## **SENATE BILL No. 197**

### DIGEST OF INTRODUCED BILL

**Citations Affected:** IC 20-33-2; IC 20-34-3-27; IC 21-7-13; IC 21-18-18; IC 21-48-1.

Synopsis: Student health. Requires the governing body of a school corporation or chief administrative officer of a nonpublic school system to authorize the absence and excuse of a student due to the student's mental or behavioral health concerns. Limits the number of excused absences for mental or behavioral health concerns, without documentation, to three instructional days in a school year. Allows a student to be excused for more than three instructional days if the student provides certain documentation. Requires that a school selected to participate in the United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's Youth Risk Behaviors Survey or a successor survey participate in the survey. Provides that the commission for higher education shall, before January 1, 2024, work with the statewide suicide prevention coordinator to develop a suicide prevention training for students at each state educational institution (institution). Requires each student at an institution, after July 1, 2024, to participate in the training in the student's first year at the institution. Requires each institution to collect and report certain information concerning suicide prevention to the statewide suicide prevention coordinator. Establishes a mental health and suicide prevention in higher education task force (task force). Provides that the task force shall create a statewide suicide prevention resource guide for institutions. Makes conforming changes.

## SENATE BILL No. 197

A BILL FOR AN ACT to amend the Indiana Code concerning education.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

SECTION 1. IC 20-33-2-14, AS AMENDED BY P.L.90-2011,
SECTION 42, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2023]: Sec. 14. (a) This section and sections 15 through 17.5
17.9 of this chapter apply to a student who attends either a public school or a nonpublic school.

(b) The governing body of each school corporation shall have a policy outlining the conditions for excused and unexcused absences. The policy must include the grounds for excused absences required by sections 15 through 17.5 17.9 of this chapter or another law. Any absence that results in a person not attending at least one hundred eighty (180) days in a school year must be in accordance with the governing body's policy to qualify as an excused absence.

(c) Service as a page for or as an honoree of the general assembly
is a lawful excuse for a student to be absent from school, when verified
by a certificate of the secretary of the senate or the chief clerk of the
house of representatives. A student excused from school attendance
under this section may not be recorded as being absent on any date for



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1 which the excuse is operative and may not be penalized by the school 2 in any manner. 3 SECTION 2. IC 20-33-2-17.9 IS ADDED TO THE INDIANA 4 CODE AS A NEW SECTION TO READ AS FOLLOWS 5 [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2023]: Sec. 17.9. (a) The governing body of a school corporation or the chief administrative officer of a 6 7 nonpublic school system shall authorize the absence and excuse of 8 a school student if the absence is caused by the student's mental or 9 behavioral health concerns. 10 (b) Except as provided in subsection (c), the number of excused 11 absences a student may receive under this section may not exceed 12 three (3) instructional days in a school year. 13 (c) A student may be excused for more than three (3) 14 instructional days in a school year if the student provides to school 15 authorities documentation from a physician, psychologist, or psychiatrist verifying the need for the student's absence. 16 17 (d) A student excused from school attendance under this section 18 may not be: 19 (1) recorded as being absent on any date for which the excuse 20 is operative; or 21 (2) penalized by the school in any manner. 22 SECTION 3. IC 20-34-3-27 IS ADDED TO THE INDIANA CODE 23 AS A NEW SECTION TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY 24 1, 2023]: Sec. 27. (a) As used in this section, "school" means any of 25 the following: 26 (1) A charter school. 27 (2) A nonpublic school with at least one (1) employee. 28 (b) A school or school corporation that is selected to participate 29 in the United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention 30 Youth Risk Behaviors Survey or a successor survey shall 31 participate in the survey. 32 SECTION 4. IC 21-7-13-26.7 IS ADDED TO THE INDIANA 33 CODE AS A NEW SECTION TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2023]: Sec. 26.7. "Postvention" means an 34 35 organized response in the aftermath of a suicide to facilitate the 36 healing of individuals from the grief and distress of suicide loss or 37 mitigate other negative effects of exposure to suicide. 38 SECTION 5. IC 21-7-13-28.5 IS ADDED TO THE INDIANA 39 CODE AS A NEW SECTION TO READ AS FOLLOWS 40 [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2023]: Sec. 28.5. "Reentry" refers to a 41 student's return to class after the student has been exposed to 42

suicide or attempted suicide.

6	Sec. 1. As used in this chapter, "task force" refers to the mental
7	health and suicide prevention in higher education task force
8	established by section 2 of this chapter.
9	Sec. 2. The mental health and suicide prevention in higher
10	education task force is established.
11	Sec. 3. The task force consists of the following members:
12	(1) The members of the commission.
13	(2) One (1) member appointed by the commissioner of the
14	Indiana department of health who represents the Indiana
15	department of health.
16	(3) One (1) member appointed by the governor who is a
17	suicide prevention expert.
18	(4) One (1) member appointed by the governor who
19	represents an organization dedicated to supporting veterans.
20	(5) One (1) member appointed by the governor who is
21	affiliated with an emergency medical services provider.
22	(6) One (1) member appointed by the governor who is a
23	community mental or behavioral health provider.
24	(7) Four (4) members appointed by the governor as follows:
25	(A) One (1) member who is employed as the director or
26	executive director of a mental health counseling center at
27	a state educational institution.
28	(B) One (1) member who is employed as the director or
29	executive director of a mental health counseling center at
30	a nonprofit college or university.
31	(C) One (1) member who is employed as the director or
32	executive director of a mental health counseling center at
33	a private college or university.
34	(D) One (1) member who is employed as the director or
35	executive director of a mental health counseling center at
36	a community or technical college.
37	Sec. 4. The members appointed by the governor under section
38	3 of this chapter must reflect the racial, gender, geographic, urban,
39	rural, and economic diversity of Indiana.
40	Sec. 5. If a vacancy occurs in the membership of the task force,
41	the appointing authority that appointed the member whose
42	position is vacant shall appoint an individual to fill the vacancy.

