# **HOUSE BILL No. 1167**

#### DIGEST OF INTRODUCED BILL

Citations Affected: IC 21-12-15.

**Synopsis:** LIFE scholarships. Establishes the Indiana lifelong learning incentive for excellence (LIFE) scholarship program to provide scholarships to Indiana residents for postsecondary education. Provides for administration of the program by the commission for higher education. Establishes the LIFE scholarship fund consisting of: (1) appropriations made to the fund from other sources; and (2) grants, gifts, and donations intended for deposit in the fund. Sets forth the amount of a scholarship award, subject to the amount of money in the LIFE scholarship fund. Provides eligibility criteria for potential recipients.

Effective: July 1, 2014.

### **HOUSE BILL No. 1167**

A BILL FOR AN ACT to amend the Indiana Code concerning higher education.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

1	SECTION 1. IC 21-12-15 IS ADDED TO THE INDIANA CODE
2	AS A NEW CHAPTER TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE
3	JULY 1, 2014]:
4	Chapter 15. Indiana Lifelong Learning Incentive for Excellence
5	(LIFE) Scholarship
6	Sec. 1. As used in this chapter, "academic year" means a period,
7	typically nine (9) months, in which a full-time student is expected
8	to complete the equivalent of at least two (2) semesters or three (3)
9	quarters of academic work.
0	Sec. 2. As used in this chapter, "eligible high school" means a
1	secondary school located in Indiana that is a:
2	(1) public school; or
3	(2) nonpublic school that voluntarily seeks and receives
4	accreditation as authorized by IC 20-19-2-8.
5	Sec. 3. As used in this chapter, "eligible postsecondary
6	educational institution" means a school that meets the following



1	conditions:
2	(1) Operates in Indiana as:
3	(A) a state educational institution;
4	(B) a nonprofit private educational institution; or
5	(C) a for-profit private proprietary educational institution.
6	(2) Provides an organized program of postsecondary
7	education leading to:
8	(A) a technical certificate;
9	(B) a nursing diploma;
10	(C) an associate degree; or
11	(D) a baccalaureate degree.
12	(3) Is accredited by:
13	(A) a recognized national or regional accrediting agency;
14	(B) the board for proprietary education; or
15	(C) the Indiana state board of nursing.
16	Sec. 4. As used in this chapter, "freshman student" means a
17	student at a postsecondary educational institution who has enrolled
18	in or completed a cumulative total of less than:
19	(1) forty-six (46) quarter hours; or
20	(2) thirty-one (31) semester hours.
21	Sec. 5. As used in this chapter, "full-time student" means a
22	student in matriculated status who is attending a postsecondary
23	educational institution and is enrolled for the equivalent of at least
24	twelve (12) quarter or semester hours.
25	Sec. 6. As used in this chapter, "grade point average" means the
26	numbered grade average calculated using a 4.0 scale or the
27	equivalent.
28	Sec. 7. As used in this chapter, "LIFE scholarship" means a
29	lifelong learning incentive for excellence scholarship for
30	postsecondary education awarded under this chapter.
31	Sec. 8. As used in this chapter, "matriculated status" means
32	being recognized as a student in a defined program of study
33	leading to a degree, diploma, or certificate at a postsecondary
34	educational institution.
35	Sec. 9. As used in this chapter, "program" refers to the LIFE
36	scholarship program.
37	Sec. 10. As used in this chapter, "quarter hours" includes each
38	quarter hour in which a student is enrolled, whether remedial or
39	for credit toward a degree. However, the term does not include a
40	quarter hour attempted or completed before graduating from high
41	school or earning a general educational development (GED)



diploma.

