Synopsis: Department of financial institutions. Makes various changes to the laws concerning: (1) first lien mortgage lenders; (2) persons licensed under the Uniform Consumer Credit Code; (3) financial institutions; and (4) debt management companies.

A BILL FOR AN ACT to amend the Indiana Code concerning financial institutions.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

4	and applied to promote its underlying purposes and policies.
5	(2) The underlying purposes and policies of this article are:
6	(a) to permit and encourage the development of fair and
7	economically sound first lien mortgage lending practices; and
8	(b) to conform the regulation of first lien mortgage lending
9	practices to applicable state and federal laws, rules, regulations,
10	policies, and guidance.
11	(3) A reference to a requirement imposed by this article includes
12	reference to a related rule of the department adopted under this article.
13	(4) A reference to a federal law in this article is a reference to the
14	law as in effect December 31, 2014. 2015.

10	(2) "Agreement" means the bargain of the parties in fact as found
11	in the parties' language or by implication from other
12	circumstances, including course of dealing or usage of trade or

16	livestock, wildlife, poultry, bees, forest products, fish and

28	credit transactions of the same kind;
29	(b) the buyer is a person other than an organization;
30	(c) the goods, services, or interest in land are purchased
31	primarily for a personal, family, or household purpose;
32	(d) either the debt is payable in installments or a credit service
33	charge is made; and
34	(e) with respect to a sale of goods or services, either:
35	(i) the amount of credit extended, the written credit limit, or
36	the initial advance does not exceed fifty-three thousand five
37	hundred dollars (\$53,500) or another the exempt threshold
38	amount, as adjusted in accordance with the annual
39	adjustment of the exempt threshold amount, specified in
40	Regulation Z (12 CFR 226.3 or 12 CFR 1026.3(b), as
41	applicable); or
42	(ii) the debt is secured by personal property used or expected

2	(6) "Credit" means the right granted by a creditor to a debtor to
3	defer payment of debt or to incur debt and defer its payment.
4	(7) "Creditor" means a person:
5	(a) that regularly engages in the extension of first lien
6	mortgage transactions that are subject to a credit service
7	charge or loan finance charge, as applicable, or are payable by
8	written agreement in more than four (4) installments (not
9	including a down payment); and
0	(b) to which the obligation is initially payable, either on the
1	face of the note or contract, or by agreement if there is not a
2	note or contract.
3	The term does not include a person described in subsection
4	(34)(a) in a tablefunded transaction. A creditor may be an

4	(12) "Employee" means an individual who is paid wages or other

9	the Currency, the Office of Thrift Supervision, the National Credit

-2	(14) "First lien mortgage transaction" means:

2	(b) a consumer credit sale;
3	that is or will be used by the debtor primarily for personal, family,

6	mortgage or a land contract) that constitutes a first lien on a
7	dwelling or on residential real estate upon which a dwelling is
8	constructed or intended to be constructed.
9	(15) "Immediate family member" means a spouse, child, sibling,
10	parent, grandparent, or grandchild. The term includes stepparents,
11	stepchildren, stepsiblings, and adoptive relationships.
12	(16) "Individual" means a natural person.
13	(17) "Licensee" means a person licensed as a creditor under this
14	article.
15	(18) "Loan" includes:
16	(a) the creation of debt by:
17	(i) the creditor's payment of or agreement to pay money to
18	the debtor or to a third party for the account of the debtor; or
19	(ii) the extension of credit by a person who engages as a
20	seller in credit transactions primarily secured by an interest
21	in land;
22	(b) the creation of debt by a credit to an account with the
23	creditor upon which the debtor is entitled to draw
24	immediately; and
25	(c) the forbearance of debt arising from a loan.
26	(19) "Loan brokerage business" means any activity in which a
27	person, in return for any consideration from any source, procures,
28	attempts to procure, or assists in procuring, a mortgage
29	transaction from a third party or any other person, whether or not
30	the person seeking the mortgage transaction actually obtains the
31	mortgage transaction.
32	(20) "Loan processor or underwriter" means an individual who
33	performs clerical or support duties as an employee at the direction
34	of, and subject to the supervision and instruction of, a person
35	licensed or exempt from licensing under this article. For purposes
36	of this subsection, the term "clerical or support duties" may
37	include, after the receipt of an application, the following:
38	(a) The receipt, collection, distribution, and analysis of
39	information common for the processing or underwriting of a
40	mortgage transaction.
41	(b) The communication with a consumer to obtain the
+ 1	(b) The communication with a consumer to obtain the

