DIGEST OF INTRODUCED BILL

Citations Affected: IC 16-18-2-1.8.

Synopsis: Post-exposure prophylaxis reimbursement. Changes the definition of "additional forensic services" to include HIV prophylactic medication, and removes discretionary reimbursement for the service.

Effective: July 1, 2017.

A BILL FOR AN ACT to amend the Indiana Code concerning health.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

1	SECTION 1. IC 16-18-2-1.8, AS ADDED BY P.L.121-2006,
2	SECTION 20, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE
3	JULY 1, 2017]: Sec. 1.8. "Additional forensic services", for purposes
4	of IC 16-21-8, means the following:
5	(1) Initial pregnancy and sexually transmitted disease testing
6	related to an alleged sex crime.
7	(2) Prophylactic medication related to pregnancy, pregnancy
8	testing, or sexually transmitted disease testing. However, This
9	subdivision does not include includes HIV prophylactic
10	medication. that may be paid at the discretion of the victim
11	services division of the Indiana criminal justice institute.
12	(3) Alcohol and drug testing.
13	(4) Syphilis testing up to ninety (90) days after an alleged sex
14	crime.
15	(5) Pregnancy testing up to thirty (30) days after an alleged sex
16	crime.
17	(6) Mental health counseling concerning problems directly related



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to an alleged sex crime.

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
