A SENATE RESOLUTION declaring that the policy of the State of Indiana is to support the state's sovereign authority to manage, control, and administer its own election laws.

SENATE RESOLUTION No. 64

MADAM PRESIDENT:

I offer the following resolution and move its adoption:

A SENATE RESOLUTION declaring that the policy of the
 State of Indiana is to support the state's sovereign authority to
 manage, control, and administer its own election laws.

Whereas, The Constitution of the United States vests power
in the states to manage, control, and administer each state's
own election laws;

7 Whereas, The power over elections was preserved explicitly
8 for the states by the Constitution and was not delegated to the
9 states by the federal government;

10 Whereas, Rare exceptions in the Constitution, including the 11 Elections Clause, Fifteenth Amendment, Nineteenth 12 Amendment, Twenty-fourth Amendment, and Twenty-sixth 13 Amendment, do not extinguish the constitutional presumption 14 that states have the constitutional power to set the terms of 15 administering an election, designating electors, and 16 establishing other laws and protocols relating to an election;

Whereas, The Elections Clause was to be sparingly used to
intrude on state powers to manage, control, and administer
state elections;



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Whereas, House Resolution 1 (H.R. 1) and Senate 1 Resolution 1 (S. 1), complementary bills introduced in the 2 United States Congress and known as the "For the People Act 3 of 2021", would obliterate the constitutional arrangement 4 5 between the states and the government of the United States by usurping the constitutional power of states to manage, control, 6 and administer state elections by prohibiting various practices 7 and mandating others; 8 9 Whereas, H.R. 1 and S. 1 would force states to conduct an election over an extended period of time, prohibit states from 10 maintaining voter rolls free from error and obsolete 11 information, force states to accept an elector who does not 12 13 register to vote in advance, create mandates related to voting by mail, and prohibit regulating of ballot harvesting; and 14 15 Whereas, H.R. 1 and S. 1 strike at the very heart of the arrangement that gave rise to this nation, namely that states 16

are sovereign and free from interference and the intrusion of
power from the United States government absent clear
constitutional authorization: Therefore,

Be it resolved by the Senate of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

SECTION 1. That the Indiana State Senate declares that the
 policy of the State of Indiana is to support the state's sovereign
 authority to manage, control, and administer its own election
 laws.

26 SECTION 2. That the Indiana State Senate opposes any 27 attempt by the federal government to usurp, or otherwise 28 interfere with, the state's legislative sovereign authority over 29 the management, control, and administration of elections.

30 SECTION 3. That the Indiana State Senate opposes H.R. 1 31 and S. 1 and any subsequent enactment of the terms of this



proposal and implores the members of Congress to oppose the
 same.

SECTION 4. The Secretary of the Senate is hereby directed 3 to transmit copies of this Resolution to the President of the 4 United States Senate, the Speaker of the United States House of 5 Representatives, each member of the Indiana congressional 6 delegation, the Governor of the State of Indiana, the Secretary 7 of State of the State of Indiana, the Attorney General of the 8 State of Indiana, the Legislative Council, and each Speaker of 9 the House of Representatives and each President of the Senate 10 of other state legislatures. 11



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