1	Sec. 11. As used in this chapter, "semester hours" includes each
2	semester hour in which a student is enrolled, whether remedial or
3	for credit toward a degree. However, the term does not include a
4	semester hour attempted before graduating from high school or
5	earning a general educational development (GED) diploma.
6	Sec. 12. As used in this chapter, "sophomore student" means a
7	student at a postsecondary educational institution who has enrolled
8	in or completed:
9	(1) at least forty-six (46) quarter hours but less than
0	ninety-one (91) quarter hours; or
l 1	(2) at least thirty-one (31) semester hours but less than
12	sixty-one (61) semester hours.
13	Sec. 13. As used in this chapter, "Title IV" refers to Title IV of
14	the federal Higher Education Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C. 1070 et seq.).
15	Sec. 14. The lifelong learning incentive for excellence (LIFE)
16	scholarship program is established.
17	Sec. 15. The commission shall do the following:
18	(1) Administer the program.
19	(2) Subject to this chapter, determine eligibility, residency
20	requirements, policy issues, and definitions for the program.
21	(3) Identify individuals who are eligible to participate in the
22	program.
23 24	(4) Pay the amount of a scholarship recipient's scholarship
24	directly to the eligible postsecondary educational institution
25	that the scholarship recipient attends.
26	(5) Subject to:
27	(A) the amount of money available in the LIFE scholarship
28	fund; and
29	(B) the requirements of this chapter;
30	determine the scholarship amount for each scholarship
31	recipient.
32	(6) Adopt rules under IC 4-22-2 to administer the program.
33	Sec. 16. (a) The LIFE scholarship fund is established to provide
34	scholarships for the program. The fund consists of:
35	(1) appropriations to the fund from other sources; and
36	(2) grants, gifts, and donations intended for deposit in the
37	fund.
38	(b) Expenses of administering the fund shall be paid from
39	money in the fund.
10	(c) The commission shall administer the LIFE scholarship fund.
11	(d) The treasurer of state shall invest the money in the LIFE
12	scholarship fund not currently needed to meet the obligations of



1	the fund in the same manner as other public funds may be invested.
2	(e) Money in the LIFE scholarship fund at the end of a state
3	fiscal year does not revert to the state general fund.
4	Sec. 17. Subject to the amount available in the LIFE scholarship
5	fund for purposes of this chapter, the commission shall provide a
6	LIFE scholarship to eligible students in the following amounts:
7	(1) For a student who attends an eligible postsecondary
8	educational institution that is a state educational institution,
9	an amount that equals the sum of the following for any
10	academic year:
11	(A) The student's actual tuition.
12	(B) The student's actual approved mandatory fees that are
13	charged by the student's postsecondary educational
14	institution to every student enrolled in the institution,
15	regardless of a student's program of study.
16	(2) For a student who attends an eligible postsecondary
17	educational institution that is a nonprofit private institution,
18	an amount that equals the sum of the following for any
19	academic year:
20	(A) An amount equal to the average in-state tuition at the
21	four (4) postsecondary state educational institutions having
22	the highest in-state tuition.
23	(B) An amount equal to the average mandatory fees that
24	are charged at the state educational institutions described
25	in clause (A) to every student enrolled in the institutions,
26	regardless of a student's program of study.
27	(3) For a student who attends an eligible postsecondary
28	educational institution that is a for-profit private
29	postsecondary credit bearing proprietary institution, an
30	amount that equals the sum of the following for any academic
31	year:
32	(A) An amount equal to the tuition at Ivy Tech Community
33	College.
34	(B) An amount equal to the average mandatory fees that
35	are charged at Ivy Tech Community College to every
36	student enrolled in Ivy Tech Community College,
37	regardless of a student's program of study.
38	Sec. 18. In addition to the other requirements of this chapter, a
39	student must meet the following requirements to be eligible to
40	receive a LIFE scholarship under this chapter:
41	(1) Be a United States citizen or a permanent resident alien of
42	the United States who meets the definition of an eligible



