DIGEST OF INTRODUCED BILL

Citations Affected: IC 20-20-8.

Synopsis: School corporation reports. Requires certain additional information to be reported on a school corporation's annual performance report (report). Requires a school corporation to make the report available on the school corporation's Internet web site. (Current law provides that a school corporation may make the report available on its Internet web site.) Requires the school corporation to conduct a public hearing within 60 days after publication of the report. (Current law provides that a school corporation may conduct a public hearing within 60 days of publication of the report.)

Effective: July 1, 2015.

SENATE BILL No. 230

A BILL FOR AN ACT to amend the Indiana Code concerning education.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

SECTION 1. IC 20-20-8-3, AS AMENDED BY P.L.43-2014, SECTION 3, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2015]: Sec. 3. (a) Not earlier than March 15 or later than March 31 of each year, The governing body of a school corporation shall publish an annual performance report of the school corporation, in compliance with the procedures identified in section 7 of this chapter. The report must be published one (1) time annually under IC 5-3-1.

9 (b) The department shall make each school corporation's report 10 available on the department's Internet web site. The annual 11 performance report published on the Internet for a school corporation, 12 including a charter school, must include any additional information 13 submitted by the school corporation under section 6(3)(A) of this 14 chapter. The governing body of a school corporation may shall make 15 the school corporation's report available on the main page of a school 16 corporation's Internet web site.



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1 (c) The governing body of a school corporation shall provide a copy 2 of the report to a person who requests a copy. The governing body may 3 not charge a fee for providing the copy. 4 SECTION 2. IC 20-20-8-4, AS ADDED BY P.L.1-2005, SECTION 5 4, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 6 2015]: Sec. 4. Not later than sixty (60) days after the publication of the 7 report, the governing body of a school corporation may shall conduct 8 a public hearing at a location within the school corporation to present 9 and discuss the report. The governing body may conduct the meeting in conjunction with a regular meeting of the governing body. 10 SECTION 3. The information must be provided 23 disaggregated by percentage of students by race, grade, 24 gender, socioeconomic status, and eligibility for special 25 education. 26 (4) The following test scores, including the number and percentage of students meeting academic standards: 27 28 (A) ISTEP program test scores, including end of course 29 assessment scores. 30 (B) Scores for assessments under IC 20-32-5-21, if 31 appropriate. 32 (C) For a freeway school, scores on a locally adopted 33 assessment program, if appropriate. 34 The information must be provided disaggregated by 35 percentage of students by race, grade, gender, socioeconomic status, and eligibility for special education. 36 37 (5) School's performance category or designation of school 38 improvement assigned under IC 20-31-8. 39 (5) (6) Average class size. 40 (6) (7) The number and percentage of students in the following 41 groups or programs: (A) Alternative education, if offered. 42

21	(I) The annual cost of utilities for each building the school
22	corporation owns divided by the square feet of the

8	a school year without being excused or without being absent
9	under a parental request that has been filed with the school.
10	(20) (22) The number of students who have dropped out of
11	school, including the reasons for dropping out, including the
12	percentage of students who dropped out of school by race or
13	who are eligible for free or reduced price lunch.
14	(23) The number of out-of-school suspensions assigned,
15	including the percentage of students suspended by race and
16	the percentage of students expelled who are eligible for free or
17	reduced price lunch.
18	(24) The number of in-school suspensions assign, including the
19	percentage of students who received in-school suspensions by
20	race and the percentage of student who received in-school
21	suspensions who are eligible for free or reduced price lunch.
