DIGEST OF INTRODUCED BILL

Citations Affected: IC 35-33-1-4; IC 35-41-3-3; IC 35-47-4-3.

Synopsis: Citizen's arrests. Specifies that a person may perform a citizen's arrest only if: (1) the arrest is justified under the self-defense statute; (2) the arrest is justified under the shoplifter or unlawful recording detention statutes; or (3) the arrest is based on a criminal offense committed on private property in the presence of the arresting person, if the arresting person has a contractual interest in the property or is an employee of an establishment located on the property. Makes conforming amendments.

A BILL FOR AN ACT to amend the Indiana Code concerning criminal law and procedure.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

1	SECTION 1. IC 35-33-1-4 IS AMENDED TO READ AS
2	FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2021]: Sec. 4. (a) Any A person
3	who is not a law enforcement officer may arrest any other another
4	person only if:
5	(1) the other person committed a felony in his presence;
6	(2) a felony has been committed and he has probable cause to
7	believe that the other person has committed that felony; or
8	(3) a misdemeanor involving a breach of peace is being
9	committed in his presence and the arrest is necessary to prevent
0	the continuance of the breach of peace.
1	(1) the person making the arrest is justified in using
2	reasonable force against the other person under IC 35-41-3-2
3	(self-defense);
4	(2) the other person's detention is justified under IC 35-33-6-2
5	(detention of shoplifter) or IC 35-33-6-2.5 (detention of person
6	making an unlawful recording), and the person making the
7	arrest complies with the requirements of IC 35-33-6-2 or



1	IC 35-33-6-2.5, as appropriate; or
2	(3) the other person:
3	(A) committed a felony in the presence of the person; or
4	(B) is committing a misdemeanor involving a breach of
5	peace in the presence of the other person, and the arrest is
6	necessary to prevent the continuance of the breach of
7	peace;
8	if the felony or misdemeanor is committed on private
9	property, including private property open to the public, and
10	the person performing the arrest either has a contractual
11	interest in the property or is an employee of an establishment
12	located on the property.
13	(b) A person making an arrest under this section shall, as soon as
14	practical, notify a law enforcement officer and deliver custody of the
15	person arrested to a law enforcement officer.
16	(c) The law enforcement officer may process the arrested person as
17	if the officer had arrested him. the person. The officer who receives or
18	processes a person arrested by another under this section is not liable
19	for false arrest or false imprisonment.
20	SECTION 2. IC 35-41-3-3 IS AMENDED TO READ AS
21	FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2021]: Sec. 3. (a) A person other
22	than a law enforcement officer is justified in using reasonable force
23	against another person to effect an arrest or prevent the other person's
24	escape if:
25	(1) a felony has been committed; and
26	(2) there is probable cause to believe the other person committed
27	that felony.
28	However, such a person is not justified in using deadly force unless that
29	force is justified under section 2 of this chapter.
30	(b) (a) A law enforcement officer is justified in using reasonable
31	force if the officer reasonably believes that the force is necessary to
32	effect a lawful arrest. However, an officer is justified in using deadly
33	force only if the officer:
34	(1) has probable cause to believe that that deadly force is
35	necessary:
36	(A) to prevent the commission of a forcible felony; or
37	(B) to effect an arrest of a person who the officer has probable
38	cause to believe poses a threat of serious bodily injury to the
39	officer or a third person; and
40	(2) has given a warning, if feasible, to the person against whom
41	the deadly force is to be used.

(c) (b) A law enforcement officer making an arrest under an invalid



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1	warrant is justified in using force as if the warrant was valid, unless the
2	officer knows that the warrant is invalid.
3	(d) (c) A law enforcement officer who has an arrested person in
4	custody is justified in using the same force to prevent the escape of the
5	arrested person from custody that the officer would be justified in using
6	if the officer was arresting that person. However, an officer is justified
7	in using deadly force only if the officer:
8	(1) has probable cause to believe that deadly force is necessary to
9	prevent the escape from custody of a person who the officer has
10	probable cause to believe poses a threat of serious bodily injury
11	to the officer or a third person; and
12	(2) has given a warning, if feasible, to the person against whom
13	the deadly force is to be used.
14	(e) (d) A guard or other official in a penal facility or a law
15	enforcement officer is justified in using reasonable force, including
16	deadly force, if the officer has probable cause to believe that the force
17	is necessary to prevent the escape of a person who is detained in the
18	penal facility.
19	(f) (e) Notwithstanding subsection (b), (a), (c), or (d), or (e), a law
20	enforcement officer who is a defendant in a criminal prosecution has
21	the same right as a person who is not a law enforcement officer to
22	assert self-defense under IC 35-41-3-2.
23	SECTION 3. IC 35-47-4-3, AS AMENDED BY P.L.158-2013,
24	SECTION 589, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS
25	[EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2021]: Sec. 3. (a) This section does not apply
26	to a law enforcement officer who is acting within the scope of the law
27	enforcement officer's official duties or to a person who is justified in
28	using reasonable force against another person under
29	(1) IC 35-41-3-2 (self-defense). or
30	(2) IC 35-41-3-3.
31	(b) A person who knowingly or intentionally points a firearm at
32	another person commits a Level 6 felony. However, the offense is a

Class A misdemeanor if the firearm was not loaded.
