## **HOUSE BILL No. 1523**

## DIGEST OF INTRODUCED BILL

**Citations Affected:** IC 12-23-12-1; IC 16-36-1-3.

**Synopsis:** Parental notification of treatment of a minor. Requires a health care provider, when providing treatment to a minor for alcoholism, alcohol abuse, drug abuse, or a venereal disease, to make a reasonable effort to contact the minor's parent or guardian to provide information on the minor's condition and proposed treatment and to document in writing each attempt the health care provider makes to contact the parent or guardian of the minor.

Effective: July 1, 2021.

## **HOUSE BILL No. 1523**

A BILL FOR AN ACT to amend the Indiana Code concerning health.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

SECTION 1. IC 12-23-12-1 IS AMENDED TO READ AS
FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2021]: Sec. 1. (a) A minor who
voluntarily seeks treatment for alcoholism, alcohol abuse, or drug
abuse from the division or a facility approved by the division may
receive treatment without notification or consent of the parents,
guardian, or person having control or custody of the minor.
(b) A health care provider may provide care to a minor
described in subsection (a) after receiving the minor's consent.
However, the health care provider shall:
(1) make a reasonable effort to contact the minor's parent or
guardian to provide information on the minor's condition and
proposed treatment; and
(2) document in writing each attempt the health care provider
makes to contact the parent or guardian of the minor.
SECTION 2. IC 16-36-1-3, AS AMENDED BY P.L.139-2019,
SECTION 1, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE
JULY 1, 2021]: Sec. 3. (a) Except as provided in subsections (b)

23	has obtained written permission from the person's parent.
24	(d) An individual who has, suspects that the individual has, or has
25	been exposed to a venereal disease is competent to give consent for
26	medical or hospital care or treatment of the individual.

31	guardian to provide information on the minor's condition and