information necessary for the processing or underwriting of a



1	loan, to the extent that the communication does not include:
2	(i) offering or negotiating loan rates or terms; or
3	(ii) counseling consumers about mortgage transaction rates
4	or terms.
5	(21) "Mortgage loan originator" means an individual who, for
6	compensation or gain, or in the expectation of compensation or
7	gain, regularly engages in taking a mortgage transaction
8	application or in offering or negotiating the terms of a mortgage
9	transaction that either is made under this article or under
10	IC 24-4.5 or is made by an employee of a person licensed or
11	exempt from licensing under this article or under IC 24-4.5, while
12	the employee is engaging in the loan brokerage business. The
13	term does not include the following:
14	(a) An individual engaged solely as a loan processor or
15	underwriter as long as the individual works exclusively as an
16	employee of a person licensed or exempt from licensing under
17	this article.
18	(b) Unless the person or entity is compensated by:
19	(i) a creditor;
20	(ii) a loan broker;
21	(iii) another mortgage loan originator; or
22	(iv) any agent of a creditor, a loan broker, or another
23	mortgage loan originator described in items (i) through (iii);
24	a person or entity that performs only real estate brokerage
25	activities and is licensed or registered in accordance with
26	applicable state law.
27	(c) A person solely involved in extensions of credit relating to
28	timeshare plans (as defined in 11 U.S.C. 101(53D)).
29	(22) "Mortgage servicer" means the last person to whom a
30	mortgagor or the mortgagor's successor in interest has been
31	instructed by a mortgagee to send payments on a loan secured by
32	a mortgage.
33	(23) "Mortgage transaction" means:
34	(a) a consumer loan; or
35	(b) a consumer credit sale;
36	that is or will be used by the debtor primarily for personal, family,
37	or household purposes and that is secured by a mortgage or a land
38	contract (or another consensual security interest equivalent to a
39	mortgage or a land contract) on a dwelling or on residential real
40	estate upon which a dwelling is constructed or intended to be
41	constructed.
42	(24) "Nationwide Multistate Licensing System and Registry"



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1	(or "Nationwide Mortgage Licensing System and Registry" or
2	"NMLSR") means a mortgage multistate licensing system
3	developed and maintained by the Conference of State Bank
4	Supervisors and the American Association of Residential
5	Mortgage Regulators owned and operated by the State
6	Regulatory Registry, LLC, or by any successor or affiliated
7	entity, for the licensing and registration of creditors, and
8	mortgage loan originators, and other persons in the mortgage
9	or financial services industries. The term includes any other
10	name or acronym that may be assigned to the system by the
11	State Regulatory Registry, LLC, or by any successor or
12	affiliated entity.
13	(25) "Nontraditional mortgage product" means any mortgage
14	product other than a thirty (30) year fixed rate mortgage.
15	(26) "Organization" means a corporation, a government or
16	government subdivision, an agency, a trust, an estate, a
17	partnership, a limited liability company, a cooperative, an
18	association, a joint venture, an unincorporated organization, or
19	any other entity, however organized.

- (27) "Payable in installments", with respect to a debt or an obligation, means that payment is required or permitted by written agreement to be made in more than four (4) installments not including a down payment.
- (28) "Person" includes an individual or an organization.
- (29) "Principal" of a mortgage transaction means the total of:
 - (a) the net amount paid to, receivable by, or paid or payable for the account of the debtor; and
 - (b) to the extent that payment is deferred, amounts actually paid or to be paid by the creditor for registration, certificate of title, or license fees if not included in clause (a).
- (30) "Real estate brokerage activity" means any activity that involves offering or providing real estate brokerage services to the public, including the following:
 - (a) Acting as a real estate agent or real estate broker for a buyer, seller, lessor, or lessee of real property.
 - (b) Bringing together parties interested in the sale, purchase, lease, rental, or exchange of real property.
 - (c) Negotiating, on behalf of any party, any part of a contract relating to the sale, purchase, lease, rental, or exchange of real property (other than in connection with providing financing with respect to the sale, purchase, lease, rental, or exchange of real property).