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1	Sec. 6. The task force shall elect one (1) member to serve as the
2	chairperson of the task force and one (1) member to serve as the
3	vice chairperson of the task force.
4	Sec. 7. The task force shall meet upon the call of the
5	chairperson.
6	Sec. 8. The commission shall staff the task force.
7	Sec. 9. The affirmative votes of a majority of the members of the
8	task force are required for the task force to take action on any
9	measure.
10	Sec. 10. (a) The task force shall develop a statewide resource
11	guide on mental health and suicide prevention for state educational
12	institutions.
13	(b) The statewide resource guide required by subsection (a)
14	must include the following:
15	(1) A free curriculum to train students, staff, and faculty of a
16	state educational institution concerning:
17	(A) screening methods for suicide risk; and
18	(B) appropriate referrals;
19	including methods of addressing the specific needs of
20	veterans.
21	(2) A model crisis protocol, per sector, on the identification of
22	mental health issues and suicidal behavior, intervention,
23	reentry, and postvention.
24	(3) Model marketing materials to promote student mental
25	health in higher education.
26	(4) Culturally relevant mental health and suicide prevention
27	resources for diverse communities and underrepresented
28	populations.
29	(c) The task force shall make the statewide resource guide
30	publicly available on the commission's website.
31	Sec. 11. In addition to the duty outlined under section 10 of this
32	chapter, the task force shall do the following:
33	(1) Serve as a resource for a state educational institution to
34	provide suicide prevention training for students, as required
35	by IC 21-48-1-2.
36	(2) Develop an annual conference for state educational
37	institutions concerning student mental health and suicide
38	prevention.
39	(3) Plan and host the first annual conference described in
40	subdivision (2).
41	Sec. 12. (a) Each member of the task force who is not a state
42	employee is entitled to reimbursement for traveling expenses as

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provided under IC 4-13-1-4 and other expenses actually incurred in connection with the member's duties as provided in the state policies and procedures established by the Indiana department of administration and approved by the budget agency.

(b) Each member of the task force who is a state employee but who is not a member of the general assembly is entitled to reimbursement for traveling expenses as provided under IC 4-13-1-4 and other expenses actually incurred in connection with the member's duties as provided in the state policies and procedures established by the Indiana department of administration and approved by the budget agency.

(c) Each member of the task force who is a member of the
general assembly is entitled to receive the same per diem, mileage,
and travel allowances paid to members of the general assembly
serving on interim study committees established by the legislative
council.

17SECTION 7. IC 21-48-1-2 IS ADDED TO THE INDIANA CODE18AS A NEW SECTION TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY191, 2023]: Sec. 2. (a) Before January 1, 2024, the commission, in20consultation with the coordinator of the statewide program for21suicide prevention employed under IC 12-21-5-5, shall develop a22suicide prevention training program to be administered to students23at each state educational institution.

(b) After July 1, 2024, each student at a state educational
institution shall participate in the training developed under
subsection (a) during the student's first year at the state
educational institution.

SECTION 8. IC 21-48-1-3 IS ADDED TO THE INDIANA CODE
AS A NEW SECTION TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY
1,2023]: Sec. 3. (a) Each state educational institution shall, for each
academic year and in accordance with the state educational
institution's established data collection requirements, collect the
following information:

(1) The ratio of counselors to students at the state educational
 institution.

36 (2) The number of students who were referred to a behavioral
37 health provider off-campus.

38 (3) The number of students who withdrew from the state
39 educational institution and identified emotional distress as a
40 reason for withdrawal.

41 (4) The number of student deaths caused by suicide.

42 (5) The number of students who attempted suicide and, as a



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1 result, were hospitalized.

2 (6) Information concerning the dissemination of mental health

and suicide prevention resource materials available at the
state educational institution and off-campus.

5 (7) Confirmation that the state educational institution has 6 developed, or is developing, a suicide prevention training 7 program.

8 (8) The student groups or organizations the state educational
9 institution has identified to participate in the suicide
10 prevention training program.

(9) The office or division at the state educational institution
that is responsible for developing and maintaining a crisis
protocol for the identification of suicide risk, appropriate
intervention, reentry, and postvention.

15 (10) The name of the individual who is responsible for the
16 crisis protocol described in subdivision (9).

17(11) Information on mental health services on-campus that18support and are available to veterans.

(b) Not later than December 31 each year, each state
educational institution shall submit the information collected under
subsection (a) during the preceding academic year to the
coordinator of the statewide program for suicide prevention
employed under IC 12-21-5-5.

(c) If a state educational institution does not collect or have
access to the information in subsection (a), the state educational
institution shall indicate in the report that the state educational
institution:

- (1) did not collect; or
- (2) does not have access to;
- 30 the information.

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
