1	A HOUSE RESOLUTION designates May as General
2	Aviation Appreciation Month.
3	Whereas, In 1939, several significant events took place to
4	usher in a new era of general aviation that would solidify its
5	important place in American society;
6	Whereas, American general aviation industry transitioned
7	from the "Golden Age" to full mobilization for World War II,
8	during which the airplane changed from a slow,
9	wood-and-fabric biplane to a fast, sleek, all-metal monoplane;
10	Whereas, President Franklin D. Roosevelt signed the
11	Civilian Pilot Training Act, which provided a needed boost to
12	general aviation by providing pilot training to 20,000 college

13 students each year. At the peak of the Civilian Pilot Training

14 Program, 1,132 educational institutions and 1,460 flight

1 schools participated in the program; 2 Whereas, President Roosevelt also established National Aviation Day in 1939 to celebrate Orville Wright's birthday; 3 Whereas, The Aircraft Owners and Pilots Association 4 5 (AOPA) was founded to protect the freedom to fly while keeping general aviation safe, fun, and affordable. Today, AOPA is the 6 largest and most trusted resource for all things related to 7 8 general aviation; 9 Whereas, Today, the U.S. general aviation industry is composed of more than 200,000 aircraft, safely flies over 26 10 million flight hours, and registers 30 million safe takeoffs and 11 landings per year; 12 13 Whereas, General aviation contributes over \$247 billion in economic impact and supports 1.2 million jobs across the 14 country, and often serves as a vital lifeline for communities 15 through missions of disaster relief, humanitarian aid, law 16 17 enforcement, and agricultural support; Whereas, Over 650,000 registered pilots in the United States 18 19 access more than 5,100 public use airports and another 14,000 privately owned airfields, more than any other country in the 20 world. These pilots and airports connect communities across 21 America with the National Air Transportation system; 22 Whereas, General aviation is safer than it has ever been. 23 General aviation safety performance has greatly improved over 24 the last several decades, with the fatal accident rate, a 25 traditional measuring stick, lowering to 0.73 per 100,000 flight 26 hours, a historic record. That's less than half of what it was in 27 the mid-1990s; 28 Whereas, Over the last 85 years, our citizens have marveled 29 at the continual technological advancements in general 30 aviation that have improved our lives, enabled access to 31 communities across the country, created hundreds of billions of 32 dollars in economic impact and growth, and propelled the U.S. 33 as the world leader in general aviation; 34



Whereas, People travel from around the world to access the
 exceptional training and the freedom in this country to fly
 general aviation aircraft. Foreign governments send their pilots
 here for critical training to fly their most prominent dignitaries
 and to train for careers in the airlines;

6 Whereas, Americans Orville and Wilbur Wright first 7 harnessed powered flight at Kill Devil Hills, North Carolina, 8 and Charles Lindbergh became the most famous person the 9 world had ever known when he departed U.S. soil in an 10 American-built aircraft to cross the Atlantic, providing a deep 11 source of American pride and identity;

Whereas, The state of Indiana has 5,120 registered general
aviation aircraft, 13,300 certificated pilots, and 128 public-use
facilities; and

15 Whereas, General aviation brings over \$1.4 billion in 16 economic activity and supports 11,280 jobs to the state of 17 Indiana according to the State Aviation System Plan: 18 Therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the
 General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana House of Representatives 21 recognizes that the national celebration of the General Aviation 22 Flyover in Washington, D.C., presents a tremendous 23 opportunity to seize the public imagination, reflect on our 24 ability to safely achieve innovative technological 25 advancements, and be a defining moment in remembering the 26 past, present, and future significance of general aviation in the 27 United States. 28

SECTION 2. That the Indiana House of Representatives
 designates May 2024 as General Aviation Appreciation Month
 to commemorate the last 85 years in general aviation.