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1	(d) Engaging in any activity for which a person engaged in the
2	activity is required to be registered or licensed as a real estate
3	agent or real estate broker under any applicable law.
4	(e) Offering to engage in any activity, or act in any capacity,
5	described in this subsection.
6	(31) "Registered mortgage loan originator" means any individual
7	who:
8	(a) meets the definition of mortgage loan originator and is an
9	employee of:
10	(i) a depository institution;
11	(ii) a subsidiary that is owned and controlled by a depository
12	institution and regulated by a federal banking agency; or
13	(iii) an institution regulated by the Farm Credit
14	Administration; and
15	(b) is registered with, and maintains a unique identifier
16	through, the NMLSR.
17	(32) "Residential real estate" means any real property that is
18	located in Indiana and on which there is located or intended to be
19	constructed a dwelling.
20	(33) "Revolving first lien mortgage transaction" means a first lien
21	mortgage transaction in which:
22	(a) the creditor permits the debtor to obtain advances from
23	time to time;
24	(b) the unpaid balances of principal, finance charges, and other
25	appropriate charges are debited to an account; and
26	(c) the debtor has the privilege of paying the balances in
27	installments.
28	(34) "Tablefunded" means a transaction in which:
29	(a) a person closes a first lien mortgage transaction in the
30	person's own name as a mortgagee with funds provided by one
31	(1) or more other persons; and
32	(b) the transaction is assigned, not later than one (1) business
33	day after the funding of the transaction, to the mortgage
34	creditor providing the funding.
35	(35) "Unique identifier" means a number or other identifier
36	assigned by protocols established by the NMLSR.
37	(36) "Land contract" means a contract for the sale of real estate in
38	which the seller of the real estate retains legal title to the real
39	estate until the total contract price is paid by the buyer.
40	(37) "Bona fide nonprofit organization" means an organization
41	that does the following, as determined by the director, under
42	criteria established by the director:
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1	(a) Maintains tax exempt status under Section 501(c)(3) of the
2	Internal Revenue Code.
3	(b) Promotes affordable housing or provides home ownership
4	education or similar services.
5	(c) Conducts the organization's activities in a manner that
6	serves public or charitable purposes.
7	(d) Receives funding and revenue and charges fees in a
8	manner that does not encourage the organization or the
9	organization's employees to act other than in the best interests
10	of the organization's clients.
11	(e) Compensates the organization's employees in a manner that
12	does not encourage employees to act other than in the best
13	interests of the organization's clients.
14	(f) Provides to, or identifies for, debtors mortgage transactions
15	with terms that are favorable to the debtor (as described in
16	section 202(b)(15) of this chapter) and comparable to
17	mortgage transactions and housing assistance provided under
18	government housing assistance programs.
19	(g) Maintains certification by the United States Department of
20	Housing and Urban Development or employs counselors who
21	are certified by the Indiana housing and community
22	development authority.
23	(38) "Regularly engaged", with respect to a person who extends
24	or originates first lien mortgage transactions, refers to a person
25	who:
26	(a) extended or originated more than five (5) first lien
27	mortgage transactions in the preceding calendar year; or
28	(b) extends or originates, or will extend or originate, more than
29	five (5) first lien mortgage transactions in the current calendar
30	year if the person did not extend or originate more than five
31	(5) first lien mortgage transactions in the preceding calendar
32	year.
33	SECTION 3. IC 24-4.4-2-201, AS AMENDED BY P.L.27-2012,
34	SECTION 6, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE
35	UPON PASSAGE]: Sec. 201. (1) A creditor or mortgage servicer shall
36	provide, in writing, an accurate payoff amount for a first lien mortgage
37	transaction to the debtor not later than seven (7) business days
38	(excluding legal public holidays, Saturdays, and Sundays) after the
39	creditor or mortgage servicer receives the debtor's written request for
40	the accurate payoff amount. A payoff statement provided by a creditor

or mortgage servicer under this subsection must show the date the

statement was prepared and itemize the unpaid principal balance and



each fee, charge, or other sum included within the payoff amount. A creditor or mortgage servicer who fails to provide an accurate payoff amount is liable for:

