## **HOUSE BILL No. 1167**

## DIGEST OF INTRODUCED BILL

**Citations Affected:** IC 20-24-8-5; IC 20-33-8-13.5; IC 20-51-4-1.

**Synopsis:** Bullying. Requires a charter school to adopt discipline rules to prohibit bullying. Requires a school that accepts choice scholarships to adopt discipline rules to prohibit bullying. Requires an accredited nonpublic school that accepts funding or financial assistance from the state to adopt discipline rules to prohibit bullying.

Effective: July 1, 2020.

## **HOUSE BILL No. 1167**

A BILL FOR AN ACT to amend the Indiana Code concerning education.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

1	SECTION 1. IC 20-24-8-5, AS AMENDED BY P.L.242-2017,
2	SECTION 11, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE
3	JULY 1, 2020]: Sec. 5. The following statutes and rules and guidelines
4	adopted under the following statutes apply to a charter school:

22	SECTION 2. IC 20-33-8-13.5, AS AMENDED BY
23	P.L.211-2018(ss), SECTION 9, IS AMENDED TO READ AS
24	FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2020]: Sec. 13.5. (a) Discipline
25	rules adopted by the governing body of a school corporation under
26	section 12 of this chapter must:
27	(1) prohibit bullying; and
28	(2) include:
29	(A) provisions concerning education, parental involvement,
30	and intervention;
31	(B) a detailed procedure for the expedited investigation of
32	incidents of bullying that includes:
33	(i) appropriate responses to bullying behaviors, wherever the
34	behaviors occur;
35	(ii) provisions for anonymous and personal reporting of
36	bullying to a teacher or other school staff;
37	(iii) timetables for reporting of bullying incidents to the
38	parents of both the targeted student and the bully, in an
39	expedited manner;
40	(iv) timetables for reporting of bullying incidents to school
41	counselors, school administrators, the superintendent, or law
42	enforcement, if it is determined that reporting the bullying



1	incident to law enforcement is necessary;
2	(v) discipline provisions for teachers, school staff, or school
3	administrators who fail to initiate or conduct an
4	investigation of a bullying incident; and
5	(vi) discipline provisions for false reporting of bullying; and
6	(C) a detailed procedure outlining the use of follow-up
7	services that includes:
8	(i) support services for the victim; and
9	(ii) bullying education for the bully.
10	(b) The discipline rules described in subsection (a) may be applied
11	regardless of the physical location in which the bullying behavior
12	occurred, whenever:
13	(1) the individual committing the bullying behavior and any of the
14	intended targets of the bullying behavior are students attending a
15	school within a school corporation; and
16	(2) disciplinary action is reasonably necessary to avoid substantial
17	interference with school discipline or prevent an unreasonable
18	threat to the rights of others to a safe and peaceful learning
19	environment.
20	(c) The discipline rules described in subsection (a) must prohibit
21	bullying through the use of data or computer software that is accessed
22	through a:
23	(1) computer;
24	(2) computer system;
25	(3) computer network; or
26	(4) cellular telephone or other wireless or cellular
27	communications device.
28	(d) This section may not be construed to give rise to a cause of
29	action against a person or school corporation based on an allegation of
30	noncompliance with this section. Noncompliance with this section may
31	not be used as evidence against a school corporation in a cause of
32	action.
33	(e) A record made of an investigation, a disciplinary action, or a
34	follow-up action performed under rules adopted under this section is
35	not a public record under IC 5-14-3.
36	(f) The department shall periodically review each policy adopted
37	under this section to ensure the policy's compliance with this section.
38	(g) An accredited nonpublic school that accepts any funding or
39	financial assistance from the state is required to adopt discipline
40	rules consistent with this section.
41	SECTION 3. IC 20-51-4-1, AS AMENDED BY P.L.106-2016,

SECTION 15, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE



1	JULY 1, 2020]: Sec. 1. (a) Except as provided under subsections (b)
2	through (h), it is the intent of the general assembly to honor the
3	autonomy of nonpublic schools that choose to become eligible schools
4	under this chapter. A nonpublic eligible school is not an agent of the
5	state or federal government, and therefore:
6	(1) the department or any other state agency may not in any way
7	regulate the educational program of a nonpublic eligible school
8	that accepts a choice scholarship under this chapter, including the
9	regulation of curriculum content, religious instruction or
10	activities, classroom teaching, teacher and staff hiring
11	requirements, and other activities carried out by the eligible
12	school;
13	(2) the creation of the choice scholarship program does not
14	expand the regulatory authority of the state, the state's officers, or
15	a school corporation to impose additional regulation of nonpublic
16	schools beyond those necessary to enforce the requirements of the
17	choice scholarship program in place on July 1, 2011; and
18	(3) a nonpublic eligible school shall be given the freedom to
19	provide for the educational needs of students without
20	governmental control.
21	(b) This section applies to the following writings, documents, and
22	records:
23	(1) The Constitution of the United States.
24	(2) The national motto.
25	(3) The national anthem.
26	(4) The Pledge of Allegiance.
27	(5) The Constitution of the State of Indiana.
28	(6) The Declaration of Independence.
29	(7) The Mayflower Compact.
30	(8) The Federalist Papers.
31	(9) "Common Sense" by Thomas Paine.
32	(10) The writings, speeches, documents, and proclamations of the
33	founding fathers and presidents of the United States.
34	(11) United States Supreme Court decisions.
35	(12) Executive orders of the presidents of the United States.
36	(13) Frederick Douglass's speech at Rochester, New York, on July
37	5, 1852, entitled "What to the Slave is the Fourth of July?".
38	(14) "Appeal" by David Walker.
39	(15) Chief Seattle's letter to the United States government in 1852
40	in response to the United States government's inquiry regarding
41	the purchase of tribal lands.

