
3	unless the individual is licensed under this article.
4	(b) Beginning July 1, 2025, an individual who knowingly and
5	intentionally violates this section commits a Class A misdemeanor.
6	Sec. 3. (a) The board may issue a sanction for the following acts:
7	(1) Failure to pay fees when due.
8	(2) Failure to provide requested information in a timely
9	manner.
0	(3) Conviction of a felony.
1	(4) Conviction of a crime that reflects an inability to practice
2	music therapy with due regard for the health and safety of
3	clients and patients, or with due regard for the truth in filing
4	claims with Medicare, Medicaid, or any third party payor.
5	(5) Inability or failure to practice music therapy with
6	reasonable skill and consistent with the welfare of clients and
7	patients, including negligence in the practice of music therapy,
8	intoxication, incapacity, abuse of a client or patient, and
9	engaging in sexual contact with a client or patient.
0.	(6) Disciplinary action by another jurisdiction.
1	(b) The board may investigate allegations of conduct described
22	in subsection (a).
23 24	(c) The board is authorized to impose one (1) or more of the
4	following sanctions for a violation of this chapter:
25	(1) License suspension.
6	(2) License revocation.
27	(3) License denial.
8.	(4) Refusal to renew a license.
9	(5) Probation with conditions.
0	(6) Reprimand.
1	(7) A fine of not less than one hundred dollars (\$100) and not
2	more than one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for each violation.".

7	crime concerning unlawful practice of music therapy.".
