



### SENATE BILL No. 163

DIGEST OF SB 163 (Updated January 24, 2019 9:19 am - DI 106)

Citations Affected: IC 9-30; IC 35-43.

**Synopsis:** Recidivist look back periods. Provides that a person commits a Level 6 felony if the person: (1) has a prior conviction for operating while intoxicated that occurred within the previous seven years; or (2) has at least two prior unrelated convictions for operating while intoxicated, two of which occurred in the previous 15 years. Provides that a person who causes serious bodily injury to another person when operating a vehicle while intoxicated commits a Level 5 felony if the person has a previous conviction for operating while intoxicated within the previous seven years. Provides that a person commits a Level 6 felony for theft if the person has a prior unrelated conviction for theft or conversion that occurred within the previous 10 years. (Current law provides that a person commits a Level 6 felony for theft if the person has a prior unrelated conviction for theft or conversion at any time.)

Effective: July 1, 2019.

## **SENATE BILL No. 163**

A BILL FOR AN ACT to amend the Indiana Code concerning criminal law and procedure.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

1	SECTION 1. IC 9-30-5-3, AS AMENDED BY P.L.158-2013,
2	SECTION 159, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS
3	[EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2019]: Sec. 3. (a) Except as provided in
4	subsection (b), a person who violates section 1 or 2 of this chapter
5	commits a Level 6 felony if:
6	(1) the person has a previous conviction of operating while
7	intoxicated that occurred within the five (5) seven (7) years
8	immediately preceding the occurrence of the violation of section
9	1 or 2 of this chapter; or
10	(2) the person:
11	(A) is at least twenty-one (21) years of age;
12	(B) violates section 1(b) or 2(b) of this chapter; and
13	(C) operated a vehicle in which at least one (1) passenger was
14	less than eighteen (18) years of age; or
15	(3) the person has at least two (2) prior unrelated convictions
16	of operating while intoxicated under this chapter, two (2) of
17	which occurred within the fifteen (15) years immediately



1	preceding the occurrence of the violation of section 1 or 2 of
2	this chapter.
3	(b) A person who violates section 1 or 2 of this chapter or
4	subsection (a)(2) commits a Level 5 felony if:
5	(1) the person has a previous conviction of operating while
6	intoxicated causing death (IC 9-30-5-5); or
7	(2) the person has a previous conviction of operating while
8	intoxicated causing serious bodily injury (IC 9-30-5-4).
9	SECTION 2. IC 9-30-5-4, AS AMENDED BY P.L.63-2018,
0	SECTION 2, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE
l 1	JULY 1, 2019]: Sec. 4. (a) A person who causes serious bodily injury
12	to another person when operating a vehicle:
13	(1) with an alcohol concentration equivalent to at least
14	eight-hundredths (0.08) gram of alcohol per:
15	(A) one hundred (100) milliliters of the person's blood; or
16	(B) two hundred ten (210) liters of the person's breath;
17	(2) with a controlled substance listed in schedule I or II of
18	IC 35-48-2 or its metabolite in the person's body; or
19	(3) while intoxicated;
20	commits a Level 6 felony. However, the offense is a Level 5 felony if
21	the person has a previous conviction of operating while intoxicated
22	within the $\frac{\text{five }(5)}{\text{seven }(7)}$ years preceding the commission of the
23 24	offense.
24	(b) A person who violates subsection (a) commits a separate offense
25	for each person whose serious bodily injury is caused by the violation
26	of subsection (a).
27	(c) It is a defense under subsection (a)(2) that the accused person
28	consumed the controlled substance in accordance with a valid
29	prescription or order of a practitioner (as defined in IC 35-48-1) who
30	acted in the course of the practitioner's professional practice.
31	SECTION 3. IC 35-43-4-2, AS AMENDED BY P.L.176-2018,
32	SECTION 6, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE
33	JULY 1, 2019]: Sec. 2. (a) A person who knowingly or intentionally
34	exerts unauthorized control over property of another person, with intent
35	to deprive the other person of any part of its value or use, commits
36	theft, a Class A misdemeanor. However, the offense is:
37	(1) a Level 6 felony if:
38	(A) the value of the property is at least seven hundred fifty
39	dollars (\$750) and less than fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000);
10	(B) the property is a:
11	(i) firearm;
12	(ii) motor vehicle (as defined in IC 9-13-2-105(a)); or



1	(iii) component part (as defined in IC 9-13-2-34) of a motor
2	vehicle; or
3	(C) the person has a prior unrelated conviction for:
4	(i) theft under this section that occurred within the
5	previous ten (10) years; or
6	(ii) criminal conversion under section 3 of this chapter that
7	occurred within the previous ten (10) years; and
8	(2) a Level 5 felony if:
9	(A) the value of the property is at least fifty thousand dollars
10	(\$50,000);
11	(B) the property that is the subject of the theft is a valuable
12	metal (as defined in IC 25-37.5-1-1) and:
13	(i) relates to transportation safety;
14	(ii) relates to public safety; or
15	(iii) is taken from a hospital or other health care facility,
16	telecommunications provider, public utility (as defined in
17	IC 32-24-1-5.9(a)), or key facility;
18	and the absence of the property creates a substantial risk of
19	bodily injury to a person; or
20	(C) the property is a:
21	(i) motor vehicle (as defined in IC 9-13-2-105(a)); or
22	(ii) component part (as defined in IC 9-13-2-34) of a motor
23	vehicle; and
24	the person has a prior unrelated conviction for theft of a motor
25	vehicle (as defined in IC 9-13-2-105(a)) or theft of a
26	component part (as defined in IC 9-13-2-34).
27	(b) For purposes of this section, "the value of property" means:
28	(1) the fair market value of the property at the time and place the
29	offense was committed; or
30	(2) if the fair market value of the property cannot be satisfactorily
31	determined, the cost to replace the property within a reasonable
32	time after the offense was committed.
33	A price tag or price marking on property displayed or offered for sale
34	constitutes prima facie evidence of the value of the property.