- (a) one hundred dollars (\$100) if an accurate payoff amount is not provided by the creditor or mortgage servicer not later than seven (7) business days (excluding legal public holidays, Saturdays, and Sundays) after the creditor or mortgage servicer receives the debtor's first written request; and
- (b) the greater of:

- (i) one hundred dollars (\$100); or
- (ii) the loan finance charge that accrues on the first lien mortgage transaction from the date the creditor or mortgage servicer receives the first written request until the date on which the accurate payoff amount is provided;

if an accurate payoff amount is not provided by the creditor or mortgage servicer not later than seven (7) business days (excluding legal public holidays, Saturdays, and Sundays) after the creditor or mortgage servicer receives the debtor's second written request, and the creditor or mortgage servicer fails to comply with subdivision (a).

- (2) This subsection applies to a first lien mortgage transaction, or the refinancing or consolidation of a first lien mortgage transaction, that:
 - (a) is closed after June 30, 2009; and
 - (b) has an interest rate that is subject to change at one (1) or more times during the term of the first lien mortgage transaction.

A creditor in a transaction to which this subsection applies may not contract for and may not charge the debtor a prepayment fee or penalty.

(3) This subsection applies to a first lien mortgage transaction with respect to which any installment or minimum payment due is delinquent for at least sixty (60) days. The creditor, servicer, or the creditor's agent shall acknowledge a written offer made in connection with a proposed short sale not later than five (5) business days (excluding legal public holidays, Saturdays, and Sundays) after the date of the offer if the offer complies with the requirements for a qualified written request set forth in 12 U.S.C. 2605(e)(1)(B). The creditor, servicer, or creditor's agent is required to acknowledge a written offer made in connection with a proposed short sale from a third party acting on behalf of the debtor only if the debtor has provided written authorization for the creditor, servicer, or creditor's agent to do so. Not later than thirty (30) business days (excluding legal public holidays, Saturdays, and Sundays) after receipt of an offer under this subsection,



the creditor, servicer, or creditor's agent shall respond to the offer with an acceptance or a rejection of the offer. The thirty (30) day period described in this subsection may be extended for not more than fifteen (15) business days (excluding legal public holidays, Saturdays, and Sundays) if, before the end of the thirty (30) day period, the creditor, the servicer, or the creditor's agent notifies the debtor of the extension and the reason the extension is needed. Payment accepted by a creditor, servicer, or creditor's agent in connection with a short sale constitutes payment in full satisfaction of the first lien mortgage transaction unless the creditor, servicer, or creditor's agent obtains:

- (a) the following statement: "The debtor remains liable for any amount still owed under the first lien mortgage transaction."; or (b) a statement substantially similar to the statement set forth in
- subdivision (a);

acknowledged by the initials or signature of the debtor, on or before the date on which the short sale payment is accepted. As used in this subsection, "short sale" means a transaction in which the property that is the subject of a first lien mortgage transaction is sold for an amount that is less than the amount of the debtor's outstanding obligation under the first lien mortgage transaction. A creditor or mortgage servicer that fails to respond to an offer within the time prescribed by this subsection is liable in accordance with 12 U.S.C. 2605(f) in any action brought under that section.

(4) This section is not intended to provide the owner of real estate subject to the issuance of process under a judgment or decree of foreclosure any protection or defense against a deficiency judgment for purposes of the borrower protections from liability that must be disclosed under 12 CFR 1026.38(p)(3) on the form required by 12 CFR 1026.38 ("Closing Disclosures" form under the Amendments to the 2013 Integrated Mortgage Disclosures Rule **Under the Real Estate Settlement Procedures Act (Regulation X)** and the Truth In Lending Act (Regulation Z) and the 2013 Loan Originator Rule Under the Truth in Lending Act (Regulation Z)).