1	noncitizen under federal Title IV requirements.
2	(2) Be a legal resident of Indiana as determined by the
3	commission.
4	(3) Comply with United States Selective Service System
5	requirements for registration, if such requirements apply to
6	the student.
7	(4) Not be in default on a federal Title IV educational loan or
8	a state of Indiana educational loan. However, a student who
9	is otherwise eligible and who fully repays a defaulted loan is
10	eligible to obtain a LIFE scholarship for future academic
11	terms, but not retroactively.
12	(5) Not owe a refund on a federal Title IV student financial
13	aid program or an Indiana student financial aid program.
14	However, a student who is otherwise eligible and who fully
15	repays an owed refund is eligible to obtain a LIFE scholarship
16	for future academic terms, but not retroactively.
17	(6) Not be convicted of a felony offense involving marijuana
18	or a controlled substance. Ineligibility under this subdivision
19	extends from the date of conviction to the completion of the
20	next academic term following the date of conviction.
21	(7) Not be incarcerated.
22	Sec. 19. To be eligible for a LIFE scholarship for the freshman
23	year, an entering freshman student seeking an associate degree or
24	baccalaureate degree at an eligible postsecondary educational
25	institution must meet the following requirements:
26	(1) Meet achievement standards:
27	(A) by graduating from an eligible high school;
28	(B) by receiving an Indiana general educational
29	development (GED) diploma;
30	(C) by:
31	(i) earning a cumulative grade point average of at least
32	3.0 at an eligible postsecondary educational institution at
33	the end of the quarter or semester in which the student
34	has enrolled in or completed a cumulative total of not
35	more than forty-five (45) quarter hours or thirty (30)
36	semester hours; and
37	(ii) completing a nonaccredited nonpublic instruction
38	program that a parent establishes, organizes, and directs
39	for the education of the parent's child; or
40	(D) by:
41	(i) graduating from a high school that is not an eligible
42	high school; and



1	(ii) earning a cumulative grade point average of at least
2	3.0 at an eligible postsecondary educational institution at
3	the end of the quarter or semester in which the student
4	has enrolled in or completed a cumulative total of not
5	more than forty-five (45) quarter hours or thirty (30)
6	semester hours.
7	However, a student described in clause (C) or (D) is eligible to
8	receive only a retroactive LIFE scholarship for the student's
9	freshman year, to be paid to the student at the end of the
10	student's freshman year.
11	(2) Meet enrollment standards by being admitted, enrolled,
12	and classified as an undergraduate student in matriculated
13	status.
14	Sec. 20. To be eligible for a LIFE scholarship for the sophomore
15	year, a sophomore student seeking an associate degree or
16	baccalaureate degree at an eligible postsecondary educational
17	
18	institution must do the following: (1) Meet achievement standards by satisfying the following
	criteria:
19	
20	(A) Earn a cumulative grade point average of at least 3.0
21	or the equivalent at a postsecondary educational institution
22	at the end of the quarter or semester in which the student
23	has enrolled in or completed a cumulative total of not more
24	than forty-five (45) quarter hours or thirty (30) semester
25	hours.
26	(B) Maintain satisfactory academic progress in a course of
27	study in accordance with the standards and practices used
28	for federal Title IV programs by the postsecondary
29	educational institution in which the student is enrolled.
30	(2) Meet enrollment standards by being admitted, enrolled,
31	and classified as an undergraduate student in matriculated
32	status or, in the case of an otherwise eligible student who is
33	classified as a professional level student rather than an
34	undergraduate student, being accepted into the professional
35	level program of study before receiving a baccalaureate
36	degree.
37	Sec. 21. A student is not required to enroll in a minimum
38	number of hours at a postsecondary educational institution in
39	order to otherwise qualify for a LIFE scholarship under this
40	chapter. However, the commission may base the amount of a
41	student's LIFE scholarship on the number of credit hours in which
42	the student is enrolled.



Sec. 22. A student who fails to achieve a cumulative grade point
average of at least 3.0 or the equivalent at the end of the quarter or
semester in which the student has enrolled in or completed a
cumulative total of not more than forty-five (45) quarter hours or
thirty (30) semester hours but who achieves a cumulative grade
point average of at least 3.0 at the end of the quarter or semester
in which the student has enrolled in or completed a cumulative
total of not more than ninety (90) quarter hours or sixty (60)
semester hours and who is otherwise eligible may qualify for a
LIFE scholarship under this chapter.

Sec. 23. A student may receive a LIFE scholarship under this chapter until the student completes at any postsecondary educational institution a cumulative total of ninety-one (91) quarter hours or sixty-one (61) semester hours.
