DIGEST OF INTRODUCED BILL

Citations Affected: IC 31-33-18-6.

Synopsis: Disclosure of child abuse and neglect reports. Provides that an individual who makes a legally required report of suspected child abuse or neglect may bring a civil action against the department of child services if the department discloses the individual's report in a manner not authorized by law. Provides that the individual may recover: (1) actual damages resulting from the disclosure; and (2) reasonable attorney's fees, litigation expenses, and costs.

A BILL FOR AN ACT to amend the Indiana Code concerning family law and juvenile law.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

3	1, 2020]: Sec. 6. (a) An individual whose report made under this
4	article is disclosed by the department in violation of this chapter
5	may bring a civil action against the department.
6	(b) A plaintiff who prevails in an action brought under this
7	section is entitled to recover from the department:
8	(1) actual damages resulting from the disclosure; and
9	(2) reasonable attorney's fees, litigation expenses, and costs.
10	(c) Civil liability under this section is in addition to any other
11	penalty imposed for unauthorized disclosure of information
12	classified as confidential under this article.