 - (a) to simplify, clarify, and modernize the law governing retail installment sales, consumer credit, small loans, and usury;
 - (b) to provide rate ceilings to assure an adequate supply of credit to consumers:

2	transactions and to foster competition among suppliers of
3	consumer credit so that consumers may obtain credit at
4	reasonable cost;
5	(d) to protect consumer buyers, lessees, and borrowers against

28	(b) fees for preparation of a deed, settlement statement, or other
29	documents;
30	(c) escrows for future payments of taxes and insurance;
31	(d) fees for notarizing deeds and other documents;
32	(e) appraisal fees; and
33	(f) fees for credit reports.
34	(6) "Conspicuous" refers to a term or clause when it is so written
35	that a reasonable person against whom it is to operate ought to have
36	noticed it.
37	(7) "Consumer credit" means credit offered or extended to a
38	consumer primarily for a personal, family, or household purpose.
39	(8) "Consumer credit sale" is a sale of goods, services, or an interest
40	in land in which:

- (3) The creditor or mortgage servicer shall provide, in writing, an accurate payoff amount for the consumer loan to the debtor within seven (7) business days (excluding legal public holidays, Saturdays, and Sundays) after the creditor or mortgage servicer receives the debtor's written request for the accurate consumer loan payoff amount. A payoff statement provided by a creditor or mortgage servicer under this subsection must show the date the statement was prepared and itemize the unpaid principal balance and each fee, charge, or other sum included within the payoff amount. A creditor or mortgage servicer who fails to provide the accurate consumer loan payoff amount is liable for:
 - (a) one hundred dollars (\$100) if an accurate consumer loan



payoff amount is not provided by the creditor or mortgage servicer within seven (7) business days (excluding legal public holidays, Saturdays, and Sundays) after the creditor or mortgage servicer receives the debtor's first written request; and

A liability under this subsection is an excess charge under IC 24-4.5-5-202.

(7) Loans or extensions of credit to any financial institution or to any receiver, conservator, superintendent of banks, or other agent in charge of the business and property of the financial institution, when such loans or extensions of credit are approved by the director, are not subject to any limitation based on capital and surplus. set forth in 12 CFR 32.3.

However, any such company may sell any real estate so purchased or otherwise acquired by it under a title-retaining installment real estate sales contract, the term of which shall not exceed twelve (12) years, and hold title or possession thereof until the same is conveyed to the purchaser thereof under the terms and provisions of any such contract.
- (c) For the purposes of subsection (a)(1), real estate purchased or held for the convenient transaction of the business of a company includes the following:
 - (1) Real estate on which the principal office or a branch office of the company is located.
 - (2) Real estate that is the location of facilities supporting the operations of the company, such as parking facilities, data processing centers, loan production offices, automated teller machines, night depositories, facilities necessary for the operations of a company subsidiary, or other facilities that are approved by the director.

If the person to be examined under this subsection refuses to permit the examination to be made, the director may order any credit union that receives services from the person refusing the examination to:
 - (1) discontinue receiving one (1) or more services from the person; or
 - (2) otherwise cease conducting business with the person.

SECTION 26. IC 28-7-1-33, AS AMENDED BY P.L.35-2010, SECTION 169, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2016]: Sec. 33. (a) **Except as provided in section 33.1 of this chapter,** any two (2) or more credit unions may, with the approval of the department, merge. This section authorizes the merger of a credit union organized under this chapter with a credit union organized under any other law.

- (b) The board of directors of each credit union participating in the merger must by majority vote approve a joint agreement of merger.
- (c) After the resolutions approving a joint agreement of merger have been adopted by the board of directors of each credit union, the credit unions shall submit the resolutions and joint agreement to the department for approval. The department may, in the department's discretion, approve or disapprove the resolution and joint agreement. In deciding whether to approve or disapprove the resolution and joint agreement under this section, the department shall consider the following factors:
 - (1) Whether the **surviving** credit unions subject to **union resulting from** the proposed transaction are **will be** operated in a safe, sound, and prudent manner.
 - (2) Whether the financial condition of any credit union subject to the proposed transaction will jeopardize the financial stability of any other credit unions subject to the proposed transaction.



