DIGEST OF INTRODUCED BILL

Citations Affected: IC 3-5-2-11.3; IC 3-11; IC 3-12-4-6.

Synopsis: Voting hours. Provides that the polls open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. (Under current law, the polls must open at 6 a.m. and close at 6 p.m.)

Effective: January 1, 2020.

HOUSE BILL No. 1684

A BILL FOR AN ACT to amend the Indiana Code concerning elections.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

1 SECTION 1. IC 3-5-2-11.3 IS ADDED TO THE INDIANA CODE 2 AS A NEW SECTION TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE 3 JANUARY 1, 2020]: Sec. 11.3. "Close of the polls" refers to the 4 time that the polls are set to close under IC 3-11-8-8. 5 SECTION 2. IC 3-11-4-18, AS AMENDED BY P.L.100-2018, 6 SECTION 2, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE 7 JANUARY 1, 2020]: Sec. 18. (a) If a voter satisfies any of the 8 qualifications described in IC 3-11-10-24 that entitle a voter to cast an 9 absentee ballot by mail, the county election board shall, at the request 10 of the voter, mail the official ballot, postage fully prepaid, to the voter 11 at the address stated in the application. Each ballot may be assigned a 12 unique tracking number as prescribed by the election division using 13 IMb Tracing or a similar automated tracking method to provide 14 real-time tracking information for the envelope containing the ballot. 15 As used in this subsection, "IMb Tracing" refers to a real-time mail 16 tracking service offered through the United States Postal Service. 17 (b) If the county election board mails an absentee ballot to a voter

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1 required to file additional documentation with the county voter 2 registration office before voting by absentee ballot under this chapter, 3 the board shall include a notice to the voter in the envelope mailed to 4 the voter under section 20 of this chapter. The notice must inform the 5 voter that the voter must file the additional documentation required 6 under IC 3-7-33-4.5 with the county voter registration office not later 7 than noon on election day for the absentee ballot to be counted as an 8 absentee ballot, and that, if the documentation required under 9 IC 3-7-33-4.5 is filed after noon and before 6 p.m. the close of the 10 polls on election day, the ballot will be processed as a provisional ballot. The election division shall prescribe the form of this notice 11 12 under IC 3-5-4-8. 13 (c) Except as provided in this subsection, section 18.5 of this chapter, or IC 3-11-10-26.5, the ballot shall be transmitted: 14 15 (1) on the day of the receipt of the voter's application; or 16 (2) not more than five (5) days after the date of delivery of the 17 ballots under section 15 of this chapter; 18 whichever is later. If the election board determines that the county 19 voter registration office has received an application from the applicant 20 for registration at an address within the precinct indicated on the 21 application, and the election board determines that this application is 22 pending under IC 3-7-33, the ballot shall be mailed on the date the 23 county voter registration office indicates under IC 3-7-33-5(g) that the 24 applicant is a registered voter. 25 (d) As required by 52 U.S.C. 21081, an election board shall 26 establish a voter education program (specific to a paper ballot or 27 optical scan ballot card provided as an absentee ballot under this 28 chapter) to notify a voter of the effect of casting multiple votes for a 29 single office. 30 (e) As provided by 52 U.S.C. 21081, when an absentee ballot is 31 transmitted under this section, the mailing must include: 32 (1) information concerning the effect of casting multiple votes for 33 an office; and 34 (2) instructions on how to correct the ballot before the ballot is 35 cast and counted, including the issuance of replacement ballots. 36 SECTION 3. IC 3-11-8-8 IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS 37 [EFFECTIVE JANUARY 1, 2020]: Sec. 8. The polls in each precinct 38 open at 67 a.m. and close at 67 p.m. on election day. 39 SECTION 4. IC 3-11-10-11, AS AMENDED BY P.L.221-2005, 40 SECTION 70, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE 41 JANUARY 1, 2020]: Sec. 11. (a) On election day each circuit court 42 clerk (or an agent of the clerk) shall visit the appropriate post office to



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accept delivery of absentee envelopes at the latest possible time that will permit delivery of the ballots to the appropriate precinct election boards before 6 p.m. the close of the polls.

(b) Not later than noon on election day, the county voter registration
office shall visit the appropriate post office to accept delivery of mail
containing documentation submitted by a voter to comply with
IC 3-7-33-4.5. The office shall immediately notify the county election
board regarding the filing of this documentation to permit the board to
provide certification of this filing to the appropriate precinct election
boards before 6 p.m. the close of the polls.

SECTION 5. IC 3-11-14-19 IS AMENDED TO READ AS
FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JANUARY 1, 2020]: Sec. 19. Each county
election board shall be at its office from 5 6 a.m. until 6 p.m. the close
of the polls on election day. Upon notice that an electronic voting
system is out of order or fails to work, the board shall be ready between
those hours to deliver to any precinct in the county:

17 (1) necessary paper ballots;

18 (2) election booths with an adequate number of stalls;

(3) ballot boxes; and

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20 (4) all necessary supplies and equipment as required by law.

SECTION 6. IC 3-12-4-6 IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS
 [EFFECTIVE JANUARY 1, 2020]: Sec. 6. (a) At 6 p.m. the close of
 the polls on each election day, the county election board shall assemble
 in a room to canvass the certificates, poll lists, and tally papers returned
 by each inspector in the county and to declare the results of the election
 as provided in this chapter.

(b) The canvassing must be performed in public under IC 5-14-1.5.
However, the board may restrict access to parts of the room where
election material is being handled or transported to safeguard the
material.

31 (c) Except as provided in section 7 of this chapter, the county
32 executive shall provide a room in the courthouse that contains adequate
33 space to permit members of the public to witness the canvassing of
34 votes.
