## HOUSE BILL No. 1646

A BILL FOR AN ACT concerning criminal law and procedure.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

SECTION 1. [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2017] (a) The following definitions apply throughout this SECTION:
(1) "Ballistics" is the forensic science of matching a discharged bullet or cartridge to a particular firearm by examining microscopic tool marks left on parts of a firearm during the manufacturing process which are transferred to a bullet or cartridge casing when the firearm is fired.
(2) "Microstamping" is the process of etching unique microscopic markers onto the tip of a firing pin and the breech face of a firearm in such a way that the etchings will be transferred to a cartridge in the course of discharging a firearm for the purpose of matching a spent cartridge to a particular firearm.
(b) The general assembly urges the legislative council to assign to the interim study committee on corrections and criminal code, or to another appropriate study committee, the topic of ballistics and microstamping.
(c) The study committee shall consider the following:
(1) The effectiveness of ballistics or microstamping in solving or preventing crimes involving firearms.
(2) The experience of law enforcement agencies in using ballistics to match firearms to bullets or spent cartridges.
(3) California's experience with its microstamping program.
(4) The usefulness of the NIST Ballistics Research Toolmark Database, sponsored by the National Institute of Justice of the United States Department of Justice.
(d) This SECTION expires November 2, 2017.