- 1 (3) Whether the proposed transaction will result in a credit union
 2 that has inadequate capital, unsatisfactory management, or poor
 3 earnings prospects.
 4 (4) Whether the proposed transaction, in the department's
 - (4) Whether the proposed transaction, in the department's judgment and considering the available information under the prevailing circumstances, will result in an institution that is more favorable to the stakeholders than if the entities were to remain separate.
 - (5) Whether the management or other principals of the credit union that will result from the proposed transaction are qualified by character and financial responsibility to control and operate in a legal and proper manner the resulting credit union.
 - (6) Whether the credit unions subject to the proposed transaction furnish all the information the department requires in reaching the department's decision.
 - (d) If the joint agreement is approved by the department, any credit union whose existence will terminate as a result of the merger shall submit the joint agreement to a vote of its shareholders at the meeting directed by the resolution of the board of directors. A majority of the shareholders present at the meeting may approve the joint agreement. However, the department may permit the merger to become effective without the affirmative vote of the membership of a credit union if that credit union is in danger of insolvency or if the qualified group or groups associated with the credit union either have ceased or will soon cease to exist.
 - (e) After approval of the joint agreement by the shareholders of the merging credit unions, each credit union shall execute in triplicate articles of merger, on forms furnished by the department, which shall set forth the following:
 - (1) The time and place of the meeting of the board of directors at which the plan was approved.
 - (2) The vote by which the plan was approved by the board.
 - (3) A copy of the resolution or other action by which the plan was agreed upon.
 - (4) The time and place of the meeting of the members at which the plan was approved.
 - (5) The vote by which the plan was approved by the members.
 - (f) The articles, joint agreement, and resolutions shall be delivered to the department for certification, which shall be evidenced in the manner prescribed in IC 28-12-5, and shall be presented to the secretary of state for recording. **filing.** The secretary of state shall file one (1) copy of the articles of merger and shall issue a certificate of



merger and two (2) copies of the articles of merger to the surviving credit union. The date on which the secretary of state issues the certificate of merger is the effective date of the merger.

(g) The articles of merger shall be filed with the county recorder of the county in which the principal office of the surviving credit union is located.

SECTION 27. IC 28-7-1-33.1 IS ADDED TO THE INDIANA CODE AS A NEW SECTION TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2016]: Sec. 33.1. The approval of the department of the merger of two (2) or more credit unions is not required under this chapter if the credit union surviving the merger is an institution organized or reorganized under the laws of the United States or a state (as defined in IC 28-2-17-19) other than Indiana. However, the surviving credit union shall:

- (1) notify the department of the merger;
- (2) provide satisfactory evidence to the department of compliance with the requirements of IC 28-1-22 relating to foreign corporations, if applicable; and
- (3) provide satisfactory evidence to the department of compliance with the requirements of section 34 of this chapter relating to credit unions organized in other states, if applicable.

SECTION 28. IC 28-10-1-1, AS AMENDED BY P.L.186-2015, SECTION 50, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2016]: Sec. 1. A reference to a federal law or federal regulation in this title is a reference to the law or regulation as in effect December 31, 2014. 2015.

SECTION 29. IC 28-13-4-5 IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2016]: Sec. 5. (a) A corporation may not declare or pay any dividends to its shareholders in any form if, by the payment of the dividends, its capital stock will be thereby impaired.

- (b) **Unless approved by the director,** a corporation may never not pay a dividend in an amount greater than the remainder of undivided profits then on hand after deducting losses, bad debts, or depreciation that the department may have determined, and all other expenses.
- (c) A corporation must obtain department approval before reducing the corporation's capital stock, capital surplus, or preferred stock.

SECTION 30. IC 32-29-7-5 IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE UPON PASSAGE]: Sec. 5. (a) The owner of the real estate subject to the issuance of process under a judgment or decree of foreclosure may, with the consent of the judgment holder



endorsed on the judgment or decree of foreclosure, file with the clerk
of the court a waiver of the time limitations on issuance of process set
out in section 3 of this chapter. If the owner files a waiver under this
section, process shall issue immediately. The consideration for waiver,
whether or not expressed by its terms, shall be the waiver and release
by the judgment holder of any deficiency judgment against the owner.

(b) This section is not intended to provide the owner of real estate subject to the issuance of process under a judgment or decree of foreclosure any protection or defense against a deficiency judgment for purposes of the borrower protections from liability that must be disclosed under 12 CFR 1026.38(p)(3) on the form required by 12 CFR 1026.38 ("Closing Disclosures" form under the Amendments to the 2013 Integrated Mortgage Disclosures Rule Under the Real Estate Settlement Procedures Act (Regulation X) and the Truth In Lending Act (Regulation Z) and the 2013 Loan Originator Rule Under the Truth in Lending Act (Regulation Z)).
