DIGEST OF INTRODUCED BILL

Citations Affected: IC 2-5-47; IC 8-1-1-17.

Synopsis: Climate and environmental justice task force. Establishes the climate and environmental justice task force (task force). Provides that the task force consists of 17 members. Requires the task force to: (1) develop a climate action plan that recommends policies the state should implement to systematically mitigate climate change, facilitate adaptation to the effects of climate change in Indiana, and simultaneously enhance statewide economic development; and (2) not later than November 1, 2022, submit the climate action plan to the executive director of the legislative services agency for distribution to the members of the general assembly and the governor. Requires the utility regulatory commission, not later than June 1, 2022, to issue a report forecasting the greenhouse gas emissions that will be produced by the power generation of Indiana's investor owned utility companies in each year from 2022 to 2050, based on the investor owned utility companies' current integrated resource plans.

A BILL FOR AN ACT to amend the Indiana Code concerning environmental law.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

SECTION 1. IC 2-5-47 IS ADDED TO THE INDIANA CODE AS

22	grow Indiana's clean energy manufacturing sector,

26	mitigation, and climate change adaptation to:
27	(i) systematically decrease "brain drain";
28	(ii) enhance quality of place in Indiana; and
29	(iii) systematically create new jobs and enhance
30	workforce development in Indiana.
31	(D) Provide Indiana's farmers with opportunities and
32	incentives to voluntarily participate in the effort to
33	mitigate and adapt to climate change, including:
34	(i) the creation of a carbon credit market;
35	(ii) increases in research, cost share, and technical
36	assistance for climate resilient agricultural technology
37	and practices; and
38	(iii) increases in cost share and technical assistance for
39	bundled renewable energy and energy efficiency
40	projects.
41	(E) Secure employment, pensions, and health care for
42	workers affected by changes in the energy industry.

11	implementation of climate resilient infrastructure.
12	(J) Improve the public health of Indiana's communities by
13	safely addressing the detrimental effects of climate change
14	and other environmental injustices, such as the air quality
15	effects of coal combustion emissions and the water quality
16	effects of coal combustion residuals.
17	(K) Systematically ensure justice and equity to all Hoosiers
18	by prioritizing giving economic benefits and opportunities
19	to frontline, marginalized, and low income communities
20	during all efforts to mitigate climate change, increase
21	adaptation to climate change's effects in Indiana, and
22	increase statewide economic development.
23	(L) Provide cross-curricular climate education for
24	sustainability, using project based learning, to students
25	from prekindergarten through higher education.
26	(M) Prepare for the effects on Indiana's fossil fuel industry
27	and its employees of utilities transitioning their power
28	generation from the combustion of fossil fuels to other
29	sources of energy.
30	(b) Not later than November 1, 2022, the task force shall submit
31	the report developed under subsection (a) to the following:
32	(1) The executive director of the legislative services agency for

1 UPON PASSAGE]: Sec. 17. (a) Not later than June 1, 2022, the 2 commission shall issue a report containing a forecast of the 3 greenhouse gas emissions that will be produced in Indiana by the 4 power generation of investor owned utilities in each year from 5 2022 to 2050, based on the integrated resource plans filed by the 6 investor owned utilities under 170 IAC 4-7.

(b) Not later than June 1, 2022, the commission shall submit the
report issued under subsection (a) to the executive director of the
legislative services agency for distribution to the members of the
climate and environmental justice task force established by
IC 2-5-47. The report submitted under this subsection must be in
an electronic format under IC 5-14-6.