(c) An eligible school may allow a principal or teacher in the



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1	eligible school to read or post in the school building or classroom or at
2	a school event any excerpt or part of a writing, document, or record
3	listed in subsection (b).
4	(d) An eligible school may not permit the content based censorship
5	of American history or heritage based on religious references in a
6	writing, document, or record listed in subsection (b).
7	(e) A library, a media center, or an equivalent facility that an
8	eligible school maintains for student use must contain in the facility's
9	permanent collection at least one (1) copy of each writing or document
10	listed in subsection (b)(1) through (b)(9).
11	(f) An eligible school shall do the following:
12	(1) Allow a student to include a reference to a writing, document,
13	or record listed in subsection (b) in a report or other work product.
14	(2) May not punish the student in any way, including a reduction
15	in grade, for using the reference.
16	(3) Display the United States flag in each classroom.
17	(4) Provide a daily opportunity for students to voluntarily recite
18	the Pledge of Allegiance in each classroom or on school grounds.
19	A student is exempt from participation in the Pledge of
20	Allegiance and may not be required to participate in the Pledge of
21	Allegiance if:
22	(A) the student chooses to not participate; or
23	(B) the student's parent chooses to have the student not
24	participate.
25	(5) Provide instruction on the constitutions of:
26	(A) Indiana; and
27	(B) the United States.
28	(6) For an eligible school that enrolls students in grades 6 through
29	12, provide within the two (2) weeks preceding a general election
30	five (5) full recitation periods of class discussion concerning:
31	(A) the system of government in Indiana and in the United
32	States;
33	(B) methods of voting;
34	(C) party structures;
35	(D) election laws; and
36	(E) the responsibilities of citizen participation in government
37	and in elections.
38	(7) Require that each teacher employed by the eligible school
39	present instruction with special emphasis on:
40	(A) honesty;
41	(B) morality;
42	(C) courtesy;



1	(D) obedience to law;
2	(E) respect for the national flag and the Constitution of the
3	State of Indiana and the Constitution of the United States;
4	(F) respect for parents and the home;
5	(G) the dignity and necessity of honest labor; and
6	(H) other lessons of a steadying influence that tend to promote
7	and develop an upright and desirable citizenry.
8	(8) Provide good citizenship instruction that stresses the nature
9	and importance of the following:
10	(A) Being honest and truthful.
11	(B) Respecting authority.
12	(C) Respecting the property of others.
13	(D) Always doing the student's personal best.
14	(E) Not stealing.
15	(F) Possessing the skills (including methods of conflict
16	resolution) necessary to live peaceably in society and not
17	resorting to violence to settle disputes.
18	(G) Taking personal responsibility for obligations to family
19	and community.
20	(H) Taking personal responsibility for earning a livelihood.
	(I) Treating others the way the student would want to be
21 22	treated.
23	(J) Respecting the national flag, the Constitution of the United
24 25	States, and the Constitution of the State of Indiana.
25	(K) Respecting the student's parents and home.
26	(L) Respecting the student's self.
27	(M) Respecting the rights of others to have their own views
28	and religious beliefs.
29	(9) Provide instruction in the following studies:
30	(A) Language arts, including:
31	(i) English;
32	(ii) grammar;
33	(iii) composition;
34	(iv) speech; and
35	(v) second languages.
36	(B) Mathematics.
37	(C) Social studies and citizenship, including the:
38	(i) constitutions;
39	(ii) governmental systems; and
40	(iii) histories;
41	of Indiana and the United States, including a study of the
42	Holocaust and the role religious extremism played in the



1	events of September 11, 2001, in each high school United
2	States history course.
3	(D) Sciences.
4	(E) Fine arts, including music and art.
5	(F) Health education, physical fitness, safety, and the effects
6	of alcohol, tobacco, drugs, and other substances on the human
7	body.
8	(g) An eligible school shall not teach the violent overthrow of the
9	government of the United States.
10	(h) An eligible school shall adopt discipline rules that prohibit
11	bullying in the manner provided in IC 20-33-8-13.5.
12	(h) (i) Nothing in this section shall be construed to limit the
13	requirements of IC 20-30-5.
