4	Whereas, This resolution may be referred to as "Jennifer's
5	Resolution";
6	Whereas, The annual total estimated societal cost of substance
7	abuse in the United States is \$510.8 billion;
8	Whereas, A 2010 study by the Indiana State Epidemiology and
9	Outcomes Workgroup (SEOW) found that direct and indirect costs of
10	substance abuse and related consequences burden the State of Indiana
11	by an estimated \$7.3 billion per year;
12	Whereas, Cost-benefit analyses of treatment programs have
13	indicated that every one dollar spent on treatment results in an
14	average of seven dollars saved in benefits. These benefits include
15	increased employment, fewer medical expenses, and decreased crime
16	and crime-related expenses;
17	Whereas, Historically, greater than 80% of states' corrections
18	budgets are spent on adults who use substances;
19	Whereas, Community-based treatment is significantly less
20	expensive than incarceration. Calculations from other states have
21	estimated annual savings of nearly \$20,000 per inmate;
22	Whereas, In 2012, approximately 25,000 Hoosiers were admitted
23	to a substance abuse treatment program;

Whereas, Indiana Code 12-23-11-1 provides that an individual 1 2 who is an alcoholic, incapacitated by alcohol, or a drug abuser may be involuntarily committed to the care of the Division for Alcoholics 3 and Drug Abusers for treatment; 4 5 Whereas, Many Hoosiers with substance use disorders are not 6 aware of substance abuse treatment facility options, nor are their friends and family members; and 7 8 Whereas, Further study is necessary to determine the reasons why 9 more Hoosiers do not take advantage of treatment options, including 10 involuntary commitment: Therefore, Be it resolved by the Senate of the General Assembly 11 of the State of Indiana, the House of Representatives concurring: 12 SECTION 1. That the legislative council is urged to study the issue 13 14 of involuntary commitment of persons with substance use disorders. SECTION 2. That the legislative council is specifically urged to 15 16 consider whether: 17 (a) the involuntary commitment statute is underutilized; 18 (b) the state should inform the public, law enforcement, and the judiciary of the current Indiana laws on involuntary commitment; and 19 20 (c) the state has adequate resources to provide treatment for persons with substance use disorders. 21 22 SECTION 3. The Secretary of the Senate is hereby directed to transmit a copy of this Resolution to Sharon Blair. 23
